MORTUARY REPORT.—This week we publish the Sexton's annual report of the interments in the Jacksonville Cemeteries. Of these only four belonged properly to this city. Of the rest 14 were from the country, or persons temporarily residing here, and the other three were paupers who came here but a short time before their deaths. This shows well for the health of Jacksonville, and it would be hard to find a place anywhere, containing the same number of inhabitants, where there has been so little mortality during the past year, as there has been here.

BURGARS.—An attempt was made by some one to break into the brick store of Sachs Bros., in this place, on last Tuesday night, but unsuccessfully. They first tried to break their way through the chimney, but abandoned that and tried to remove the cellar grating, this was also a failure, and they then started through the wall close to the back-door, but before they had made much headway the Marshal arrived at the scene of operations and frightened them off. Our town is getting as famous for store robberies almost as Portland used to be while Schultz infested it with his associates, and yet but little effort seems to have been made to capture the offenders. This is a bad state of affairs and cannot be tolerated much longer.

THE TROTTING RACE.—The trotting race we noticed sometime ago, came off, at the Bybee track, last Saturday. There were only three entries. Plymale's yellow mare, Jake Roubesh's black colt, and Savage's horse, "Satan." Plymale's mare got sick and was not put on the track at all. The contest between Roubesh's colt and Savage's horse was decided in favor of the latter. There was one fight growing out of the race; S. Booth and McGinley, of the McGinley troupe, had a little sparring match all to themselves, in which Booth came out ahead.

THE MCGINLEY TROUPE.—The "benefit" exhibition of this troupe came off, as advertised, last Saturday evening. There was but a small turnout, and from all accounts it was about as good an audience as they deserved. The troupe was a poor concern take it all in all, and money paid for admission was about as good as thrown away. Jacksonville has got a name for liberality in patronizing everything of this kind that comes along, and it merits it unquestionably. Many a dollar has gone from the pockets of its citizens and from the county to support just such nuisances as the McGinley troupe, without a particle of benefit to either the patrons or the performers. Discountenancing them would save the former money expended without any profit, and would drive the latter into some honest and useful employment. We think it high time to begin under this new rule, and patronize nothing of the kind unless it has some merits to recommend it.

STONE COAL.—A ledge of excellent coal has been discovered, a short time ago, in this county, between Bybee's Ferry and the Meadows, by S. K. Shelley, Wm. Selph, and Dr. Chitwood. From appearances, so we are informed by the Doctor, there is an extensive deposit of coal in that locality. It has been tried by Mr. Moore, a blacksmith in Sam's Valley, and he pronounced it the real article.

FROM LINK RIVER AND FORT KLANATH.—Charley Hand is just in from Link River country. He reports that section under about a foot of snow. Mr. Hand is well acquainted with many of our old residents here. He will return to Link River in a few days.
