THE STAMP TAXES.—The Act of
Congress recently passed for reducing
the customs duties and internal re-
venue taxes, repeals all the taxes im-
posed by stamps under Schedule B of
section 170 of the Act of June 30th,
1864, and the several Acts amendatory
thereof, excepting only the tax of two
cents on bank checks, drafts or orders;
the legal instruments released from the
necessity of being stamped are as fol-
lows: Agreements, bills of exchange
or promissory notes, bills of lading,
bills of sale, bonds of every descrip-
tion, certificates of stock, certificates
of profits, certificates of damage, cer-
tificates of deposit, charter parties, con-
veyances, entries at Custom House
insurance policies, leases, manifests,
mortgages, passage tickets, powers of
attorney for any purpose, probates of
wills, protests of notes and protests of
marine losses. This repeal of the
stamp tax goes into effect on and after
October 1st, 1872.

DANGERS OF VACCINATION.—Last
February, the town of Hartland, Wis-
consin, determined on a general vac-
cination. One hundred and seventeen
persons were inoculated, and in six
hours, every one was deathly sick with
symptoms of poisoning. Three only
had died, at our advice; it was hoped
the rest would recover. The cause of
this phenomenon is a mystery. The
supposition is, that there was some con-
stitutional disease in the person from
whom the matter was taken; or it may
have undergone some poisonous change
afterward. It seems to establish the
fact that, sometimes, there is danger in
vaccination. —*Pac. Jour. of Health.*

Eastern News.

SOUTH BEND, June 19.—Vice Presi-
dent Colfax and family arrived here
yesterday. He was serenaded this
evening. Over a thousand citizens
marched in a body to his residence.
In response to repeated calls he ap-
peared and spoke a few minutes, ex-
pressing his gratitude to friends and
neighbors for the kind reception and
for the confidence they had always
placed in him. Referring to his de-
feat at Philadelphia, he said it was not
due to any personal feeling against
him, but because the majority thought
another the strongest man; and prin-
ciples are everything, men nothing.
He had always been his motto, and he did
not regret the decision made. He
would labor for the success of the party,
and hoped to rejoice with them in
its success in October and November.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Our Gov-
ernment has not objected and does not
propose to object to the postponement
of the arbitration at Geneva, as desired
by Great Britain. It thinks it will
lose nothing by giving the Queen a
pretext for withdrawing from the ar-
bitration. It is considered to be with-
in the power of the Tribunal to grant
a postponement for a reasonable time,
or until the Senate again meets in reg-
ular course to act on such modifica-
tions of the amended additional article
to the Treaty as may be proposed by
Britain. An extra session will be
called, but in the meantime nothing
will be done on our part to occasion
the failure of the Treaty. No fears
are now entertained in that direction.
There is no information to warrant the
conclusion that efforts to adjust the
differences will be ineffectual.

NEW HAVEN (Ct.), June 20.—The
delegates to the Baltimore Convention
met here to-day. Though pledged to
no candidates, the expression was
unanimous in favor of Greeley and
Brown.

LOUISVILLE (Ky.), June 20.—The
Democratic State Convention met at
Frankfort to-day and elected delegates
to the Baltimore Convention instruc-
tion to unite all the elements of opposi-
tion to Grant. The delegates are all
in favor of Greeley and Brown.

OMAHA, June 20.—The Democratic
State Convention met at Lincoln to-day,
and adopted resolutions endorsing the
Cincinnati Convention. The delegates
appointed to Baltimore were instruc-
ted to act in accordance with the will
of the Convention.

PORTLAND, June 20.—Olympia pa-
pers say that it is rumored there and
in other places on the Sound that the
Secretary of the Interior has notified
the Northern Pacific Railroad Com-
pany that as soon as they complete their
railroad to the waters of the Sound, at
any point, it will be regarded as the
terminus, and the land grants will
cease. In consequence of this, the
Company will build to Bellingham
Bay before approaching the waters of
the Sound, and build branch roads af-
terwards to Olympia, Seattle and other
points.

NEW YORK, June 20.—A World
special from London says more has
been accomplished at the Geneva Tri-
bunal than is allowed in public; that at
the next meeting of the Board it will
be announced that the question of in-
direct claims will be settled by the
arbitrators.

VIENNA, June 13.—Gen. Sherman is
here and was presented to the Emperor
to-day. He dines to-night with Count
Andrassy. He goes to Paris soon,
where Lt. Gran joins him.

COPENHAGEN, June 13.—The World's
Fair was opened here to-day by King
Christian.

Even Tipton has gone back on Gree-
ley. He says: "A great mistake was
made in holding the Cincinnati Con-
vention so early; it ought to have
been called to meet after the Philadel-
phia Convention." Wouldn't it have
been still better to have called it after
the election in November?

Hon. George W. Julian says in a
letter to a friend: "The action of the
convention at Cincinnati shows that it
will not fully meet the demands of
the hour. The penitence of Mr. Julian
is a little late, but is likely to be abid-
ing. The calf set up by the Liberal
Aaron is not likely to have many wor-
shippers when the Moses of the Re-
publican party appears.
