

DISTRICT SCHOOL.—The second term of this popular institution will expire on Thursday next. An exhibition will take place on Thursday and Friday evenings, and an interesting time may be expected. Considering the large attendance—an average of over eighty—the progress of the pupils has been excellent, and parents generally express great satisfaction with the conduct and efficiency of a school that is a public monument of the energy of our present Board of Directors, and the liberality of our citizens. The public are expected to attend the exhibition which, of course, is free. It is understood that Mr. Dewitt and Miss Clayton will continue for another term, having given general satisfaction.

RECORDER'S COURT.—On Monday last Thos. McAndrews was brought into the Recorder's Court, charged with violation of Town Ordinance No. 5. The evidence produced showed that a difficulty occurred between McAndrews and Ivory; that Ivory followed McAndrews up and desired a fight, and even attacked him twice. McAndrews tried to get away, and to do which, he was compelled to strike Ivory, and knocked him down. The Recorder held that the defendant had committed no offence against the ordinance, and accordingly McAndrews was discharged.

STOCK SCREEDING.—We hear that the loose stock on Butte and Trail creeks, are suffering greatly from extreme cold, and from scarcity of food. One person is said to have abandoned a flock of two thousand sheep, finding it impossible to save them. In 1862, the largest amount of stock died, long after the storm was over, having become weak and unable to get food; and if stock is neglected during this cold weather, the same result may be expected.

DYING SHEEP.—We heard a rumor this week, that Mr. Jas. Thornton's sheep were dying at the rate of fifty per day. We took some trouble to ascertain if such was the case, but find it not to be so. Mr. T. has lost about fourteen head; but their dying is not attributable to the severe weather. His large flock is doing well. Mr. J. Davis, whose flock of sheep are on the foot hills across Bear Creek, has lost quite a number—how many we are not informed.

IN TOWN.—E. Corbett, the Superintendent of the Ogn. & Cal. Stage Co., passed through town during the week. He informs us that the Company were obliged to build skiffs with which to cross several of the streams in California during the high water. The Company deserve credit for their energy under such difficulties as they have experienced this Winter, even if the mails are a little irregular.

ARBITRATION.—We saw rather a novel way of settling differences in accounts one day this week. It seems that two of our citizens had difficulty in a settlement and agreed to leave the matter to three disinterested persons. Witnesses were called and examined, and proceeding went on very much as in a court of law, save that witnesses were not bound down by the strict rules of evidence.

COASTING.—The past week has been a gala one for "Young America" in Jacksonville. On the hill, back of Mrs. McCully's, the coasting has been glorious, and many of our full grown and bearded boys could not refrain from treating themselves to a slide. Go it boys! it strengthens the muscles and don't hurt the lungs a bit.

BAD ROADS.—Mr. Cornstock, Road Agent of the Ogn. & Cal. Stage Co., informs us that the roads between Canyonville and Eugene City are worse than ever before known. They are frozen just enough to make traveling bad, not enough to bear up a team. The Co. have been running a sled over the Calapooia.

IMPROVED.—Mr. Horne, of the U. S. Hotel, has had the ball-room in his house painted anew, and the panel work grained in imitation of oak. Mr. H. has been to considerable expense in making these repairs, but the room is greatly improved in its appearance. Mr. P. B. Coffin did the work.

DEED.—We learn that John McCrea, the miner who was so badly burned on Foot's creek some time since, has died of his injuries.

SNOW FELL in town last Sunday to the depth of about two inches.
