SEALED proposals will be received at the above office, up to 12 M., on the 7th day of June, 1869, for furnishing the troops at Fort Klamath, Oregon, with Fresh Beef from the stock during the year commencing July 1st, 1869, and ending June 30th, 1870. The Beef to be of good marketable quality, in equal proportions of fore and hind quarters, necks, shanks and kidney tallow excluded, and to be delivered in such quantities as may from time to time be required, and on such days as shall be designated by the Commanding Officer.

Sealed proposals will also be received at the same time and place, for the delivery, at Fort Klamath, Oregon, of the following supplies, viz: (40,000) Forty thousand pounds of Flour, (3,000) Three thousand pounds of Bacon, (800) Eight hundred pounds of Ham. The Flour to be of good quality, in new strong sacks, each sack containing 100 pounds. The Bacon to be clear sides, well cured and smoked, and put up in 100 pound packages. The Hams to be good marketable quality, thoroughly cured and smoked, and put up in suitable packages.

The delivery of the above supplies must commence on the first day of August, 1869, (if required) in such quantities as the exigencies of the service may demand, and the delivery must be completed by the 30th of November next.

Separate bids required for each of the above articles, and to be marked "Proposals for furnishing Fresh Beef, Flour, Bacon or Hams," as the case may be.
