Beef Cattle Wanted.

THE undersigned will receive written propo-
sals for fresh beef at the Klamath Indian
Agency, until the 21st of December 1868.

Beef must be of good quality, delivered on
the block at the agency in quarters, the hides
and offal thrown in. One thousand pounds
will be required at each delivery, on the first,
eleventh, and twenty-first of each month. The
quantity and time of delivery may be changed
in the discretion of the sub-agent in charge or
the Superintendent, but no change will be
made requiring a larger total amount of beef
in the period of the contract.

The contract will extend from the 1st of
December to the 11th of April, and the un-
derigned reserves the privilege of extending it
one month longer, at his option.
Bids must state the price in currency. Pro-
posals calling for coin will not be considered.
They must be mailed to the undersigned at Sa-
lem, Oregon.
