Religious Notices.

EASTER SUNDAY.—To-morrow (Easter Sunday) the services at the Catholic church will be unusually solemn and impressive. The best singing and musical talent have kindly volunteered for the occasion.

THE PEACE JUBILEE.—Last Tuesday evening, pursuant to announcement, the Germans held their jubilee over the return of peace between Germany and France. At a little after 7 o'clock, P. M., they formed a procession with torch-lights and transparencies, at the Court House, and then marched through the principal streets of the town, preceded by a band of music, returning to the Court House.

At the Court House the audience was addressed by Mr. N. Langell, in English, followed by Mr. John Cimborosky, in the German tongue. Both addresses were short and well received, as we judge by the attention and applause of the audience.

After the speaking, the Germans all united in singing a German song, which was sung with much feeling and energy. They then marched from the Court House to Veit Schutz's hall. On one of the transparencies, was a brimming goblet of lager beer, and just beneath it a frog. There were several mottoes, among which we noted the following: "Germany not aggressive, but always ready to defend her just rights." The rain which had begun early in the evening, continued to fall and somewhat interfered with the torch-light arrangements, but could in no wise dampen the patriotism of the Germans. It was but a small inconvenience, when compared with the gigantic difficulties that opposed the German march to Paris. Henry Pape was Marshal of the evening, and acquitted himself most creditably. Arriving at the hall, the procession broke up, and all got ready for the Grand Jubilee Ball, which passed off in splendid style.

The supper was excellent, and reflected much credit on the culinary skill of Mrs. Herling, who prepared it for the occasion. After supper the following toasts were offered: The Unity of Germany; responded to by E. B. Watson. The Return of Peace; responded to by James D. Fay. The Fatherland—first in European Arms, first in European Civilization; German Sons and Daughters can never forget their Birthplace; God Bless the Fatherland; responded to by Wm. M. Turner.

Who does not love Wine, Women, and Song, remains a fool his whole life long; responded to by John Cimborosky. The party then returned to the ball-room where the dance was resumed, and kept up until day-break. The entire occasion was pleasant, and was participated in by a large proportion of our citizens, besides the Germans. It was a Peace Jubilee, and all entered into its celebration, with the spirit of those who are sensible of the losses of war and the gains of peace.

Proceedings of Meeting to organize Jockey Club.

JACKSONVILLE, OGN., April 1, 1871. Pursuant to notice a number of citizens of Jacksonville and vicinity met at the Court House, of this place, for the purpose of organizing a Jockey Club. Hon. James D. Fay was chosen Chairman and E. B. Watson, Secretary. A motion was then made and carried that the Chairman appoint a committee of five to draft by-laws and rules for the government of the Club, and report the same at a meeting to be held on the 1st of May next. The Chairman appointed John S. Herrin, J. C. Tolman, Jacob Roudebush, S. Plymale, and J. N. T. Miller, as such Committee. A motion that the Secretary be directed to furnish a copy of the proceedings to each of the county papers, was then made and adopted, whereupon the Club adjourned to meet again on the 1st day of May, 1871.

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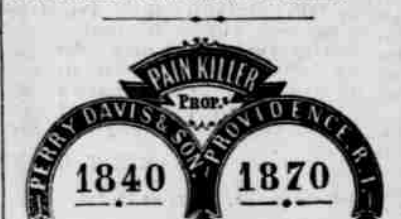
