

## THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION.

The voice of the people has been heard. The result of the election has a significance that cannot be mistaken or misunderstood. It is a vindication of the people by the people, as well as a vindication of the present Administration. It demonstrates the fact that the people have the ability to manage their own affairs, and to pilot their own ships into harbors of safety, regardless of the advice of party cliques and combinations formed by dishonest and corrupt men to advance their own selfish and mercenary purposes. It is a vindication of the humane and enlightened principles of the great Republican party by those who have lived under their benign influences, and have felt their vitalizing power.

The free schools of our land have robbed hypocrisy of its false colors, and leaves it without a charm for the masses, who constitute a large majority of our young and growing Republic. Deception can no longer win. Lies fall harmless to the ground when uttered among intelligent people. The masses think and reason for themselves, and when men who assume to be leaders depart from the principles they have professed to maintain, and defend and run after strange gods, they but run to drag their lone carcass after them, and when they have reached the end of their race, they have the satisfaction of knowing that but few, if any, have followed in their wake, and that they have put an over-estimate on themselves and an under-estimate of the fidelity of the people to principle. It is principles imbedded in truth and justice that hold the Republican party together. This fact was sufficiently demonstrated in the case of Andrew Johnson, and of Judge Chase, to have warned Greeley and his followers of their fate, but they heeded it not. When Johnson and Chase left the party that exalted them, and attempted to trample upon its principles with disdain, the people ignored them at once, and they very soon found themselves without friends and without a constituency, and entirely shorn of their former power.

The men who have been prominent in the so-called Liberal movement must meet the same inevitable fate. It has already overtaken them, and they stand convicted by the voice of a majority of the people in nearly every State in the Union. The justice of this conviction cannot be questioned; treason to principle cannot be tolerated any more than treason to a Government.

The President, and the party that placed him in power, have been triumphantly sustained; and the patriotic people have determined that peace, order and prosperity shall rule this country for the next four years. Truly, "The voice of the people is the voice of God."

## "CONSTITUTIONAL GROUNDS!"

New York, Nov. 7.—3 P. M.—The Tribune this morning concedes 45,000 majority for Grant in New York. In a card Greeley announces that he has returned to the editorship of the Tribune. The following is the latest and most reliable estimate of returns:

Latest from Missouri, up to noon today, gives Greeley 6,000 majority.

Twenty-nine States give majorities for Grant, aggregating 579,406.

Sixteen marriage licenses were issued by the County Clerk in Salem last month. Just so many more leaps in the dark.

Thos. Mulholland of Hot Springs, Goose Lake Valley, has been commissioned a Notary Public by Governor Grover.

A Mr. R. Baker committed suicide in Albany Oct. 28th because his wife had applied for a divorce. He hung himself.

Gen. Jo Lane has grown too old and feeble to ever again enter the political field as an advocate or contestant. "Time tries all."

The editor of the Eugene Journal has been favored with a photograph of the poet Joaquin Miller, with the autograph and compliments of the "original."

To be fleshy having become fashionable, the Oregonian says several of the damsels of that city indulge in doses of cod liver oil for fattening purposes.

Under the head of "Personals," the Oregonian announces that two vessels are loaded and ready for sea. Of what "person" are they? We can guess the gender.

The Circuit Court Calendar of Multnomah county, for the term commencing Nov. 11th, contains 128 Law and 87 Equity cases. The citizens of that county agree finely.

Portland has started a new enterprise in opposition to, or imitation of, (we don't know which), Chicago. She has now placed on the Court docket twenty-three divorce cases.

The Rustic, published at Empire City, (Coos Bay) Oregon, has this: "Water-melons, squashes, green corn, &c., are the principal eatable attractions at present in the market."

The Oregon Herald says Thomas P. Ward, (colored), convicted of murder in the second degree and in the penitentiary for life, was pardoned by Gov. Grover the other day, on the petition of 57 members of the Legislature.

Andrew Payne was accidentally shot by his father, who mistook him for a deer, while hunting in the mountains in Clackamas county one day last week. Though very severe, the wound is not thought fatal.

A newspaper in Portland advertises that it wants 500 subscribers. We imagine that to be a "want" of general desire among paper men throughout the country, but the Portland man seems more anxious than his contemporaries to hurry up the matter.

The Chinese residents of Portland celebrated one of their pagan holidays called "The Feast of the Dragon," in that city last week. They hired the lower story of the Masonic Temple in which to hold their orgies, and the performance is said to have been gorgeously ridiculous to Christian eyes.

The colored men in Portland had a grand torchlight parade the night before the Presidential election. They wore white capes with the inscription of "Grant Invincible" on them, and bore aloft all kinds of Republican mottoes on banners. As usual they were interlarded with the Democracy, but no disturbance was permitted to deter their parade.

Mrs. Duniway and several other ladies tendered their votes at the election in Portland. After a confab with the judges, which is given at length in the Oregonian, their votes were refused as they would not cast them under a protest, and they retired, Mrs. D. remarking that she "felt sorry for the judges; they were evidently ashamed of the laws they felt compelled to obey."

**A REVOLUTION IN GAS.**—The new portable safety gas light is the nearest thing we have seen, says the Pacific Rural Press, and is calculated to cause an entire revolution in the present system of lighting for domestic purposes. It generates its own gas, which is consumed as soon as generated, thus rendering explosions impossible. It is certainly a desideratum long called for, and will be gladly welcomed by those who have lived in a daily and hourly dread of injury from explosion of the various dangerous inflammable oils in use at this time.

**STAGE ROBBERY.**—The stage on the overland road between Boise City, Idaho, and Kelton, Utah, was stopped near Pleasant Valley Station a few days ago and the passengers robbed of everything. They lost all the way from \$10 to \$4,000. No one was hurt. One lady passenger was unmolested.

## TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

The mint in Philadelphia began, Nov. 2d, to melt up one million one dollar gold pieces to be converted into coin of larger denominations.

The ceremony of unveiling the Walter Scott statue took place in New York City Nov. 2d, in presence of a vast throng. Wm. Cullen Bryant delivered the address.

The horse disease is fast abating in all the Eastern cities, and omnibus and horse car lines have resumed operations in places earliest visited. It continues to spread in the West.

The arrest of Woodhull and Claflin promises to give some idea of how so much obscenity became current through the mails lately.

A restaurant keeper in Washington has been fined \$100 for refusing to entertain colored persons at his establishment.

Great excitement was caused in Havana on receipt of the news of the loss of the steamer Missouri, as many prominent residents of Cuba were on board.

Mexican flags were kept at half-mast for four days in the City of Mexico on the receipt of the news of the death of Seward, and the papers contained lengthy eulogies on the character and abilities of the deceased.

The racers "Goldsmith Maid" and "Lucy" have gone East again.

Immense pressure has been brought to bear on assistant Secretary Cowan, and it is now thought he will consent to act as Indian Commissioner.

Chief Justice Chase's health is so poor that he cannot attend to business. It is thought he will take a trip to the Pacific coast.

The horse disease, which was thought to have spent its force in the East, has developed new and more fatal symptoms, and is causing rapid deaths among horses in many places.

The Japanese Commissioners are examining the school systems generally in the Eastern States, with a view of introducing them into the schools of Japan.

Mayor Hall of New York has charges prepared to commence suit against the Times and Harper Brothers.

New York, Nov. 4.—Several stage companies have brought suit to restrain Bergh from stopping their horses or arresting their drivers. The argument in the case is adjourned till Wednesday. The number of horses on the streets to-day increased, as also the number of street cars.

The United States grand jury indicted Woodhull and Claflin to-day, and thus prevented a hearing before the United States Commissioner. Stephen Pearl Andrews has also been arrested on a charge of being implicated with Woodhull.

In the case of Woodhull and Claflin to-day, bench warrants were served upon them, and bail fixed at \$8,000 each. In default of the same they were remanded to Ludlow street jail to await trial.

In Baltimore, Nov. 3d, out of 80 horses of the street car company only eleven were serviceable. All the rest were down with the horse disease.

Horse cars in Boston were entirely withdrawn, and dispatches from Maine report the disease spreading in that State.

The cholera has appeared in many of the large cities of Germany.

The horse disease has broken out in many of the cities of England, and is especially severe in London.

BERLIN, Nov. 3.—Bismarck, the American Ambassador, soon after the Emperor's decision on the San Juan boundary question, applied to the Foreign office for an account of the expenses incurred by the German Government in the course of the arbitration, with a view of reimbursement. He was informed, in reply, that the German Government had no bill against the United States.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Susan B. Anthony and eight other women went in a body to the polls and presented their ballots which the inspectors received and deposited in the ballot box. Eighteen women were rejected in the same district.

The Brotherton Brothers, on trial for forgery in San Francisco, managed to make their escape from jail, and an aggregate reward of \$10,000 is offered for their recapture.

The election of the 5th was the most quiet ever held in San Francisco. Many arrests were made for violation of the new election law, and many were prevented from voting from inability to reach the polls.

Three times as many three cent stamps are used as of all other denominations combined; after them the one cent, and then the two and six cent.
