**Election Laws.**  
The following communication be-  
tween Hon. B. F. Dowell and Capt. J.  
M. McCall, will throw some light on  
the qualifications of electors:

JACKSONVILLE, OREGON, }  
May 18th, 1866. }  
CAPT. J. M. McCALL-DEAR SIR:  
Your favor, making inquiries who of  
the soldiers can vote at the election in  
June, is received. The most material  
part of our Constitution on the subject  
is obscure and indefinite, and the Leg-  
islature, if possible, have made it more  
indefinite and uncertain how the Courts  
will decide it; but I am of the opinion  
all the soldiers who were residents of  
Oregon six months prior to the time of  
their enlistment may vote;—  
1st, For Congressman, Governor,  
Secretary of State, and Treasurer.

2d, All those who were residents of  
the State six months, and 15 days in  
Jackson or Josephine counties before  
the time of their enlistment, may vote  
for all the above officers, and for Prose-  
cuting Attorney and Judge of this Ju-  
dicial District.

3. All who were residents of this State  
six months and fifteen days in this  
county prior to their enlistment may  
vote for all the foregoing officers,  
and for members of the Legislature.  
This proposition is a disputed question;  
but I think the members of the Legisla-  
ture are clearly within the spirit and  
meaning of the constitution—State  
offices and not county offices. They  
make laws for the whole State, as much  
as they do for Jackson county. If  
they were only county officers the  
Legislature would have no right to  
make a joint member from two coun-  
ties nor a joint Senator. This has al-  
ways been done. If the members  
of the Legislature are State offi-  
cers, any person qualified to vote  
can cast his vote for the members of  
the Legislature in any precinct in the  
county.

The Constitution declares "no per-  
son shall be deemed to have gained or  
lost a residence while employed in the  
service of the United States, or of this  
State." This clause clearly includes  
the officers and soldiers of the United  
States; and all who resided six months  
in this State and fifteen days in the  
county prior to their enlistment are  
entitled to vote for Congressmen and  
all State officers, at any precinct in this  
county. Article 2d, section 2 and sec-  
tion 17 reads as follows:

Sec. 2. In all elections, not other-  
wise provided for by this constitution,  
every white male citizen of the United  
States, of the age of twenty-one years  
and upwards, who shall have resided  
in the state during the six months im-  
mediately preceding such election—  
and every white male of foreign birth  
of the age of twenty-one years and  
upwards, who shall have resided in the  
United States one year, and shall have  
resided in this state during the six  
months immediately preceding such  
election, and shall have declared his  
intention to become a citizen of the  
United States one year preceding such  
election, conformably to the laws of  
the United States, on the subject of  
naturalization, shall be entitled to vote  
at all elections authorized by law.

Sec. 17. All qualified electors shall  
vote in the election precinct in the  
county where they may reside, for  
county officers, and in any county in  
the state for state officers, or in any  
county of a congressional district in  
which such electors may reside, for  
members of congress.

4th. The ambiguity is in the last  
section. Let us examine this clause  
more particularly: It is very clear:  
1st, That all qualified electors shall

vote in the election precinct in the  
county where they may reside for  
county officers.

It is equally as clearly declared they  
may vote "in any county in the State  
for State officers" in this election; but  
this is not the intention. The whole  
constitution must be construed  
together. Article 4 section 2 says  
that the legislative authority of the  
State shall be vested in the legislative  
assembly, which shall consist of a sen-  
ate and house of representatives. Ar-  
ticle 4th section 3d of the Constitution  
declares:

The Senators and representa-  
tives shall be chosen by the electors  
of the respective counties or dis-  
tricts into which the state may from  
time to time be divided by law.

And section 7 of article 4 also pro-  
vides, A senatorial district, when  
more than one county shall con-  
stitute the same, shall be composed of  
contiguous counties, and no county  
shall be divided in creating senatorial  
districts.

Judges and Prosecuting Attorneys  
are required to be elected by the qual-  
ified voters of the District. Article 7  
section 1 says: "The Supreme Court  
shall consist of four Justices to be  
chosen in districts by the electors  
thereof;" and section 17 of the same  
article is in these words:

There shall be elected by districts  
comprised of one or more counties, a  
sufficient number of prosecuting attor-  
neys, who shall be the law officers of  
the state, and of the counties within  
their respective districts, and shall per-  
form such duties pertaining to the ad-  
ministration of law and general police,  
as the legislative assembly may direct.

Thus it appears from these different  
parts of our Constitution that the Gov-  
ernor, Secretary of State, Treasurer  
of the State, Judges of the Supreme  
Court, Prosecuting Attorneys, and  
members of the Legislature are all  
State officers, and as such may be  
voted for in any precinct in this coun-  
ty.

5th. From the whole tenor of the  
Constitution and laws, I conclude the  
electors must vote in the precinct  
where he resides for county officers—  
such as Sheriff, Clerk, Treasurer, As-  
sessor, School Superintendent, and Jus-  
tices of the Peace, &c., and before any  
man can vote for these officers he must  
reside six months in the State and 15  
days in the county.

[This letter was written while Mr.  
Dowell was Prosecuting Attorney, and  
he says after an experience of six years  
he has had no cause to change his  
opinion, nor to correct a word in his  
letter, except the law now requires  
90 days residence in the precinct to  
authorize any man to vote for county  
officers.]

**TREATMENT OF SMALL POX.**—In view of the  
reappearance of small pox on this coast, this  
item may be of use:  
"A great discovery is said to have been re-  
cently made by a surgeon of the British army  
in China, in the way of an effectual remedy for  
small pox. The mode of treatment is as fol-  
lows: When the preceding fever is at its  
height, and just before the eruption appears, the  
chest is rubbed with croton oil and tartaric  
ointment. This causes the whole of the erup-  
tion to appear on that part of the body to the  
relief of the rest. It also secures a full and  
complete eruption, and thus prevents the dis-  
ease from attacking the internal organs. This  
is now the established mode of treatment in the  
English army in China, and is regarded as a  
perfect cure."

**Too Thin.**  
The *New Northwest* says: Grover  
& Co. now says that the lumber re-  
cently purchased by them is to be used  
for scaffolding. Just think of it—nearly  
one million feet of lumber to be used  
for that purpose! That explanation is  
entirely too thin. Just say you wanted  
to swindle the State, gentlemen, there-  
by getting back some of the corruption  
money you are using, you will tell the  
truth.

**THE WHEAT CROP.**—From private  
sources we learn that the wheat crop  
in all parts of the State promises well.  
In some places the fields look extraor-  
dinary fine, and in none is there a pros-  
pect of a decline on the yield of any  
preceding year. The very favorable  
season we are having and the large ad-  
ditional acreage sown to wheat this  
year, will give Oregon the largest  
yield of grain by nearly one-fourth  
that she has ever had.—*Farmer.*

**OUR ON FAY.**  
We clip the following from the  
*Democratic Review* of May 25th:  
We have in our possession, a letter  
from Senator Kelly, written to a prom-  
inent Democrat in this town, from  
which we take the following extract:  
PORTLAND, OREGON,  
Oct. 23, 1870.

It would  
require too much writing to give you  
a full statement of all Fay's doings  
during the session of the Legislative  
Assembly. Suffice it to say that he  
was from the first day of the session—  
indeed, for that matter, long before  
the session commenced, imbued with  
the spirit of disorganization. Because  
he could not rule he attempted to ruin.  
I am, however, to say, that the  
ruin has fallen upon himself alone. His  
overweening ambition, and longing  
desire to be elected U. S. Senator,  
prompted him to espouse that cause  
which has rendered him obnoxious to  
censure everywhere among true Demo-  
crats. There can be no doubt that he  
sought an alliance with the Republi-  
cans to defeat my election. He had,  
I have been informed, for several  
days prior to my election, tried every  
way to induce a sufficient number of  
Democrats to remain out of a caucus  
of their party, and unite with the Re-  
publicans in order to elect himself.  
Of course he now denies the charge,  
but of the truth of it I entertain no  
doubt whatever, and moreover it can  
be established by any number of wit-  
nesses, if it be desirable to do so. Fay  
is dead, politically, in Oregon, do  
what, or say what he may, to retrieve  
his lost standing and his lost honor.  
My only regret is that he has another  
term yet to serve in the State Senate,  
and that he may give us some trouble  
two years hence. Injure us, however,  
he cannot, for his treason to the party  
is too well known.

**Tom Howard's Defalcation.**

The papers from Northern Oregon  
give accounts of the defalcation and  
absconding of Tom Howard, the Dem-  
ocratic Sheriff of Grant county. His  
defalcation is greater than the largest

The *Portland Bulletin* says:  
Tom Howard, Democratic Sheriff of  
Grant county for six years, and lately  
renominate by his party for another  
term, has absconded the State and left

and embezzlements. The *Portland*  
*Herald* is the Democratic organ, of  
this city—one of the leading organs of  
Grover, Teal and John F. Miller. It  
has known of Howard's conduct, for  
days. It has not yet said one word in  
regard to it. The *Herald* professes to  
be shocked at Malleassance in office—  
when the accused are Republicans!  
But it was nothing to say when Dem-  
ocrats are the rogues! It suppresses  
the facts of Tom Howard's rascality,  
will it not also suppress what it knows  
of the rascality of the Ring who con-  
trol it? Of course it will;—it does!  
The "Vigilante" organ is the "Rogue's

A Salt Lake dispatch says: The  
Mormon Conference met to-day in the  
morning and afternoon. About eight  
thousand persons, including a large  
number of Gentiles, were present.  
Brigham Young discoursed at length.  
He thanked God for being permitted  
to be with his people again, and hoped  
the time would come when he might  
have an opportunity before a court of  
justice to prove the falsity of the  
charges against him. He defied all  
the people of the world to show any  
sign against his moral character. He  
was glad that neither he nor his breth-  
ren had the power of God before they  
had the wisdom to use it, or they  
might be led to destroy all their en-  
emies. He should demand from those  
who had been prosecuting him all pa-  
pers connected with the cases, that  
they might know positively who their  
prosecutors were. He praised the de-  
puty marshal who had him in charge,  
denounced the lawyers, scolded the  
saints, who had not paid their tithing  
promptly, and finally, with his bless-  
ing, closed the Conference here until  
October.
