Another Sad Nunnery Case.

The Cracow convent case appears to attract considerable attention in Italy. Long accounts of it appear in the papers, and these are followed by editorial comments. A correspondent of the Gazzetta d'Italia now writes, and asserts that there is a nun at this moment in the Carmelite Convent of Bologna whose condition may perhaps be similar to that of Barbary Ubryk, and he therefore calls upon the authorities to investigate it.
