

AMONG THE INDIANS.—There is at present in this city a young boy named George Henry Sylvester, who has spent the most of his life since 1861, among the Snake, Cheyenne and Sioux Indians. His father and family live at the Dalles or in that vicinity. In 1861, while crossing the plains from Illinois to this coast, and while encamped on the Humboldt river, the boy George was suddenly missing, the parents conjecturing rightly that the Snake Indians had stolen him. He has not a definite recollection of the circumstances of the capture beyond the fact that the Indians seized and hurried him off, and kept him for about two years, treating him as well as in the nature of an Indian to do. He was then traded to the Cheyennes for two horses, and remained with that tribe as near as he remembers, about a year, when he was again traded by them to the Sioux for one horse. This occurred some time in 1864. He remained among the Sioux till just before Christmas, in 1866. During that time bands to which he successively belonged, ranged and hunted the Smoky Hill, Arkansas river, Republican fork, etc. Though in a manner accustomed to Indian life, he often felt a desire to escape from them and return among the whites, but never had an opportunity to do so till the time above mentioned. Being sent out on horseback to watch a band of horses, he concluded to make the attempt to get away, and accordingly started toward Julesburg, riding for a whole day and night at the utmost possible speed. His horse finally dropped down exhausted and died, when he took his way on foot. During the trip, he had no food except the carrion of an ox which he found dead, and a crow which he contrived to kill. During the nights he was compelled to build fires to keep away the gray wolves which looked close around, snarling and barking, and impatient for their prey. He describes these nights as most horrible; doubly so because the fires built to keep away the wolves, increased the danger of his recapture by the Indians whom he supposed to be in pursuit. When within about fifty miles of Julesburg, he encountered a soldier who took him in custody supposing him to be an Indian boy or girl, either lost or sent as a spy. Being taken to Omaha, a soldier was found who could talk the Sioux language, to whom George related his history. Col. King then sent him to St. Louis, where the facts of his captivity and escape were published in the newspapers, with a view to the discovery of his relatives. An uncle residing in Illinois read the advertisements, went to St. Louis and took the boy home with him, and informed his father of his recovery. Before, however, his father had been heard from, George got sick and became dissatisfied, and running away went to Fort Laramie and there enlisted in the 2d U. S. Cavalry. Through Senator Corbett's influence he was soon after discharged from the service with a view to his return to his parents. However, instead of returning home, he ran away again early in 1867, and went and joined the Sioux under the chieftaincy of "Spotted Tail." He stayed with this band three months when he split off from the band with sixteen lodges and two hundred Indians, by whom he was chosen as their chief. The Indians called him "Littlejohn," or in their own dialect, "Wasatche." He pursued hunting and trapping with his tribe until the beginning of winter, when he started with his buffalo robes and furs, to what is now Mt. McPherson. On the way he froze his hands and feet badly, and in consequence of this concluded to give up his wild and roving life. He accordingly made his way to his uncle's, who persuaded him to come to his parents in Oregon. He arrived here, a passenger by the steamer Ajax, and is now awaiting the opening of the Columbia river, to go to the Dalles. George is quite an intelligent, bright boy, speaks his native tongue but brokenly, and has evidently been long enough with the Indians to acquire their restless and adventurous spirit. Whether his return to the whites is to be permanent, is a little problematical, though time and home associations may eventually lead him back to his own proper nature. Much of his personal experiences and adventures we have omitted for want of room.—Oregonian.
