Surveyor's Report of the Ditch Survey.

Beginning at a point at the head of Kerr gulch, at about 50 feet above the present worked claims, or 90 feet below the Brown ditch, and running thence around the points of the hills and across Griffin Creek, to the point between Coleman's and Wagner's Creeks, 10 miles and 11 chains, with a grade of five feet to the mile, raise 50 feet 88 inches to this place. 23 1/2 miles, to a point above the mouth of the Ashland ditch, the grade of our ditch being 98 feet above said ditch. The Ashland ditch has a grade of 264 feet to the mile and will cross the line of our ditch opposite or back of Ashland. 32 miles, to the head of Ashland ditch which is 86 feet above the line of our ditch grade. 41 miles, to a point back of or opposite to Pat. Dunn's, and 205 feet above Bear Creek, at the bridge near Dunn's. 50 miles, to Bear Creek at the Hill place, this point being 250 feet higher than our starting point, giving five feet to the mile grade. 58 miles, to Emigrant Creek near Dr. Colwell's. The line of the ditch extending towards Jackson Creek, would intersect it at the lower end of Farmer's Flat, and would run about two or three hundred feet above Kanaka Flat. The size that would be necessary to carry the amount of water that could be had, may be estimated at six feet wide at the top, three feet at the bottom, and three feet deep. It is more than possible that sufficient water for all practical purposes may be obtained for four or five months in the year, from the various large feeders along the line of the ditch, without having recourse to either Emigrant or Keene's Creek, but these failing, the streams last mentioned may be added, which will insure a good supply for six or seven months. The waters of Keene's Creek may be made to reach that of Emigrant Creek, by a ditch which will not exceed eight miles in length. There is no doubt but that the ditch as set forth above, is practicable. The soil along the line, as a general thing, is a yellow clay or loam, mostly the former, with very little rock, and is highly favorable to building a good substantial ditch. Taking into consideration the favorable ground traversed by this ditch and the little fluming required, and its accessibility at all points, it is believed that the cost, per mile, will not exceed \$700; making the total cost about \$42,000.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.—At an adjourned meeting of the Jackson County Agricultural Society, held at the Court House, on Saturday, April 15th, 1871, the meeting was called to order by J. D. Eay, President, and E. D. Foudray was appointed Secretary, pro tem. The committee appointed at the previous meeting, made their report of the offices for the ensuing year, which was adopted. Permanent officers: President, J. D. Eay; Vice Presidents, John E. Ross, J. C. Tolman; Secretary, H. K. Hanna; Treasurer, Henry Pape; Trustees and Finance Committee, J. N. T. Miller, James R. Cardwell, John S. Herrin, John O'Brien, J. S. Walker, C. C. McClenden, M. H. Coleman, W. C. Myer, Jacob Ish, Henry Brown, J. B. Wisley. The Committee on Constitution and By-Laws reported, and the report was adopted. On motion, a committee of three, consisting of J. N. T. Miller, S. Plymale, and James McDaniel, were appointed to procure the printing of the rules and regulations governing the Society. On motion the meeting adjourned to meet again on the first day of May, 1871.

DITCH REPORT.—We are able this week, to give a very full and satisfactory report of the survey for a mining ditch leading into the higher mineral lands in this section. Mr. Howard is an able and experienced surveyor, and a cool-headed man besides, and his survey and estimate of the probable cost of building the ditch, may be relied on as being correct. The cost of building the ditch, compared with the great benefits that would arise from its construction, is small indeed, and it does not seem to us that capital could be more profitably invested, both to the capitalists and the public.

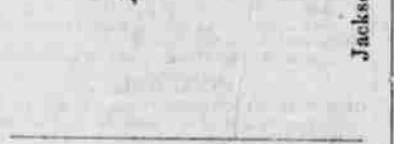
