

A short time ago, says the Statesman, the Oregon Herald made the following positive and reckless statement in relation to the matter of the Willamette Falls Canal and Lock improvements: "No Company ever offered to do such a work as is now provided for by law, and is now in process of construction at the Falls of the Willamette, for the sum of one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars."

We immediately published the offer made in writing by the P. T. Company, to do exactly the same work for \$125,000. The Herald then, having nothing better to do, took up and discussed at great length another and different proposition submitted by the P. T. Company, and claimed to have completely disproved our proposition. Two or three times since, it has distinctly affirmed the statement which it made, and which have been quoted above. We happened to know that the P. T. Company did make the offer, and that the Herald had ignorantly or willfully made a false statement. As it persists in its after the proof has been made, we may just as well go through the matter at once and saw the Herald and Gov. Grover's misrepresentations right through the middle. Here is a statement of the facts, made by Mr. A. A. McCully, President of the People's Transportation Company. It destroys all chance for equivocation for the future:

Asa A. McCully, of Salem, Oregon, being duly sworn, deposes and says: That House Bill, No. 10, providing for the construction of locks around the Falls of the Willamette, and appropriating one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars, was drafted and submitted to several prominent members of both political parties. The bill was examined by Hon. W. F. Alexander, (who favored the proposition as against that of the Willamette Falls Canal and Lock Co.) and Hon. Geo. R. Peim, both Democratic members of the House of Representatives, and after making sundry amendments thereto, at the recommendation and request of Mr. Alexander, it was presented to the House by him on the 28th day of September, 1870; he having as a former senator introduced a similar bill favoring the P. T. Company.

The interviews had with Messrs. Alexander and Peim, were held at the office of the People's Transportation Company in Salem, and that, at said interviews, drawings and specifications with estimates in detail, made from actual surveys by Geo. H. Elden, a practical civil engineer, were exhibited and examined by them; that the bill thus prepared, after its introduction into the House by Mr. Alexander, and upon its second reading, was upon his own motion, referred to a select committee of five, himself chairman; and, although often requested and urged to report the same back to the House, he failed to make any report, and as I verily believe never reported it, but retained it in his possession.

When Senate Bill, No. 12 appropriating two hundred thousand dollars to the Willamette Falls Canal and Lock Company, was before the House for consideration, the People's Transportation Company finding their bill thus rejected and virtually defeated, made a direct proposition in writing, proposing to construct locks around the Falls of the Willamette of the same character as is now provided for by law, to the sum of one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars—seventy thousand dollars less than was actually voted to the Willamette Falls Canal and Lock Company. Or, in other words, proposed in the Legislature to take the same bill then pending in favor of the Canal and Lock Company, and amend by striking out the name of the "Willamette Falls Canal and Lock Co." wherever it occurred, and insert "People's Transportation Co." and to further amend by inserting one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars in place of two hundred thousand dollars, and allowing the locks to be constructed on the east side of the west side. The P. T. Co. had secured the right of way on the east side by purchase, and also by ordinance of the City Council of Oregon City, and being their intention, at the time the right of way was obtained, to construct locks, within their own means. They also owned the undeveloped half of the west side franchise, which they subsequently sold to one of the directors of the Willamette Falls Canal and Lock Co., that the right of way might be perfected.
