Resolutions.

The resolutions passed at the precinct meeting of this place, on last Saturday, are full of principles, and speak the sentiment of the Republican party throughout the State. While they indorse the great principles that have carried the Republican party on to success, they manifest a Christian spirit of forgiveness to those that have been its enemies.

While the first resolution indorses the wise and humane administration of President Grant, and commends the course that he has adopted in maintaining the dignity and honor of the Union; it also approves the rapid reduction of the national debt during his administration.

The second favors universal amnesty, thus disclaiming any feelings of animosity that might have been engendered during the late rebellion, and manifests a willingness to recognize all as friends throughout the length and breadth of the Union; forgetting the past, and holding men responsible only for their present actions. It also favors the return to specie payment by the government, and a gradual reduction of taxation—principles that must be commended by every tax paying citizen.

The third favors the reelection of President Grant. His past administration is a sufficient guarantee of the merits of this resolution, and needs no further comment to recommend it to those that have closely watched his actions for the past three years.

The fourth and fifth are in favor of paying the Oregon and Washington war debt of 1855-6, according to the award of the Commissioners. No honest man, who knows the facts, can object to this resolution. People at a distance believe we have received our full dues from Congress long ago. This is a great mistake in and out of Congress. The people, in their sovereign capacity, must eradicate this idea, or they will never get another dollar. Let the Oregonians press their claims in a proper spirit in their State platforms, and in Congress with an undivided delegation, and by the Legislature, and they will be paid. When the people of Oregon reflect that there are a great number of our citizens who lost their all in this war, and many among the number having large families to support, their sense of justice will give this resolution a hearty approval.

The sixth, while it favors the encouragement of railroads by the General Government, declares that the United States should dispose of the public lands only to actual settlers, in small quantities, not to exceed 160 acres. The Committee of the House upon Public Lands, by one majority recently rejected a railroad bill, from Salt Lake to Portland, which contained the principles of these resolutions. We hope this committee may yet be favorable to the road. The people, of all classes and parties, must acknowledge that this resolution is entirely replete with justice and wisdom.

The seventh opposes the Democratic litigant law; the swamp land grabbing law; and the law which allows the State Lands in the La Grand land office district to be entered at less than \$2 per acre; and renews the oft-repeated declaration of the SENTINEL, that the Republican party will oppose these unjust laws to the bitter end.

For the want of space we approve the other resolutions without going into detail, and pledge ourselves to give them all our hearty support.

A Coward, Liar and a Villain.

The nondescript which slinks around the editorial sanctum of the Democratic slander mill, has again sent forth his feeble, dying moan, imploring the public to turn their attention from his crime stained character, and see if they could not find something wrong in my official acts to engage their attention for a while, and thus give him a little rest. He has so far tacitly admitted the charges I made against him two weeks ago to be true. In last week's Times this hisolous vituperator pours forth an amount of billingsgate sufficient to warrant the belief that he thinks he controls the whole stock on the market; and the persistency with which he bawls forth his wares, would seem to qualify him for a first rate vender of charcoal, in which occupation the blackness of his complexion would beautifully harmonize with the blackness of his character and his dark deeds.

He publishes from the county records a bill presented and certified to by me, for the expenses of a road survey from Bybee's ferry to Ft. Klamath, thence to Link River, and costing the county about five hundred dollars altogether, and it paid for at the rates allowed by the government for their land surveys, would have cost the county twelve hundred dollars; but the principle item to which he takes exceptions, and to which he has devoted a column and a half to prove the enormity of the swindle, was the fact that I brought in a bill for 62½ cents a day per man for provisions furnished for the board of the men employed upon said survey, which the philanthropic Commissioners cut down to 37½ cents per day, and which this dishonorable candle-holder Fay virtually says is too much food for a laboring man who works from ten to fifteen hours in a July sun.

Yes, men of Jackson county, who earn your bread by the sweat of your brow, this man J. D. Fay, whom you elected to make your laws, would cut your rations down to nearly one-third prison fare. Yes, the culprits in our jail are allowed six dollars worth of board per week, yet this soft, white handed, soft headed Hon. Senator considers three bits worth of board per day as too good and too much for a man that earns his bread by the sweat of his brow.

We do not understand why this great reformer does not go after the County Commissioners for their extravagance in allowing the Sheriff six dollars per week for boarding the criminals in our jail, unless there is a sympathetic feeling between himself and all other villains; and perhaps, with an eye to the future, he does not want to see prison fare reduced.

This living proof of Darwin's theory, that man sprang from a baboon, this thing in the image of man and with the instincts of a brute, imagines he can make and re-make men; he also thinks he owns the original Democratic party in this county, and in this opinion he is joined by a small ring of his strikers in and near town, who think that by his trickery and chicanery they can foist themselves upon the party and secure the county offices. They expect to go to Fay when they die, and they nightly pray in this style:

Now I lay me down to sleep,
Please J. D. Fay say not to keep,
If I should die before I wake,
Please J. D. Fay say my soul to take.

All good Democrats who did not subscribe to this change in the litany two years ago, must repent and confess their past sins to this great high priest Fay, do penance and take back seats, and not be admitted to full communion for the next two years. All who do not subscribe to this programme are to be consigned to Fay's democratic purgatory, there to remain until the candle-snuffers of this high priest Fay are paid enough to pray them out. All who do not champion this man Fay are alike subject to his maledictions, and he tries to turn every man out of his means of making a livelihood who does not worship this brazen serpent.

Because Mr. Turner telegraphed some very unpleasant truths in his news dispatches about this man, he tried by every foul and false means to turn him out of his office, but failed most signally; then, as Mr. Turner and myself were associated together in a surveying contract, and because he knew that I disliked him as sincerely as Turner did, he started in on me with his vile falsehoods; but he has started in on the wrong man, as I don't propose to turn out as pliantly

as man might suppose. I have many things in my favor which this man Fay never possessed and never will possess. I have brain and muscle, a trade and profession, and friends who I have never betrayed; and I expect to live here and make a comfortable living for myself and family for a long time to come, in spite of this man Fay and his minions. Yes, Mr. Fay, I laugh to scorn all your vile attempts to deprive me of the means of making a livelihood.

County Conventions.

To-day the Republicans will hold conventions in their respective counties throughout the State, for the purpose of electing delegates to the State Convention, to be held in Portland on the 20th inst.

At that convention there is to be a candidate nominated for Congress. The people of each division of the State will doubtless be interested in having one of their own number nominated as a candidate for this very important office, so that in case he is elected, their interests may be better looked after when he takes his seat in the National Legislature. The people in the Northern part of the State will naturally be interested in having one of their own nominated; those living in the Eastern part one of their own number; and the Southern part of the State is of course interested in having some one from our midst nominated, so that his interests may be co equal with our own.

We all feel that a man whose interests are inseparable from ours will represent us better in Congress than one living in a distant part of the State.

We, of the South, have never as yet been represented in Congress, by a man in either party, living in the Southern part of the State. The Northern and Middle sections of the State have had all the offices so far, with but little if any opposition. While we acknowledge that it is natural for everyone to look out for his own interest, we earnestly contend for our right of representation; and we will expect of those that have been represented, an acknowledgment of this right as a point of honor.

We are willing to acknowledge the greater right to the greater number, but we are not willing to be ignored entirely. If our interest is but a fraction, we ought not to be considered inconsiderate for asking for our fraction, however small it may be, after all the other parts of the whole have been served; if but a tenth, we don't want the nine recounted until the tenth is forgotten.

Republican Convention.

The Republican County Convention for the county of Jackson will be held at the Court House in Jacksonville, at 1 p. m. on Saturday the 9th day of March, 1872, for the purpose of electing ten delegates to the Republican State Convention, to be held in Portland on the 20th day of March, 1872. The primary elections in the several precincts will be held on Saturday, March 2d, 1872, at the usual places of voting in said precincts, beginning at the hour of 2 p. m. of said day.

Board of Trustees.

REPORTED FOR THE SENTINEL.

March 5, 1872. The Board of Trustees held a special meeting this evening. A full board in attendance. The minutes of last meeting read and approved. The committee on the application of L. Zigler for title deed to lots No. 1 and 2, in block No. 49, and lot No. 1, block 50, made their report, recommending that a deed be granted to applicant, and assessed at \$10; report adopted; and it was therefore ordered that deed be executed to said applicant upon payment of assessment.

The Town Attorney verbally reported on the application of B. Barlow for title deed to certain premises: report accepted, and it is ordered that title deed issue to said applicant upon payment of assessment, \$20. Bill presented against the town by Hall & Piel, of \$17 for covering shaft on Third street; J. P. McDaniel, fee bill, \$99 per post year; U. S. Hayden, bill for making town deed, and for stamps, \$7 50; referred Finance Committee. The Recorder laid before the Board his annual exhibit of the receipts and expenditures of the town for the past year; the same was read and ordered filed. The exhibit shows funds on hand at the commencement of the year, \$1,231 00, and receipts from all sources, \$1,120 00; total, \$2,350 00. Expenditures, total amount, \$1,839 00, leaving a balance on hand (Feb. 8), of \$510 00. An ordinance passed making it the duty of the Town Marshal to make complaint for any and all violations of town ordinances coming to his knowledge, the same to be posted in at least three public places in the town. The Recorder laid before the Board the returns of the election of today, which was opened and examined, and declared as follows: For Trustees, J. A. Wilson, John Bilger, N. Fisher, David Linn, and H. V. Helms; for Recorder, U. S. Hayden; for Treasurer, Henry Pape; for Marshal, James P. McDaniel; for Street Commissioner, Peter Boschey. Certificates of election were ordered issued to each officer elect. Ordered that the inspectors and clerks of election be paid \$5 each, and \$15 is appropriated for same.

Adjourned to Thursday, 15th inst.
