FOURTH OF JULY.—Next Tuesday the Anniversary of American Independence (Fourth of July) will be celebrated in almost every city and village of "the land of the free, and the home of the brave." We think it the duty of every American citizen, to assist in honoring and commemorating this day in an appropriate manner. The memory of the glorious deed accomplished on the 4th of July, 1776, and of the noble patriots who risked all they possessed, yea, even life itself, in signing the "declaration of independence," should stimulate every true citizen to cast aside all unworthy prejudice and to preserve and strengthen the principles of true patriotism.

THE CELEBRATION.—The preparations for celebrating our national anniversary, at this city, by the Committee of Arrangements and the subcommittees appointed for that purpose, are all, so far as we are able to learn, progressing finely. The Committee on the Selection of Ground and to procure an Orator, Chaplain and Reader, have selected Bybee's Grove, near this city, they have appointed Rev. I. D. Driver as Orator, Rev. B. R. Johnson as Chaplain, E. B. Watson, Esq., as Reader, E. D. Foudray as Grand Marshal, and J. P. McDaniel and C. W. Savage as Assistant Marshals; the Finance Committee have collected near \$300 for defraying the necessary expenses; the Committee on Music have engaged the Jacksonville Band; the Committee on Fireworks and Ordinance have made all necessary arrangements to insure that portion of the programme; and the Committee on Supplies and Water have made arrangements to insure an abundant supply of water and a good substantial lunch. The Grounds have also been put in suitable order for the occasion. Altogether, the preparations are complete, and all that is needed to make the coming celebration one of the most successful ever held in this country, is the hearty co-operation of our citizens.
