STAGE ACCIDENTS.—A serious stage
accident occurred, last week, near Amer-
ican Ranch, Cal. The brake to the
stage got out of order, in going down a
steep hill, and the stage ran on to
the horses, causing them to run away
and upset the stage. There were 13
passengers on board, at the time, and
5 were more or less injured. A similar
accident happened in another place, at
about the same time, of which the
Yreka Union gives the following
account: "As the stage from Oregon
was coming down the Siskiyou Moun-
tain, the brake from some cause be-
came useless, and the team ran away.
For about a mile extraordinary time
was made, but luckily the driver—
Louis Tucker—succeeded in finally
bringing his frightened steeds to a
halt. One or two of the passengers
were slightly injured by jumping from
the stage at the commencement of the
race." Both accidents seem to have
been caused by some defect in the ve-
hicle used, which may have been caused
by the company making faster time
than has ever been made on this route.

REPORTED FOR THE SENTINEL.

Monday evening, June 19th; an ad-
journing meeting of the Board of Trust-
ees was held this evening. Present:
President Wilson, J. Bilger, N. Fisher;
absent: Howard and Zigler.

The minutes of the previous meeting
were read and approved.

The resolution appropriating \$25 to
the funds being raised for the Fourth
of July expenses was passed.

The Street Commissioner reported
the bridge on Third street completed,
and the street graded and prepared for
public travel; also reported whole ex-
pense to the town for the work \$127;
it being \$52 over amount appropriated,
a warrant was ordered to be issued to
S. Dunlap for that amount, (\$ 2.)

The Street Commissioner's bill for
superintending work (\$22) was re-
ferred.

Ordinance No. 51, vacating First
street between California and C street,
was taken up and passed.

Bill of Recorder for deed to Hauser
(\$3 50) was ordered paid.

C. W. Kahler was appointed Town
Attorney for the balance of this year.
Adjourned to June 29th.

Oregon Ku Klux

From a private letter from a friend
we extract the following:

ROSEBURG, OREGON, June 18, 1871.

FRIEND DOWELL:

I am glad that you have once more
arrived in your moral vineyard, where
you may again intimately taste the bit-
ter essence of a "Democratic vintage."

The usual Ku Klux word of bloody
warning: "Be on your guard, your
turn comes next," appears to be realiz-
ed among our Republican editors in
Oregon. So look sharp. The editor of
the Ensign and Statesman have
both been cowardly assaulted by
these born chivalry, but our boys were
not caught napping but received the
enemy at the point of the bayonet.
