ASHLAND ACADEMY.—This new educational establishment at our neighboring town of Ashland, under the supervision of Rev. J. H. Skidmore and an able corps of teachers, will open its first term on Monday next, Nov. 4th. In these days of enlightened sentiments, the prosperity of communities is measured by the number and character of their institutions of learning, and the manner in which they are attended, as much as by any other outward evidences of thrift. Intelligent heads of families are as careful of the minds of their children, in seeking new locations, as they are in the search of productive soil or evidences of physical healthfulness, and not infrequently otherwise eligible locations are rejected because of their lack of educational facilities alone. Rev. J. H. Skidmore has admirably combined all these attractions in his selection of the beautiful village of Ashland and the erection of a commodious house of learning. Himself a competent and practical teacher he has fully considered all the points and after great effort is at last ready to put his ideas to the test of practice. We are sorry that we have been unable to pay Ashland the visit the Rev. Professor so kindly tendered us, but will do so as soon as we can find a convenient time, when we will give our readers a full account of Ashland and its surroundings generally, and the Academy in particular.

HOMICIDE IN GOOSE LAKE VALLEY. Andrew Rountree was killed in Goose Lake Valley, on the 2d day of October, by M. L. Smith, who acknowledged to several witnesses that he killed him by striking him with a hoe, and justified himself in the act on the ground that Rountree had assaulted him with a pistol while he was in the field digging potatoes with the hoe. The difficulty grew out of a reported improper intimacy between Smith and Rountree's wife. The deceased went to the field and accused Smith of it, which he denied, and a fight ensued with the result as stated. Mrs. Rountree testified that she had heard her husband threaten the life of defendant. Smith was arrested and taken before Justice E. Tiber of this county, and after a full examination the prisoner was acquitted on the ground of justifiable homicide.

THE CONCERT.—Business prevented us from attending the concert given at Horne's Hall on Thursday evening. We regret our inability to attend, but are assured that it was a rare musical treat, and was enjoyed by a large and appreciative audience. So well was it received that they prevailed upon Prof. Brooks and the musicians to repeat it again at an early day, when we shall attend if possible, for the Professor is master of the charms of music, knows how to bring the harmony of Heaven to earth, and enable one to feelingly understand the force of Beecher's saying that "there's religion in music." The same performances will be given in Ashland to-night.
