Putting The Wires.

It is quite significant that the dissensions in the Democratic party are not confined to this, but exist in Umatilla, Union, Grant, Wasco, Peck, Lion, Lane, Benton, and Douglas counties. Dissentions so widely spread cannot be attributable entirely to local causes. They have their origin in the Senatorial election to come off two years hence. Neshmism desires to be again sent to the Senate, and the Safety clique,—Bush and Klippel,—second him; and they are known to be most astute political managers in the State. Their policy is plain. It is to kill off now, all the anti-Neshmism leaders in those counties, where the Democratic party has the ascendancy, in order that the road may be open to place creatures of Neshmism in the Legislature. This is the real reason why such a bitter war has been waged on Fay, Foudray, Miller and Klippel in this county, and on Gates and other leading anti-Neshmism men in Wasco, and the other counties named. Barnhart conducts the campaign in Umatilla, and Union for Neshmism; Vic Trevitt in Wasco, and Hen. Owen made his appearance here before the primaries, just as he did two years ago, like a bird of ill-omen, for the same purpose. These men are all known to be Neshmism's creatures, and because Col. Gates was known to be a Kelly man, he was forced to resign his place on the Wasco county ticket for State Senator, in favor of Trevitt, as the Senator elected this year will have a vote in the next Senatorial election. Neshmism is essentially a "Bread-and-Butter" politician, and may fall on our side of the fence. If he does he can crawl back again; we don't want any of his kind. The wires are being nicely laid for Neshmism's success two years hence; but to no purpose. Both parties are tired of "Bread-and-Butter" men, whose machinations are simply to gain power and plunder, and who regard the peace and prosperity of the country as a secondary consideration. If the people desire to stop political corruption, they will put down all "Bread-and-Butter" aspirants, and accomplish it.

"CHEAP JOHN" CONTRACTORS.—The great O. and C. Stage Co. seems to have dwindled down into a very small concern. Either the P. O. Department pays them too much for the mail service from Lincoln to Portia, or it says them too little. In their anxiety to secure a contract, they have overreached themselves, or they are making money so fast that their avarice has become morbid, and they "want it all." So long, however, as they carry the mails with regularity and accommodate the travel with their two-horse wagons, neither the public nor we have any right to grumble; but if we ever hear of a single sack of mail being left behind, we will make it our business to make a note of it. The gorgeous looking vehicle that has been put on between here and Yreka is beginning to shake to pieces; having been constructed in a damp climate, the scorching sun in this region is rapidly drying it up. To us it seems that the Company have put their foot in it; and that when the contract is again let, the Department will be unwilling to pay for four-horse service when it can be performed with two. Nobody cares how soon the "Cheap John" chattering traps that are being put on, fall to pieces; and God speed the day when the railroad will drive them out of the State.

DR. HYDE ON RECONSTRUCTION.—The staunch old rib of democracy, who has grazed in the Know Nothing pasture,—fattened on Republican fodder, and is now sucking the Democratic "tit,"—is heavy on reconstruction. He heard a Democrat denouncing the Plunder ticket a few days ago, and looking arms with the sore-headed individual, he marched him into a saloon to "reconstruct" him. Feeling the bolters pulse, he gravely remarked: "Slight irritation of the scalp—democracy considerably relaxed—principles badly shocked—political complex much excited—tolerable bad case but not incurable." "Come," said the doctor, "I have practiced in every political family you ever heard of, and know your symptoms well; nothing like a cocktail, it quiets the Democratic nerves, and is the best 'reconstructor' I know of." REUB RINUS.—The Know-Nothing candidate for the Legislature announces himself as opposed to the vote system of voting, and says if elected he will use his utmost influence to have the ballot substituted for it. Of course the Know-Nothings went all their money on the ballot system; and in 1854, when the present system was introduced by Delazon Smith, it was done against the earnest opposition of the Know-Nothings, as it made them show their hands at the polls. It was the vote system that killed off the "dark lantern" party in this State, and no wonder "Reub Rinus" don't like it. The Germans like it; Reuben; the Irish like it; Mr. Rinus, because it enables them to spot those that don't like them; and, therefore, they will elect you—to stay at home!

NEGRO SUFFRAGE.—Joseph Smith is in favor of the worst kind of negro suffrage. He wants the votes of five negroes to count the same as the votes of three white men, but wants the rich Southerners to cast the negro vote so as to give them an unfair advantage over the poor man of the North. That's the reason Joe Smith is opposed to the Constitutional Amendment.

NOT ENOUGH TONE.—Mr. Plymale's withdrawal from the Plunderer's ticket shows that he had a little political integrity left. The "bread-and-butter" should have held their grip on him, just to give their ticket a little political tone.

THE DEMOCRATIC invitation to drink in Jacksonville is: "Come, let's reconstruct." It indicates a fearful state of demoralization in that party.

Democratic Testimony.

Read the following article, Democratic fellow-citizens, from the Dalles Mountaineer of May 2d, and ask yourselves if it is not in every way applicable to the state of affairs in this county. Had it been written expressly to show the causes of the disaffection in the Democratic party here, it could not have been worded better. It shows that the people of Umatilla county are determined to rid themselves of the cormorants who fatten on public plunder, and show them that when the people want servants they will seek them themselves without the aid of wire-pulling politicians, who do more to disturb the public peace than any other class of people.

On last Wednesday evening, according to previous notice, Col. N. H. Gates made a speech to a very large number of the voters of Wasco county on the causes which produced the split in the Democratic party in Wasco, and the results which are sure to come from it. He clearly showed that it was the result of base frauds practiced and perpetrated in the Democratic primaries by spongers and illegal voting, and thereby electing delegates to the County Convention who were not the exponents of Democratic principles and who were the means of thwarting the will of a majority of the Democrats of this county. That the so-called Democratic ticket was forced before the people by a system of "thimble-rigging," gotten up and carried into execution by three or four political hucksters and turn-coats, who have been huddling about from one party to the other for the last eight years, and whose motto is to rule or ruin. This being true, he maintained that no Democrat was bound by the nominations; that there is just as much democracy in one ticket as in the other; that he should support the "People's ticket" and thereby discountenance by his individual actions any attempt to defeat the will of the people hereafter, and for the further reason, that the candidates on the People's ticket for various county offices, are in every way superior to those nominated on the so-called Democratic ticket; that this was the only course left for all true Democrats to pursue in order to preserve the Democratic party from demoralization and ruin. And in our opinion he made a clear statement of the case, and during the progress of his speech he made it very warm for those fellows who brought about this disaffection, showing that while they co-operated with the Union party they were constantly trying to produce the same results, which they have now produced in the Democratic party.

WITHDRAWN.—Mr. Plymale has withdrawn his name from the so-called Democratic Legislative ticket. Had we learned his intention sooner, we would have spared him last week. As it is, Mr. P. has shown his judgment and good sense in cutting loose from a piratical craft that is bound to be sunk by the combined guns of both parties—a junta that knows no principle and seeks to secure the loaves, and fishes by unfair and fraudulent practices. Mr. Plymale has saved what sover political integrity he had left, and we honor him for his discretion.

A NEW ALLY.—The Catholic Priest at Eugene City has been using all the weight of his influence in favor of Dave Logan, and against the hypocritical impostor, Joseph Smith. He apologizes for mixing with politics in his sacerdotal character, by saying that it is his duty to combat hypocrisy, in any guise whatever, and strike a wolf in sheep's clothing wherever found. We agree with him, and hold that it is the duty of every honest man to do the same.

Roseburg Correspondence.

ROSEBURG, May 6th, 1868. On Friday night last, Hon. O. Jacobs made one of the best speeches at this place, that was ever delivered in Oregon.

Politicians are at work with a will; both County Conventions have been held, and to say the least, a vast deal of dissatisfaction exists among the rank and file of the Democratic party; it is generally conceded by the honest Democrats that their party needs a thorough reconstruction! The Union ticket will be triumphantly elected; our County Clerk will be but slightly opposed.

Parties are making preparations for an early start for "Bohemia," with a view of becoming immediately rich. Farmers anticipate heavy crops of grain the coming summer; grass is never better. Stock of all kinds is doing well, and several large hands have recently been driven south in search of a market.

There will be some emigration from this valley to Klamath valley and Pitt River this summer. The first organization of the "Coast Bay Road" fell to pieces a short time ago, and a new organization has been formed upon its ruins, and the first meeting for a more permanent organization will come off at this place on the 18th.
