

Republican National Platform  
—adopted at Chicago, May 21st,  
1868.

1st. We congratulate the country on the as-  
sured success of the Reconstruction Policy of  
Congress as evidenced by the adoption in a ma-  
jority of the States lately in rebellion, of Con-  
stitutions securing equal, civil and political  
rights to all; and we regard it as the duty of  
the government to sustain these Constitutions,  
and prevent the people of such States from being  
remit to a state of anarchy or military  
rule.

2d. The guarantee by Congress of equal suff-  
rage to all loyal men in the South was demanded  
by every consideration of public safety,  
gratitude and justice and must be maintained;  
while the question of suffrage in all loyal  
States properly belongs to those States.

3d. We denounce all forms of repudiation as  
a national crime, and national honor requires  
the payment of the public indebtedness in the  
utmost good faith to our creditors at home and  
abroad, not only according to the letter, but  
spirit of the laws under which it was contracted.

4th. It is due to the labor of the nation that  
taxation should be equalized and reduced as  
the national faith will permit.

5th. The national debt, contracted as it has  
been for the preservation of the Union for all  
time to come, should be extended over a fair period,  
and it is our duty to reduce the rate of  
interest thereon whenever it can be honestly  
done.

6th. That the best policy to diminish our  
burden of debt is so to improve our credit that  
capitalists will seek to lend money at lower  
rates of interest than we now pay and must  
continue to pay so long as repudiation, partial  
or total, open or covert, is threatened or suspected.

7th. The Government of the United States  
should be administrators with the strictest econ-  
omy. The corruptions which have been so  
shamefully nursed and fostered by Andrew  
Johnson call loudly for reform.

8th. We profoundly deplore the untimely  
and tragic death of Abraham Lincoln, and re-  
gret the succession of Andrew Johnson to the  
Presidential Chair, who has acted treacherously  
to the people who elected him and the cause he  
was pledged to support; who has usurped high  
legislative and judicial functions, has refused  
to execute the laws, has used his office to induce  
other officers to violate the laws, has employed his  
Executive power to render insecure the lives, property, peace and liberty of  
citizens, has abdicated the pardoning power, has  
denounced the National Legislature as unconstitutional,  
has persistently and hotly resisted  
every measure in his power, even at  
attempt at the reconstruction of the States lately  
in rebellion, has perverted public patronage into an engine for wholesale corruption, has  
justly been impeached for high crimes and mis-  
deeds, and has been pronounced guilty  
thereof by the votes of 35 Senators.

9th. The doctrine of Great Britain and other  
European powers that, when a man is once a  
subject he is always so, must be resisted at ev-  
ery hazard by the United States as a rule of  
federal times not authorized by the law of na-  
tions and at war with our national honor and  
independence. Naturally all citizens are entitled  
to be protected in all their rights of ci-  
zenship as though they were native born. No  
citizen of the United States or naturalized  
must be liable to arrest or imprisonment by any for-  
eign power for acts done or words spoken in  
this country, and if so arrested and imprisoned  
it is the duty of the Government to interfere  
in his behalf.

10th. Of all who were faithful in the trials  
of the late war, there were none more faithful  
for special honor than the brave soldiers and  
seamen who endured hardships of camp and  
cruise and imperiled their lives in the service  
of their country. The bounties and pensions  
appropriated by law for these brave defenders  
of the Union are obligations never to be for-  
gotten. The widows and orphans of the gallant  
dead are wards of the people, a sacred  
legacy bequeathed to the United States for pro-  
tection.

11th. Foreign immigration in the past has  
added so much to the wealth and increased re-  
sources of this nation, the asylum of all na-  
tions, that it should be fostered by a liberal  
and just policy.

12th. The Convention declares its sympathy  
with all oppressed people who are struggling  
for their rights.

The following additional resolutions were  
offered by Mr. Thompson, and adopted:

Resolved: That the adjournment of this Con-  
vention shall not work dissolution of the same,

but it shall remain as organized, subject to be  
called together at any time or place that the  
Republican Executive Committee shall designate.

By Carl Shutz: Resolved: We highly commend

in a spirit of magnanimity and forgiveness  
the men who have served in the rebellion and  
who are now frank and honest co-operating

with us in restoring peace to the country and  
in the reconstruction of the Southern States on  
the basis of impartial justice and equal rights,

and are received back into the command of  
loyal people, and that we are in favor of the  
removal of the disabilities or restrictions

imposed on the late rebels in the same measure  
as the spirit of disloyalty disappears, as may  
be consistent with the safety of loyal people.

Resolved: That we recognize the great prin-  
ciples laid down in the Declaration of Inde-  
pendence as the true foundation of Democratic  
government, and we hail with gladness every  
effort towards making these principles the liv-  
ing reality on every inch of American soil.
