

### The Alabama Claims on England.

In the House of Commons, Disraeli appeared for the first time since the resignation of Derby. Upon entering he was received with loud cheers from both the Government and opposition benches.

In the House of Commons, Lefever called up the Alabama claims, and urged their settlement on the plan proposed by the American Government. All future negotiations, he said, would but add to the complications already existing. While he regarded a war between the two countries as unlikely, he thought that all needless irritation should be shunned.

Lord Stanley was pleased at the pacific tone of Lefever, and at the conciliatory spirit of Adams, the American Minister. He thought friendly arrangements still practicable. The friendly reception of Thornton at Washington was a pledge of peace. Ministers are ready to leave the question to the people of the entire world.

Stuart Mill contended that while England had not violated the law of neutrality, her action was unfriendly, rash and unprecedented; that reparation was due the United States, and he advised a mixed commission to settle the question.

Gladstone, while doubting if reparation were due, thought the matter should be referred to a Commission; but if the Government feared such reference, the question should be settled forthwith, or given to an umpire. The country would support Stanley in a just settlement.

Nearly all the leading papers have editorials this morning on the subject of the remarkable debate in the House of Commons on the Alabama question. The *Times* says the debate must convince the United States Government that England wishes to settle by law this case in the American sense, and that the failure of Great Britain to refer the claims to arbitration is due to no desire to shun her just obligation.

### CHOLIC IN HORSES.

The *American Farmer* learns from an officer of the United States Army, that eighteen drops of croton oil is a sovereign cure for cholera in horses.

A correspondent of the *Farmer and Planter* says that one pint of warm water will cure a horse of cholera.

Another remedy mentioned by a correspondent of the *Northwestern Farmer* is the following: "Take a bed quilt, wet it thoroughly in cold water, wrapping it around the horse, and as it gets hot pour on cold water. I have known the lives of horses saved in this way, when the veterinary surgeon said they could not live many minutes, and in fifteen or twenty minutes would be up and eating, and sure to get well."

### PLAIN TALK.

The *S. F. Dramatic Chronicle* thus talks to the Democracy, who, to believe their statements, are losing their liberties, and are so anxious to oppose the Government with armed force:

The men who constitute the Grand Army have fought against the fighting Confederates and whipped them. Do you imagine that they are to be frightened by your blustering and ink-slinging Confederates who kept out of harm's way during "the late unpleasantness," and who never smelt gunpowder? Your "one million" of sneaking Northern Confederates can shriek, howl, vituperate, blackguard and blaspheme; but they *won't fight*, no matter how much you may exhort, arm and drill them.

A lady in this city who wanted a servant, says the *Bulletin*, was called on a day or two since by a girl who wanted a place. But the girl was particular. She desired to be shown over the house. On examining the parlor she observed: "Oh, it is too small," and abruptly left. The extent to which the terrible Mongolian element is "kaping decent white people out of employment" is strikingly illustrated by this incident.
