STARTLING ACCIDENT.—On last Saturday evening, as young Walter Meyers, Miss Beach, and Miss Sarah Beeson, all residents of this section of country, were driving together in a two horse buggy over the bridge at Rock Point, they met with quite a serious accident, and yet may well be thankful that it was no worse. It seems they had got nearly to the end of the bridge when the horses became unmanageable, and backed off with the buggy falling some 10 feet on the rocks below. Meyers and Miss Beach saved themselves by jumping out before the vehicle went over; but Miss Beeson went over with the buggy and team. She was but slightly injured, although one of the horses was killed; the other badly crippled; and the buggy smashed into a complete wreck.

ANOTHER ACCIDENT.—Two of our fellow townsmen, Messrs. PATRICK and CARO, met with an accident near Gasburg (Phoenix) under the following circumstances, sometime in the latter part of last week. They were driving leisurely along in a buggy, when a pack mule loaded with kegs tried to pass them, but in doing so struck their horse with one of the projecting kegs with so much force as to throw him around at right angles, and thereby overturned the buggy, spilling its incumbents promiscuously on the ground. Mr. Parsons received a pretty severe hurt in one of his feet, but is now getting well. Strange to say their horse stood still and obedient to their "whos" until they got straightened up and got the mischief repaired.

STILL ANOTHER.—Mr. Lever's team is rumored to have run away last week, and seriously injured one of his children. It is said his three children were in the wagon, the oldest driving the horses, when seeing something, he fired at it with his gun, thereby frightening the team and causing the run-away.

Late Telegrams.

PHILADELPHIA, October 21.—The total official vote of Pennsylvania gives Geary a majority of 4,596, and Williams, Judge of the Supreme Court, 8,700.

Boston, October 22.—An earthquake was felt early this morning at Augusta and other places in Maine. Buildings were shaken, but no damage was done.

ANDY TRAITOR DEFEATED.
Nashville, October 22.—The opposition concentrated on Henry Cooper today, and elected him Senator on the first ballot, by a vote of 55 to Johnson's 51. Cooper is a gentleman of fine ability, and has been a consistent Union man all the time.

Springfield (Mass.), October 22.—A slight shock of earthquake, lasting twenty seconds, was felt throughout New England.

General Butler states that no doubt the Government will prohibit the sailing of the Spanish gunboats, and also detain the *Hornet* at Wilmington.

Boston, October 21.—A Working-women's Convention, claiming equal wages with men for the same kind of work was held in Faneuil Hall today. It was thinly attended.

Omaha, October 19.—The bones of six men and forty-six horses, supposed to be the remains of a party lost from Fremont's exploring expedition, have been found in Southwest Colorado, between the Opal Fork of the Rio Grande and Squaw Lake.

Colonel J. F. Stone, Superintendent of the Apache Pass mine, Arizona, was murdered by Indians on the 5th instant and the mail captured.

New York, October 22.—Washington special to New York says that a conference was held yesterday by between the Pacific Mail and Panama Railroad Directors for the reduction of freight and passenger rates. Business of the Pacific Mail has fallen off greatly since the opening of the Pacific Railroad. The project is to reduce rates, and endeavor to recover it.

Fisk and Gould have been cited in New York to appear before the Grand Jury, to give testimony in relation to the recent gold speculation.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

Paris, October 22.—The *Presse* says the Revolutionary Committee in Paris has warned the workingmen in the provinces that on the 26th instant there will be a general uprising in the city. The radical journals do not approve of the proposed demonstrations.

It is rumored that **Ledra Rollin**, **Felix Pyat**, **Victor Hugo**, **Louis Blanc**, and other extreme radicals, will come forward as candidates for the *Corps Legislatif* in the supplementary elections soon to be held in Paris.

THE COUNTRY IMPROVES.—While comparing notes yesterday with a friend regarding the growth of our State, he said that in 1857 he was doing business at Haverhill, in Lane county, where he bought the wheat offered for sale, and all he got during the whole fall and winter was sixty bushels which was stored in dry goods boxes. Now at that place there is 90,000 bushels, on storage, aside from that still retained in the farmers' granaries. The first crop was sold for ninety dollars, while this one is worth between forty five and fifty thousand dollars. —*Statesman*.

In 1861 Paris had 1,696,141 inhabitants; in 1866 the population was 1,825,274. This is an average increase of 26,000 per annum, but not the natural increase of the city. In 1867 the excess of births over deaths was only 11,629, so that it is evident the larger portion of the increase comes from immigration. Paris has always been fed from the provinces, and has been compared to a monstrous ogre, that devours the children of all France.

THE IRISH IMMIGRATION CONVENTION held at St. Louis has decided to form an Immigration Association with a capital of \$2,000,000, to further the objects of the Convention.

THE ALASKA TIMES says there are only six hundred inhabitants in Sitka, all told, yet there are sixty bar-rooms, and two breweries.

THERE has been sixteen cases of suicide in Lowell, Massachusetts, within eight months, mostly of young girls.
