THE SANITARY COMMITTEE.—The duties of this Committee, composed of Messrs Beckman Drum and Kilpold, have ended. QUARRY PROSPECTING.—We learn that Messrs. Dillon and Bowden are sinking a shaft on the ledge formerly worked by French Louis on Shively Gulch. They have sunk about sixty feet and at that depth find a well defined vein about eight inches wide which prospects very well. Some of the rock is rich and some handsome specimens have been taken out. We hope their enterprise will be rewarded by success.


