

Speech of a Democrat on Grant.
At the late ratification meeting in New Haven, Connecticut, on the nomination of Grant and Wilson, Thomas B. Bond, a distinguished citizen of that State, spoke as follows:

What is the corner-stone of the Greeley party? Simply anti-Grantism. This is the alpha and omega of it, and what is the reason? Why, men hungered from long exclusion from power and wanted meat; they are disappointed, ambitious, and seek power from voting for Greeley. They are out of meat and are determined to get it if they sacrifice party, country and principle to get in. Here is the whole story of the Democratic party in a nutshell.

Carl Schurz, on taking the chair at Cincinnati, said we want a man not so much for honesty alone, but of superior wisdom. Let us select our best man. General Grant was nominated for his availability for the service he rendered his country, and he was elected four years ago, and will be again in 1872. Is Horace Greeley a statesman, a safe landmark, a sure guide? Would he make a safe and sagacious President of this nation? Horace Greeley is a politician. Is he competent to be a leader? Has he sound judgment? Now, if I have got to choose between Horace Greeley and U. S. Grant, I choose U. S. Grant. I know him, all his faults and virtues, when I vote for him I know what I am doing, but when I vote for Mr. Greeley I don't know anything about him. I am going to vote for the genuine article, U. S. Grant. I don't stand here as his advocate or apologist, but you will permit me as a Democrat to say one thing, the country was never more prosperous than during his administration. Trade is prosperous everywhere. Labor commands its price. Our treasure is full. Our credit excites surprise. Wealth is pouring in upon us from all lands. We are diminishing our debt at the rate of a hundred millions a year. This is the greatest and best government in the world, not in the army and navy, but under Republican rule, its liberty, wealth and prosperity. But somebody says look at our prostrated commerce. But what caused it. It is the adoption of the principle of free trade for commerce, and protection for manufactured article. This ruins our commerce. You ask me if I changed my opinion. Well, I answer, I have. I was brought up at the feet of those Whigs, Henry Clay and Daniel Webster, and I still believe in their teachings, but in some things I have changed. I say in the words of Webster, wise men sometimes change their opinions, fools never. That man has made a deep impression in the character of the nation. The speaker closed with a touching allusion to the act of Grant in returning Lee's sword to him at the close of the war, as a token that the war was at an end and peace would evermore be over the country, a scene which gives to Grant's name an immortality, and by appealing to the young men who fought the battles of the war to support the present administration.
