THE CRESCENT CITY ROAD.—The spring supplies of goods for this city continue to arrive, but very slowly, owing to the almost impassable condition of a portion of the road between here and Crescent City. Several teams who started from here about two weeks ago have returned empty, not deeming it profitable and hardly practicable to haul merchandise over such a road; and those who have succeeded in making the round trip, coming in with a load, report the road in worse condition than ever before known, and the worn-out appearance of their horses and battered and bespattered look of their wagons fully corroborate their statements. Our supply of paper was shipped from San Francisco, via Crescent City, over three weeks ago, but has not made its appearance yet, and we have been compelled to collect together, this week, all remnants of paper about the office, so if any of our subscribers get a rather dingy looking sheet they will please excuse it for once.

THE NEIDHAMMER BOND.—Judge Prim decided, last Wednesday, that Justice Lafayette Galt, of Rock Point precinct, acted legally in raising Neidhammer's bond for appearance at the next term of the Circuit Court, for shooting Taylor, from \$1,000 to \$3,000, before he had made any entry of the order fixing the amount of the bond in his docket. This decision will give very general satisfaction in the section of the county where the offense was committed. Neidhammer gave the required bond of \$3,000 and is now at liberty.

Board of Trustees.

REPORTED FOR THE SENTINEL.

June 6, 1871. The Board of Trustees met, at 8 o'clock, P. M., pursuant to adjournment. Members present: President Wilson, J. Bilger, and N. Fisher. Absent: Howard and Zigler.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The committee on the matter of opening out "Third" street and conferring with Mr. Glenn in regard thereto, reported in full and they were continued with instructions to procure a survey for the extension of said street beyond the town limits to intersect the Sterling road, through the land of Mr. Glenn, offered by him to the town for said purpose.

The report previously made recommending certain improvements of Town Hall and building was called up and read, and N. Fisher and J. Bilger were appointed as a special committee, to procure estimates of the probable cost of the same as proposed in that report. The proposed improvements are to enlarge the Hall by removing the chimney and setting back the partition (8 feet) to the cell, remodeling the front of the building by putting in large windows and door to correspond, and to use the present front windows for side windows to the Hall, finishing the room in good style, by plastering, painting, &c.

Mr. Fehely, late Street Commissioner, presented his road account, and claims to be due him \$334 from the town for road expenses over road receipts. The same was referred to the Finance Committee.

Mr. McDaniel, one of a Finance Committee to procure funds for the celebration of the next "Fourth of July," asked leave to withdraw the petition asking the Board for a donation of \$50. The Board refused to grant the leave asked.

Mr. Fisher offered a resolution to appropriate \$25 out of the town treasury to aid in the proposed celebration of the coming anniversary of the "Fourth of July." The resolution was voted on, J. Bilger voting no. The resolution went over ten days under the rules. The Board then adjourned to June 19th.

Fourth of July Celebration.

Fireworks and Ordinance—Ed. Smith, Charles Harris, John Guilfoyle. On Supplies and Water—Thos. Paulsen, Geo. Rattie, Ole Gannison. The sub-committee charged with that duty, have selected Bybee's Grove as the place for holding the celebration. It is expected that the "Jacksonville Thumpagorians" will parade during the afternoon.
