JACKSON COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.—Through inadvertence we have omitted any mention of the very commendable efforts of our citizens to organize and place on a permanent footing, a county Agricultural Society. We now cheerfully make amends, and we are glad to be able to state that an Agricultural Association has been formed on a sound basis, and if our farmers and stock-raisers manifest a little of the interest which they ought to feel in the success of the enterprise, it will succeed. One hundred copies of the rules and regulations of the Society have been ordered at this office, and will soon be completed. Experience has demonstrated the advantage of associations of this kind in every agricultural and stock-raising community, and Jackson county, so eminently suitable for both, ought not to be without its yearly Agricultural Fair.

ANOTHER ERUPTION AMONG THE DEMI-MONDS.—Our inferior courts, in this county, are becoming exceedingly popular resorts for the "Heathen Chinese," and "Lo!" the poor Indian. Last Thursday, Judge Wade bound over to appear at the next November term of the Circuit Court, a squaw, for assaulting another squaw with a knife, up on Kanaka Flat, a few days since. Her husband, a white man, was unable to find bail, and the Judge then changed the order holding her to answer for an assault with a deadly weapon, and imposed a fine for a simple assault and battery.

BASE BALL.—The Ashland Base Ball Club, some weeks since, sent a challenge to the umpire of the old Jacksonville club, to play a few games of base ball with the latter. The latter club was at the time the challenge was received, disbanded, and of course the challenge could not be accepted. Some of our "boys" are decidedly in favor of reviving the old club, in order to give the Ashlanders a trial, and we think the idea a good one. Let us organize a club and give the Ashland "boys" a trial for the precedence.

FINE GARDEN.—We visited, yesterday, the garden of Mr. John Weiss, of this city. Everything about it showed the diligence and industry of Mr. and Mrs. Weiss, and shows what may be done by earnest application. They have, among other things, the largest and nicest cauliflowers we have ever seen in this State. We were shown by Mrs. Weiss several medallions and ribbons received by her at the Paris and other industrial fairs in France, and she declares her intention to contend for a premium at the first agricultural fair held under the auspices of the Jacksonville Agricultural Society, and we have no doubt that she will be successful.

RETURNED.—Wm. M. Turner and J. S. Howard, accompanied by their whole working force, returned yesterday, from their surveying expedition. They look well and hearty, and report themselves ready for any similar job on short notice. They finished their surveying job in townships 41, 43 and 44 South, Range 3 and 4 East. This section of the country lies along the State boundary line, and East of Pilot Rock. They surveyed about 20,000 acres, and pronounce it all splendid grazing land. They saw five grizzlies, and hundreds of deer while on the survey.
