THE WEATHER.—The weather for the past week has been quite pleasant, though the nights are cold, and the thaw through the day is not equal to the freezing through the night.

DEBATING.—At the Moot Legislature last Monday night, the bill to repeal the usury law was lost by a large vote. The law-making power now meets in the Town Recorder's office instead of the Court House, as heretofore.

EXAMINATION.—On Monday of this week Mr. Songer made complaint before Justice Hayden, charging Wm. Pyburn and James Cameron with horse stealing. The warrant was placed in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Webb, who arrested the accused at Appleton, near Mr. Croxton's, on Tuesday morning; and on Wednesday the examination took place before Squire Hayden, who held the parties to bail in the sum of \$500 each, in default of which they were committed.

DETENTION OF MAILS.—We learn that the unusual and vexatious detention of mails south of this place has been occasioned by another heavy snow storm in California along the stage route. FIRE.—Mr. D. Hopkin's house, on the corner of Fourth and E Streets, occupied by Dr. Grabe and Thos. Curry, caught fire about four o'clock on Friday morning, and was burned to the ground. As soon as people were aroused from sleep, they proceeded to the scene of the fire, and it was not long before a large number of the citizens were on the ground assisting in removing the personal effects, after it was found to be impossible to save the building. Everything of value was taken from the first story, but the fire was under such headway but few articles were taken out. The fire originated from the fireplace. A fire has been kept up all night since Mr. Curry's child has been sick, and had caught to the wooden frame work of the mantle-piece several times before, and had been extinguished by persons present; but this time all were asleep. The fire burned between the chimney and the ceiling, and before discovered had made such progress as to be beyond control. The principal loser is Mr. Hopkin, the owner of the house, whose loss is about \$1,500. Dr. G. lost about \$200 worth of articles, consisting of clothing, table-linen, surgical instruments, &c. Mr. Curry's loss we have not learned, but it will not perhaps exceed two \$200.
