The commissioners must r member that during the time for which they ar called on to pay the expense of two extra hospitals, the people were paying for the support of the regular county hospital. For various reasons the county hospital was of no partienlar use to us during the epidemic, chief among which was the reason of leeation in the center of the town. Light as this new hurden may be, it will be full heavy, and the people have a right to demand that not a single cent le paid to any party, more than is just and equitable; and under the circumstanens we believe the Board will do its

By the letter of Mr. Dowell from Washington, and that of the Third Auditor, it is painfully apparant that the Oregon War Claims are likely to remain unpaid forever, on the plea of economy. This is rank injustice! The war claims of this State, incident to the suppression of the Indians, are as just as any debt ever owed by the nation. In some instances the claims are for gold coin furnished to the United States Officers, by citizens of this State, and now, by reason of a little red tape entanglement, they still remain unpaid. Ev n Congress seems to lack confidence in the Court of Claims as it refuses the legislation necessary to give the just rights of Oregon citizens a judicial investigation. Government once acknowledged the validity and justice of these demands -- if they were just once, they are no less just now; and desira-ble as economy may be, it is no excuse tor chameless and unjust repudiation.
