From Goose Lake Valley.

By the politeness of A. Tenbrook, Esq., we are furnished with the following information from Goose Lake Valley: The weather had been very stormy for several weeks, but was more pleasant when he left, and bid fair to be a mild, open winter. The cattle are fatter than ever before known at this season of the year, the milch cows being in good killing condition. Throughout that country the farmers have a good supply of hay put up for the winter, in case any should be required. Mr. Tenbrook found the snow about ten inches deep on the Cascade range, when he crossed it a few days since, but was rapidly melting. He arrived here on Thursday last, reports the road in fair condition, and will return in a few days.

SAVING WOOD WITHOUT A SAW.

The *Scientific American* records the change of one of the impossibilities of the past into a reality:

George Robinson, M. D., of New York, has invented a mode of sawing or cutting wood without saw or ax, by electricity. The galvanic current, when passed over platinum wire in sufficient quantity, heats the wire to white heat. This wire, thus heated, does the work of saw or ax, without any appreciable expenditure of muscular force. By arranging the wires with handles, or other means by which it may be guided, any kind of lumber, whether in trees, logs or plank, may be cut out as desired. The battery need be of only the simplest kind, as quantity, not intensity of current, is required. A child, by this means, may tell the largest tree in the forest, divide it into logs, or cut it into boards, without saw or ax. Only think of it! The idea of cutting down a large pine tree with a wire! Some wiseacre stands up and declares: "I don't believe it! It can't be done!" But such should remember that they talked just so when the telegraph was projected. It is another proof that the impossibilities of to-day are the scientific facts of to-morrow.

POWERFUL SMELL.—A Toledo paper tells an amusing story of the acute smell of a tobaccoist in that city. He, together with his clerk, was examining some tobacco submitted for his inspection. After carefully inhaling the flavor by three or four protracted sniffs, he exclaimed to his clerk: "John, can't you smell old leather in that tobacco?" John presented it to his olfactory and said "he thought he could." The chief then smelled again, and thought he could also detect a very slight flavor of maple sugar. The last aroma John pronounced beyond his powers. Samples of leaf tobacco, you know, are taken from each end of the hoghead, and also from the middle. There was found an old boot heel, full of maple pegs! Judgment on "tobacco" from that "individ" is now regarded final.
