Resolved, That the work of Reconstruction of the Southern States belongs to the legislative department of the Government, and that we endorse the thirteenth and fourteenth amendproposed for the restoration of the States lately in rebellion to their former relations with the Federal Govern-

Resolved. That we are in favor of admitting the rebel States to representation in Congress at the earliest moment which the public safely will permit. Resolved, That the national debt was

necessarily contracted to save the National life, and ought to be honestly paid; and we condema every scheme devised for the repullation of the whole, or any part of the debt, as disgraceful to the Republic and unjust to its citizens, and that the proposition to pay in legal tender notes, those debts con-tracted to be paid in specie, is only a

milder term for repudiation.

Resolved. That under the Constitution the Pederal Government has no right to interfere with the elective franchise in any State having representation in Congress, and whose civil goverament is not over brown by rebellion.

Bearings That the right of expertiation is the macural and inherent right of all people, and indispensable to the enjoyment of the rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that while the enizen ower allegiance to the Government, the Government owes protection to the citizen, and that it is the duty of the Government of the United States to protect all its citizenspative born and naturalized-in the tall enjoyment of their rights as citizens of the United States, wherever, and under whatever polor of pretense those . rights may be invaded

Resolved, That the foreign immigration, which in the past has added so much to the wealth, development of resources, and increase of power of this nation-the asylum of the oppressed of all nations-should be tostered and encouraged by a liberal and just policy, and that we sympathize with all people everywhere, who are struggling for

civil and religious liberty.

Resolved, That the thanks of the American perple are due to the soldiers and sailors of the army and mays, who have periled their lives in defense of their country and in vindication of the honor of its flag, that the nation owes to them some permanent recognition of their patriotism and their valor, and ample and permanent provision for those of their survivors who have received disabling and benerable wounds in the services of their country, and that the memories of those who have tallen in its defense shall besheld in grateful and everlasting remembrance.

Resolved, That we sare in favor of liberal appropriations of land and money by the Government to aid in the construction of railroads.

REMARKABLE MINING RELICS.-At different places in East Tennessee, where there are veins of copper, zinc, or lead ore, there are found exeavations that must have been made hundreds of years before that section was settled by our people. So very extensive are some of the exervations that to make them now, with all modern facilitieswould require an expenditure of thousands of dollars. 
