SNOW AND RAIN.—On Wednesday last, the snow was about 5 feet deep on the stage road over Scott's Mountain, and about 2 feet on the Siskiyou. Snow was still falling at last accounts, and we may conclude that it has kept getting deeper since that time till the present. The snow covers the hills and mountains around this valley, to quite low down, and some has fallen in the valley, but melted away as fast as it has fallen. It has been raining hard since Sunday night, most of the time. There is water and mud in abundance, even in the streets, and the miners are busy mining or getting ready to mine. Everything looks favorable here, for a prosperous winter.

ACCIDENT.—Mr. John O'Brien, of Applegate, was kicked on the forehead head by a frisky horse belonging to him, "all in fun," on the 8th inst., but, strange to say, was not seriously injured. He had just turned the horse loose to play, when it whirled about and kicked him. Considering that the horse weighed about sixteen hundred pounds and was shod, the fact that Mr. O'Brien was not killed nor even knocked down, goes a long way to show that he has got a "hard old head" sure enough.

Purchase of Fine Horses for Oregon.

W. C. Myer, of Ashland Mills, Jackson county, Oregon, has been in our midst for the past few days, making some purchases of fine horses, which he designs conveying by rail to Marysville, California, and thence overland to Oregon.

It is well known that Union county has a far-famed reputation for superior Norman horses, which have from time to time been imported to this county by the Darby Plains Importing Company—embracing the Fullingtons and others—the two noted stock men in Ohio, and the first importers of the celebrated Norman stock.

These importations have furnished the States, both East and West, with the highest grade of this noted stock, and now Mr. Myer proposes to select some of the very best of it for the State of Oregon. He has purchased from Wentz & Co., the fine Norman stallion imported from Havre, France, last August. This stallion, Mr. Myer has selected as his choice from among seventeen imported Norman Stallions he has looked at in Illinois and Ohio, and he is considered by the most competent judges as among the very finest specimens of this celebrated stock of horses.

The same gentleman has also purchased a full blooded Norman mare from Capt. Geo. Sanchir, which has for three successive years taken the first premium at the Ohio State Fair, and her colts have taken premiums at all the fairs they have been exhibited. It is said by well informed horsemen, that there are but three full blooded mares of this stock in the United States, and this is one of them.

He also purchased two 1/2 Norman mares—one from J. R. Boerger, and one from J. Leonard—which are pronounced the best specimens of this stock in the county. These are withal, by imported Clydesdales, and the first by Norman Prince Albert, owned by Wentz & Co.

Mr. Myer was assisted in these purchases by the Messrs. Fullingtons, and while he has a long and tedious journey to make to the Pacific coast, he has the assurance that he carries with him the best stock that Ohio can afford.—*Marysville (Ohio) Tribune.*

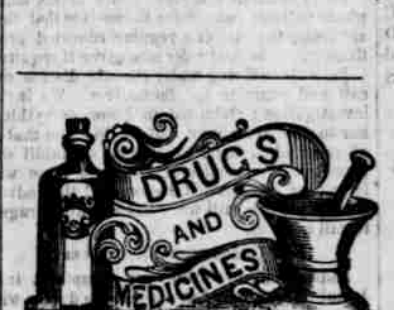
