S. GRANT.

THE SCHOOL LAW.

For the first time in the history of Oregon legislation we have enacted a school law vouchsafing to the children of the State three months free school in each year.

It will be remembered that in 1868 the citizens of Jackson county petitioned the Legislature, asking that body to enact a law whereby each school district could maintain a free school for two quarters in each year. A bill to accomplish that result was introduced, but was too humane a provision to stand the assaults of that Democratic Legislature. In 1870 a similar bill was introduced, but found the azoic Democracy still in power with all its barbarous proclivities. Of course it met with defeat a second time, as it would have the third and for all time to come if that party could have kept in the ascendancy. But during the last session of the Legislature a bill was introduced into the House by Mr. Collier, providing for a six month free school. The House having a Republican majority, passed the bill; but the Senate being a tie, the bill was so amended and cut down by the Democrats as to provide for three instead of six months. But three months school is better than none. It is still a matter of doubt whether this law can be enforced, as the Democratic members prevented the election of a Superintendent of Public Instruction, as the law provides, and whose special duty it is to enforce its provisions, by succeeding from the Legislature, and thereby disqualifying it from closing business. We still trust that there will be some plan devised to make the law effective, and that its enlightened provisions may not be altogether lost.

VETOED.—It is reported that Gov. Grover has vetoed the bills creating a Board of Immigration and repealing the Litigant Act. That he should have so done in the latter case is not at all surprising, as it was the life-blood of nearly all the Democratic organs in the State; but why he should veto the former is not so easily explained, as it was understood to have been one of his pet measures, passed at his implied suggestion, free from political bias, and calculated to do much good to the State. But spite works strange freaks, and "white man mighty onartian," as well as some other folks.

EXPIRED.—The *Democratic Era*, published at East Portland in this State, has ceased publication. It was one of the neatest papers in the State, but Greeleyism was too heavy a dose for its stomach. In its expiring groan the publisher severely commented upon the lack of enterprise in the people of that town, and threw up the sponge in disgust. We dislike to fire a Parthian shot, but cannot help thinking that as old a newspaper man as the publisher of the *Era* is, ought to have known better than to rely upon such a slender support as could be expected from such a slim-waisted thing as the Greeley party of this campaign.

HAVEN'T SEEN HER.—The Portland *Bulletin* has a long sensation local item about a woman who muzzled a butcher in that city for her lost husband, and wouldn't take no nor any proof for a denial, and says she left there for Jacksonville, where she has relatives residing. Isn't that another *Herald* ghost canard? Haven't heard of any such lady about here.

THE ELECTION.

The Presidential election comes off before another issue of the *SENTINEL*. That President Grant will be again chosen, there is no room for doubt. It is only left, as a matter of conjecture, what his majority will be, but it is conceded by the candid of both parties that it will be overwhelming. Notwithstanding the certainty of his election, we as earnestly call upon every voter to cast his vote for the savior of our nation in the dark days of the rebellion, as we would insist that every individual should be truthful and act honestly, that his deeds might be a source of happy reflection in the future. It is not enough that fifteen out of the twenty men composing a community are honest; neither is it enough that a large majority of the people composing this nation are patriotic, and devoted to the best interests of the country. As the whole is greater than a part, so would the combined influence of all parties, working harmoniously together to attain the same end, be more powerful in the right. However strong we may be in the cause of truth, justice and humanity we cannot afford to lose the strength of any.

Let no Republican disgrace himself and children by crawling back into the dark after he has heroically fought his way to the light of Republicanism. The result of twelve years' struggle over many a well-fought battle-field is worth preserving. A million and a half of America's noblest sons sacrificed their lives that Republicanism might live. We appeal to Democrats to come up higher. They have eaten dirt quite long enough. They have tried corruption and it has defiled them. We now remind them that sin has lost its charms, and that justice is in the ascendancy. Why follow in their blind career longer when there is no earthly hope of success?

A majority of mankind have been aroused to the fact that heroic actions and noble deeds constitute the most enduring foundation of all earthly honor and immortality. Thousands of Democrats have had the heroism and manliness to acknowledge the error of their ways, have cast off the Democratic shell, and are now counted among the champion advocates of the enlightened principles of Republicanism. "It's human to err," but noble to retract.

Under a recent ruling of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, each applicant for the purchase of the public domain under the Pre-emption, Homestead or other Agricultural laws, is required to make the following non-mineral affidavit:

I,....., being duly sworn according to law, depose and says that he is the identical..... who is an applicant for Government title to the.....; that he is well acquainted with the character of said described land, and with each and every legal subdivision thereof, having frequently passed over the same; that his knowledge of said land is such as to enable him to testify understandingly with regard thereto; that there is not, to his knowledge, within the limits thereof, any vein or lode of quartz or other rock in place, bearing gold, silver, cinnabar, lead, tin, or copper, or any deposit of coal; that there is not within the limits of said land, to his knowledge, any placer, cement, gravel, or other valuable mineral deposit; that no portion of said land is worked for mineral during any part of the year by any person or persons; that said land is essentially non-mineral land, and that his application therefor is not made for the purpose of fraudulently obtaining title to mineral land, but with the object of securing said land for agricultural purposes.

Subscribed and sworn to before me this..... day of....., 1872, and I hereby certify that the foregoing affidavit was read to the said..... previous to his name being subscribed thereto; and that deponent is a respectable person to whose affidavit full faith and credit should be given.

STATE ITEMS.

Trains now run regularly to Roseburg, on the O. & C. Railroad.

Augusta postoffice, in Baker county, has been discontinued.

Ice formed on water in the open air at Corvallis more than a week ago.

Senator Corbett leaves for Washington immediately after the Presidential election.

There is an heir-loom meerschaum pipe in Portland claimed to be more than 80 years old.

Has the *Bulletin* become a "litigant organ?" We see its columns contain legal advertisements.

The bill providing for the ballot system of voting was approved by the Governor, Oct. 19, and goes into immediate effect.

A couple of boys residing near Eugene recently killed nineteen geese at three shots, and sold them all at fifty cents apiece.

T. Ezertan Hogg has been appointed by Governor Grover as one of the Commissioners to attend the International Exposition at Vienna in May, 1873.

A courtesan was found dead in Portland a few days ago, kneeling at her bedside with her hands clasped in an attitude of prayer. Probably a death-bed repentance.

Travelers and papers all say that the new town of Oakland, on the line of the railroad, has completely killed the old town of that name a short distance from the road.

Major Simeon Francis, an old resident of Oregon, and Army Paymaster of the Department of the Columbia, died in Portland a few days since, at the age of 76.

A young man named John Fanning had his hand so badly bruised by the machinery of a horse mill used for sawing wood in Albany a few days ago, that amputation at the wrist was necessary.

The Legislative doorkeepers drew their little \$200 for services rendered during the forty days session. Members only got \$120 for the same time. But then it's worth something to be boss, you know.

Gov. Grover vetoed the litigant bill on the ground that his commission to publishers was a franchise which held good during his term of office, and the Legislature had no right or authority to interfere with it.

Mrs. Edith O'Gorman, the "Escaped Nun," has arrived in Portland, and the papers of that city are begging the people in advance not to disturb her in her lectures. They seem to fear a repetition of the San Francisco trouble, while she simply says "strike, but hear me."

Appended to a ticket published as an advertisement in the Portland *Bulletin* is the name of H. K. Hanna of Jackson county, as an O'Connor and Adams Elector. Bound to have some glory, anyhow, if that article can be extracted from defeat. This is the third O'Connor ticket we've heard of in Oregon.

Senator Corbett publishes a lengthy address in the Portland dailies calling upon the people of Oregon to be true to themselves and their interests on Tuesday next by voting for Grant and Wilson. The address is eloquent and argumentative, and well worthy of its author, and but for its great length we should be glad to publish it.

The Dalles *Mountaineer* of Saturday last says that Hon. Joseph G. Wilson, member elect from Oregon to the 43d Congress, was to leave for the Atlantic States on Monday last. He does not take his seat until after the 4th of next March, but intends visiting Washington during the coming Winter for the purpose of seeing how things are done there, and also to transact a considerable amount of official business with the different Departments which has been entrusted to him by parties there.

The table of school statistics of the State, for the year ending April 1st, 1872, show the following result: The total number of persons in the State, over four and under twenty years of age is 36,512; of these 18,724 are males and 17,788 are females. The average attendance at the schools throughout the State is 12,120. The number of teachers in the State is 198; to whom was paid the sum of \$68,097.32, of which \$61,812.09 came from the State and county funds. The total number of legal voters in the State is 16,208.

A NEW PAPER.—We do not "rise to explain," for that would be a trick that's vain, but we do apologize for not noticing the advent among us of that neat little paper the *Crescent City Courier*, which we have received to the fifth number. It is a very neatly printed, well-edited 24-column sheet, published weekly at Crescent City, by Walter B. Thorpe, and "stands in" with Grant and Wilson like a true blue. We wish it every success attainable to the craft and the sanctum, and welcome it to our table.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

OCT. 26.—A terrible horse disease prevails throughout the Eastern and Middle States. In New York the disease has spread to every stable in the city, and hacks, drays, &c., were almost laid aside. In Boston the omnibus lines had stopped, and the street railways were seriously impeded. The same is the case in Buffalo, Portland, Me., and other large cities, and the disease had even reached St. Louis and Chicago.

The Tweed-Tammany trial was in progress on the 26th. Tweed says he intends to fight his case through to a conclusion, and complains that he is compelled to bear the offences of every man charged with the same offence.

A Washington dispatch says: The attention of the State Department is called to the abuse persisted in on the part of the petty German States in transporting pardoned murderers and highway robbers to this country. It is urged that the Secretary should interfere promptly to arrest this practice.

It having been reported that the President would soon issue a proclamation recognizing the belligerency of Cuba, he personally denies the statement, and says in addition that no such subject had ever been discussed by the Cabinet.

At a political meeting in New York City on the evening of the 26th, some unknown persons upset a chimney on the crowd and killed several persons. William Clarke, a negro who committed a rape on a young white married woman in Cumberland, Delaware, has been sentenced to death.

The temperance people of Illinois announce their intention to put a strict temperance ticket in the field for Legislators, and the subject is engrossing public attention throughout the State. Eighty-nine boxes of dead Chinamen were shipped from San Francisco to China one day last week.

Mrs. Fair has refused to pay her attorney for defending her in her late trouble, and he has commenced suit against her for his fee, in all \$8,075.

Gen. Maxwell, Gentile candidate for Delegate to Congress from Utah, has served notice on his Mormon opponent, Canon, that he intends to contest the election.

Snow fell to the depth of several inches on the mountains around Winemucca, on the 26th ult.

OCT. 27.—Minister Washburne says he came from Paris to vote for Grant and take part in the campaign, and will return to France as soon as possible. It was reported that his return was a recall, but this seems to be an error.

The "National" Democracy of New York have nominated John McCool for Mayor.

Nearly all the whiskey and beer saloons in Chicago are closed by law, Mayor Medill declaring that "he knows no influence but the laws" and will enforce them until repealed.

The horse epidemic in New York city is rapidly abating. Oxen were at one time used on the street railway in Broadway, and caused quite a sensation. The disease seems to remain but a short time in a place, but as it begins to abate in one place it appears in another, and has visited almost all cities in the Middle and New England States.

Considerable excitement is created in Victoria, B. C., by the discovery of rich quartz near that place. Samples are being tested both in Portland and San Francisco.

The police are making it warm for liquor sellers in San Francisco who violate the law by selling spirituous liquors to minors. They have about broken up gambling, and are now going after those who helped the gamblers.

Judge Lunderback of San Francisco has been giving the hoodlums of that city a "rough deal," and their friends stuff his mail box with threatening letters. He don't scare much.

OCT. 29.—It having been reported that a change of the Indian policy was contemplated by the President, Geo. H. Stewart addressed a letter to the President which elicited a denial of the truth of the report. In the course of his remarks the President said:

"If the policy toward the Indians can be improved in any way I will always be ready to receive suggestions on the subject, but if any change is made it must be on the side of civilization and christianization of the Indians. I do not believe our Creator ever placed different races of men on this earth with the view of having the stronger exert all its energies in exterminating the weaker."

It is reported in San Francisco that Greeley has withdrawn from the Presidential contest.

The horse disease still continues to annoy the hack and car companies in the Eastern cities by the rapidity of its spread and unavoidable fatality. A gang of roughs made a raid over the border from Texas into Mexico a few days ago, and on the Mexicans attempting to check them several were killed on both sides.

The trial of Mayor Hall for complicity in the Tammany thefts is likely to result in acquittal because of faulty indictments. The Grand Jury is said to have found eighteen more indictments against other parties implicated.

Robert, son of Hon. H. Martin of Yreka, was killed on Friday of last week by a horse throwing him and stepping on his head.

The Presidential campaign in California is very warm, and all the prominent men in the State, on both sides, are on the stump.

"There never was a President who submitted his own will more thoroughly and unreservedly to that of the people; there never was a President who submitted more cheerfully to the adverse action of Congress; there never was a President more unpretending, less exacting, more sincerely anxious to execute the laws and preserve public tranquillity, and discharge fairly and impartially all the duties of his office."
