

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

BOUNTIES.

BOUNTIES. All soldiers who served two years or more during the rebellion, or were discharged by reason of wounds before the expiration of twe years, and the widows and heirs of those who served, are now entitled to \$150, or more, se-cording to the time and length of their enlist-ment or service. By an act passed July 28, 1866, all soldiers who served two years of more on one enlist-ment, or were discharged by reason, of wounde before the expiration of two years, are entitled to additional Bounty of \$50 or \$190 each, se-cording to the terms of enlistment, and the

cording to the terms of enlistment, and the same increased Bounty is allowed widows, chil-dren or parents of soldiers who died in the ser-vice, or of wounds received or disease contracted in service. Under this Act, all soldiers, or widows, chil-

dren or parents of decrased soldiers, who re-ceived any Bounty prior to July 28, 1866, are entitled to \$50 or \$100 increased Bounty.

PENSIONS.

Winows.-The widows, children, or if ne widows or children, the dependent fathers or mothers, or brothers of misters under sitters years of life, of officers, soldiers, seamen or marines, of the late war, who have been killed, or have died of wounds received or disease an-tracted in the line of daty, are entitled to Pensions. Widows are entitled to additional Pensions of \$3 each per month for each child of the diseased soldier under sixteen years af age. All widows pensioned prior to August 1, 1866, and having children as above, are entit-ited to increased pensions. Pensions. tled to increase

Beet Sugar Manufacture.

The Beet "Sugarie" at Alvarado, California, about 20 miles from San Francisco, on the opposite side of the Bay, was established last fall, at a cost of about \$125,000. It made its first sugar on the 17th of November last. Its sugar was of the finest quality and has recommended itself so well that it is in demand not only throughout the State of California, but there is a heavy and increasing demand for it in the markets of Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Utah, and Colorado. The demand is four times greater than the amount produced at the factory, which is four tons daily. Already a dividend of 40 per cent. on the capital stock has been declared, and the prospects of the company are golden enough to satisfy any one it would seem. While the success of this enterprise will richly reward those who have embarked their capital in it, it will also prove of vast benefit to the State of California and this coast. There is no reason why a similar investment would not be profitable in this State. Who questions our abil-ity to raise as good beets and as many of them as they can raise in California? And who, after a success so decided as that of the Alvarado "sugarie" can doubt its being a profitable investment here? We have men of capital and
