## Religious Notices.

To the Citizens and Tax Payers of Jackson County, Oregon:

In justice to myself and my associates in office, I deem it a duty, at this time, to lay before the public a true statement of the county finances.

The last exhibit, published in the Democratic News, shows a balance in the treasury, July 7, 1870, of \$2,187 30.

The old Board of Commissioners convened July 1st and 2d, 1870, and paid themselves and associates up to the end of their term of office. There was, at that time, on file, in the Clerk's office, to be added, expenses of the June Term of Court, expenses of the general election, held June 6, 1870, and other just claims against the county, amounting in the aggregate

County indebtedness, over and above amount in treasury, July 7, 1870..... \$1,410 66

It will be observed that when the present Board of County Commissioners assumed office, they found their duties the county owed over and above amount in treasury \$1,410 66.

Instead of \$18,328 45, as shown in the exhibit of July 9, 1870, it cost \$20,588 41 to carry on the county government during the year ending July 7, 1870. During the past year the county realized from the sale of Chinese mining licenses, K-naka, Negro, and China poll tax the sum of \$7,063 00.

That revenue, at present, is entirely cut off. With an indebtedness of \$1,410 66, short of a revenue of between seven and eight thousand dollars per annum, bridges and roads sadly needing repair, is the excuse offered for presenting the above correct exhibit to the public.

WETZEL HEARD FROM.—The Albany Democrat says: "Last Monday a German, giving his name as Ferdinand Wetzels, aged 26 years, was apprehended by Marshal Long on a complaint of insanity, and after being examined by Drs. Rice and Tate, before His Honor, Judge Johns, was adjudged insane; and on Tuesday was taken down to Portland by Sheriff Irvine. The patient seems to be laboring under religious excitement; says he left Jacksonville last December, and is now returning for the purpose of wedding a young lady" of that place.

TAKE WARNING.—We are informed by the City Marshal that, hereafter, he will strictly enforce the town ordinance forbidding any one to deposit manure, straw, ashes, or any rubbish whatever on the sidewalks and streets.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—A young man by the name of Franklin Miner, was thrown from his horse on the 16th, about noon, and falling on his head, received a serious, but it is now thought, not fatal injury.

It happened within the corporation limits, on the stage road leading south, and was undoubtedly caused by a bridge across the public road being out of repair. He is yet unable to recollect anything about being thrown, but a gentleman, who was near by, saw him ride on the bridge, and saw the ends of a plank which was broken into in the middle, fly up, frightening the horse, and causing him to throw his rider. He was taken to the dwelling of Mr. Berry, which is near by where the accident occurred, and properly cared for. He was insensible until the next day, but is now partially at himself again. The Improved Order of Red Men, of which he is a member, now have him in their charge, and are furnishing the most satisfactory proofs of the charitableness of their order. This accident should be a warning to those who have charge of our public roads and bridges, to see that they are kept in a safe condition.

ASSAULT.—From Goose Lake we learn that about the first of this month, a Mr. McDowell of that section, assaulted and beat C. A. Cogswell over the head with a pistol, about 7 miles from Ft. Warner, on the road to Goose Lake. Cogswell made no attempt to hurt McDowell, and the assault was made after he had absolutely refused to fight McDowell in any manner whatever. Under such circumstances a simple assault would have been wholly unjustifiable, both in point of law and morals; and an assault with a pistol, was an outrage that calls for severe punishment.

PROF. G. N. FREMAN of Hesperian College, located at Woodland, Yolo co. California, gave us a call this week.—The Professor has been connected with the institution for the past four years as Principal of the Preparatory Dept.
