Religious Notices.

QUARTERLY MEETING began yesterday at the M. E. Church, and will continue to-day and to-morrow.

FATHER BLANCHET will hold divine services at the Catholic church to-morrow at the usual hour.

MEETING OF BOARD.—March 1, 1870. The Board convened. Present: A. Martin, President; Linn, Neil, and Orth. The record of previous meeting was read and approved. Ordinance 49 was read a third time and passed. The ordinance requires the Street Commissioner to pay all money into the town treasury, collected for road taxes, and to expend road labor on the main roads leading into town, &c. The town submitted a report, which was ordered to be returned, requiring the report to be made in proper form. Lot reassessed to J. S. Drum, at \$10, and deed to issue for same.

The returns of election were then canvassed, and the result declared as follows: Whole number of votes cast, 137; for Trustees: N. Fisher, D. Linn, J. R. Neil, A. Martin, and James Wilson; for Recorder, U. S. Harwood; for Treasurer, N. Page; for Marshal, A. F. Wall; for Street Commissioner, P. Fehely; who were declared duly elected, except as to A. F. Wall, Marshal; a notice having been given by G. Seaman, to contest the election of Wall; and thereupon the day following was set to hear and determine the case. The Board then adjourned.

March 24.—The Board met and adjourned to the Court House, and the matter of contest was heard. J. D. Fay for contestant, and C. W. Kahler for the defence. After hearing the testimony produced, and the argument of counsel for contestant and defendant, the matter was taken under advisement by the Board, which adjourned till 7 o'clock in the evening, to meet at the Recorder's office. The Board convened at the hour named, when the President of the Board stated that two votes cast for A. F. Wall, for Marshal, were decided to be illegal, thus giving George Seaman a majority of one vote for Marshal; and it was so declared. The attorney for Wall moved for a rehearing of the case, on the ground of newly discovered testimony; the motion was denied. The counsel for Wall filed a notice that he would contest the election of Geo. Seaman, on the ground of his being a non-resident of the town. The case was set for hearing on Tuesday, at 10 o'clock, a. m., at the Court House. Adjourned accordingly.

HORSE RACE.—The Allen and Sizemore horse race came off, as published, last Saturday afternoon, in the presence of a large concourse of people, from all parts of the county. Sizemore's mare got several feet the start, but Allen's mare soon passed her, and went by the judge's stand some 20 feet ahead. A good deal of money changed hands over the result, and sundry horses, cattle, etc. The Allen mare is undoubtedly fast, but very unmanageable, and betting on her with her present training a little precarious.

A BAD EGG.—One Manley, who worked a few days in this office, this spring, has been trying to run our "face" with the Statesman office, for a ride to Portland from Salem. Now, Manley is the worst ingrate we ever knew. We gave him, when he started away from here to Portland, the next best pair of boots we had—and we only had two pairs—and the next thing we hear of him he is trying to drag our name in to a scuffle. We fear that he is incorrigible.

CITY ELECTION came off Tuesday. There was a spirited contest over Marshal and Street Commissioner. Asher Wall was elected Marshal by one majority. George Seaman contested before the Board on the ground of illegal voting, and that body threw out two illegal votes for Wall, and declared Seaman elected by one majority. Wall now contests Seaman's election on the same ground, and the trial is set for next Tuesday. The whole thing is somewhat mixed, and there is no telling which way the "cat will jump."

BROOK'S SINGING SCHOOL is still progressing here. Large numbers attend every meeting, and the interest manifested seems to be genuine. The "new books," which were sent for, some time ago, have arrived, and there will, henceforth, be no interruption in the exercises.

PERSONAL.—B. F. Dowell is still in Washington, D. C., engaged in the claim business. He has been very successful in getting old war claims paid, this winter; and owners of government scrip cannot do better than put their claims into his hands, before he sets out on his return.

RECOVERING.—We learn, from Dr. Greenman, that Mr. Evans, whose leg was broken twice, a short time ago, is getting along finely, and that no fears are entertained that he may not ultimately recover the full use of his injured limb.

Jefferson on Slavery.

It was not Massachusetts but Virginia which first advocated the abolition of slavery.

We take the following from Jefferson's "Notes on Virginia," written in 1781, and published in 1800, by W. Pechin, of Baltimore:

"The whole commerce between master and slave is a perpetual exercise of the most boisterous passions, the most unremitting despotism, on the one part; and degrading submission on the other."

"With the morals of the people, their industry also is destroyed. For in a warm climate, no man will labor for himself who can make another labor for him. This is so true, that of the proprietors of slaves a very small proportion, indeed, were ever seen to labor. And can the liberties of a nation be thought secure, when we have removed their only basis, a conviction in the minds of the people that those liberties are of the gifts of God? That they are not to be violated but with his wrath? Indeed, I tremble for my country when I reflect that God is just; that his justice cannot sleep forever; that considering numbers, nature, and natural means, only, a revolution of the wheel of fortune, an exchange of situation, is among possible events; that it may become probable by supernatural interference!"

"The Almighty has no attribute which can take sides with us in such a conflict. But it is impossible to be temperate and to pursue this subject through the various considerations of policy, morals, of history, natural and civil. We must be contented to hope they will force their way into every one's mind. I think a change already perceptible, since the origin of the present revolution. The spirit of the master is abating, that of the slave rising from the dust, his condition mollifying, the way, I hope, preparing; and that this is disposed, in the order of events, to be with the consent of the masters, rather, than by their expiation."

In Memoriam.

DECEASED at the family residence, near Jacksonville, Wednesday, March 24, 1870, at 5 o'clock, a. m., of inflammatory rheumatism, JAMES BRUCE KILGORE, youngest son of James and Mary Kilgore; aged twelve years, one month, five days.

The deep and oppressive grief sustained by the parents of the deceased, in the loss of their favorite son, can never be appreciated by those who were unacquainted with the uncommon faculties, the many attributes and unmistakable signs of future promise which belonged in no small measure to the subject of this sketch.

The writer, having long had opportunities as a teacher for observing the moral worth, the intellectual advancement, and excellent scholastic department of the little wall lately set adrift upon the dark, undomestic ocean of life, deems no further apology necessary in view of offering this short and imperfect tribute to his juvenile memory. James Bruce was not prematurely or extravagantly given over to precocity; but managed, through a careful attention to his studies, to become the best scholar in the school, while in other branches his diligence was unusually commendable. In short, his acquirements, as far as he went, were so thorough and exact that they could have been no more to have doubted his extraordinary proficiency when he should have reached the ripe fruition of his progressive intellect. Possessed of a good disposition, his actions were always guided by a high principle, and he was to the end of his life a model of straight-forwardness, and sure to win the esteem of playmates and acquaintances wherever found; and, while his classmates often had reason to envy the facility with which he almost uniformly carried off the prize, they must seek for recompense in following the bright example he set before them. Few, very few of those who intimately knew him will fail to regret his untimely decease. Alas! how important is health! and how often do we meet with proofs of the fact, that the "king of shakers" loses a shining mark! To the bereaved parents we can only offer the cheering words of another:

"For beyond the dimmed valley,
Where the stylus waters flow,
Where pale Charon guides the wherry,
Where gentle angels bloom,
Hope still points us to a heaven,
Where the weary soul shall rest.
With 'our darling' gone before us
In the mansion of the blest."
