DEATH OF HON. WM. H. SEWARD.

HON. WILLIAM H. SEWARD died at his residence in Auburn, New York, on Thursday, October 10th, in the 72d year of his age. From the Portland Morning Bulletin we copy the following biographical sketch of the "Great Secretary," as also the remarks of the editor in connection therewith:

"Mr. Seward was born in the town of Florida, Orange county, New York, May 16, 1801. He was liberally educated and studied law under two of the ablest and profoundest of the eminent lawyers of New York City, John Duer and Ogden Hoffman (father of Judge Hoffman of the United States District Court of San Francisco). At the Bar he won much distinction, especially in criminal practice. He was Chairman of the Young Men's Adams Convention in 1828 in his native State, next joined the anti-Masonic party, by whom he was chosen to the State Senate, and subsequently he allied his political fortunes with the Whig party of Henry Clay. He was defeated for Governor of New York in 1834 by Wm. L. Marcy, but in 1838 he was elected to that high station, and was the first Whig Governor of the Empire State. His re-election followed in 1842, and in 1846 he declined a re-nomination. He did not enter public life again in the way of office until 1849, when he was chosen as an United States Senator. He opposed Know Nothingism in 1855, as he had Native Americanism in 1844, and his re-election followed on the expiration of his first term. On the inauguration of Abraham Lincoln as President in 1861, Mr. Seward entered the Cabinet as Secretary of State, and he continued in that position until the close of Andrew Johnson's administration. Since then he completed a tour of nearly the whole United States, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and Oregon and Washington Territory and Alaska were especial objects of his memorable tour. Thence he visited Mexico, and on his return from that country sailed from San Francisco on a tour of the globe. Japan, China, the Indies, thence across to the Mediterranean and through all Europe, he journeyed, and by every sovereign and reigning potentate, and by all classes of the people, from royalty and nobility to the gentry and humblest, he was received with distinguished consideration and honored and feted and lionized as no citizen or other had ever been before. He returned to his native State, and in his peaceful Auburn home he sat himself down to sweet retirement for the closing days of his most eventful life. There he was some time ago stricken with paralysis which impaired his body but not his mind, and up to a very brief time back he was busily engaged upon an elaborate and extended history of his tour of the globe, and in preparation for a faithful history of his whole lifetime.

Mr. Seward was one of the most remarkable men of this age, and his name and fame will forever occupy a conspicuous place in the history of the world. He was among the great founders of the Republican party, and in its earliest campaigns his notable utterances were its watchwords and his mottoes its battle cry. More than any other one man he framed its principles and moulded its policy. Twice he strove for the nomination as President at its hands, and each time others bore away the coveted prize. But like Henry Clay, with the old Whig party, he at last soared above the ambition to be President, and preferred to be recognized as the foremost leader of his party, as he was in fact during the war the most influential among those who shaped the destiny of the Nation in that momentous struggle between the warring sections. We have not space here to enumerate his many victories in the field of diplomacy over the most accomplished of the veteran statesmen of Europe, nor to sketch the various very important services he performed in the cause of the Union at home. They are embalmed and preserved in up-to-date history, and will be ever recalled with grateful emotion by his admiring countrymen. He was among the most uncompromising, earnest and effective antagonists to Slavery, and the institution received from him death dealing blows. He was the author of the Higher Law doctrine which first shook the system, and anti-Fugitive Slave laws, if not his own, were drafted from his models.

He has passed from earth to the life beyond, and the memory of only his virtues will be enduringly preserved. He had filled a large place in the record of his country's most extraordinary services, and he has gone down to the grave mourned by millions of his countrymen. The Nation, though not unprepared to hear any day of the sad event, has been shocked by the announcement of his death. The world will join in the universal sorrow, for his fame had spread throughout every land and among every people. And in those far Northwestern climes, from the Columbia to the Yukon, the multitudes will bow in grief as the word spreads that Seward is dead! Rest his ashes everlastingly in peace.

NOTABLE DEATHS.—The telegraph says "Fanny Fern" (Mrs. J. A. Fenton) died in New York City, October 11th. Also that Jas. B. Spalding, founder of the New York World, died in Dover, N. H., on the same day.
