OUR PRESIDENTS.

A sharp Presidential contest is now ended, and it may be interesting to look over the past, and inquire into the social standing of former Presidents.

George Washington belonged by birth to the famous class of "Virginia gentlemen." His family ranked among the aristocracy, being connected with the gentry of England. He began life as a surveyor, but gained wealth and position by a marriage with Mrs. Custis, a wealthy and accomplished widow. A story is told of his later years, that a poor Virginian of quality, whom he had reproved, retorted sharply, "I should like to know, George Washington, what you would have been if you hadn't married the widow Custis?" Washington smiled, because the man was poor and unfortunate, but he seldom permitted such liberties.

John Adams was a lawyer, and the son of a farmer and shoemaker, of a family that has been settled in Massachusetts for seven generations. The Adamses are one of the few American families entitled to be called historical. They have won a national reputation for brilliant talents, for eminent services in politics, law, literature, and in statesmanship, and also for wealth, without which no family can long be kept up. No other family can compare with them in the number and rank of public offices they have filled; in ancient Rome they would have been called a Consular family. They are the Adamses of Quincy, and in France Charles Francis Adams would be called M. de Quincy. Quincy is an old Norman name, and appears in the Roll of Battle Abbey. It has only a Territorial relation to the Adamses. The name belongs properly to another great American family descended from an ancestor who was in the battle of Hastings, A. D. 1066.

Thomas Jefferson was a lawyer, and his family held a good, but not high, social rank in Virginia. His attention was attracted to public life by the struggle between the Colonies and England, ending in the Revolution, and he made for himself a great name in history as a legislator, an author, a diplomatist and a political leader.

James Madison was the son of a wealthy Virginia planter, and was educated for a lawyer. He was a hard student, but having entered public life very early, never returned to his profession.

James Monroe was also the son of a Virginia planter, and educated for the bar, like Mr. Madison. But the public troubles drew him into political life in early youth, and he served with honor in the army and in civil pursuits. He had a large experience in politics and a thorough training in statesmanship. John Quincy Adams was the eldest son of John Adams, and was a lawyer; but his life was devoted to public service, with a few intervals given to literary pursuits. He was educated for statesmanship by his parents, and had a larger and more varied experience in public life than any other President.

Andrew Jackson came from a poor Southern family, and began the practice of law at manhood. He was afterward a judge, a merchant, a planter and soldier, and served in both Houses of Congress before he was chosen to the Presidency.

The father of Martin Van Buren was too poor to give his son an education, but the energy of the young man forced his way to the bar, and he became an acknowledged leader among lawyers.

William Henry Harrison was the third son of Benjamin Harrison, a Virginia planter, and one of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence. He entered the army early, but had so important trusts in civil life.

John Tyler was the son of an eminent Virginian, a man of large wealth, who had filled many high offices.

James Knox Polk was the son of a respectable farmer, and was educated as a lawyer.

The father of Zachary Taylor was Col. Richard Taylor, who won distinction in the Revolution, and emigrated to Kentucky soon after his son's birth. The son's life, after leaving the plantation, was spent in the army until his election to the Presidency.

Millard Fillmore was of humble origin, and served five years as an apprentice to a fuller's trade. He was self-educated, became a lawyer, and soon won distinction in public life.

Franklin Pierce was the son of Gen. Benjamin Pierce, a Revolutionary officer of reputation, and a man of public note, who was chosen Governor of New Hampshire.

James Buchanan was the son of a Pennsylvania farmer, and entered public life early.

Abraham Lincoln was born of very poor parents, and so were Andrew Johnson and Ulysses S. Grant.

All our Presidents have had a high social rank, some of them born to it, and others attaining it by the profession of law or arms.

How Chromos are Made.
From Messrs. James Sutton & Co., publishers of that most excellent periodical, *The Aldine*, we have received two beautiful Chromos entitled "The Village Belle" and "Crossing the Moor." They are of large size and marvels of beauty in their line, almost equalling oil paintings in their rich and varied colorings. The wonder is how they can be made so cheaply, but Messrs. Sutton & Co. know, and they partly divulge the secret by telling us how they are made, as follows:

The picture to be copied is covered with a transparent sheet of oiled paper, on which a tracing of every outline is made. This outline is then transferred to a lithographic stone, known as the "key." A number of plates, equal to the number of tints desired, is next prepared, and an impression from the key is printed on each. With the original before him, the artist fills in with a crayon such portions of the outline on each plate as he wishes to have reproduced the particular shade assigned to it.

The untouched portions of the plate are then covered with a peculiar preparation, and a galvanic bath nicely governed, does the work of an engraver, but does it as no engraver could possibly do it—true to a hair, and finer, if necessary, than the naked eye can discover. Each plate is printed in its turn on the paper, and every impression must be so adjusted to its predecessors, that there shall not be the slightest variation.

When it is considered that as many as twenty or thirty plates are often required—that some portions of a tint are preserved pure to the end, while others are covered or affected by one or all succeeding impressions—the marvelous skill and knowledge of various combinations of color required of an artist who essays to lay out and complete the plates for a Chromo, may be faintly imagined by those who see and admire the splendid results of his labors.

Josephine's Sanctuary.
One room at Malmaison was especially consecrated by Josephine to the memories of happy days passed there by Napoleon before his divorce from her. It was a room then used by him as a study, whenever the cares of war and politics permitted him to seek a temporary rest in her society in that charming retreat; and when she was left there alone to mourn their separation she would allow nobody to occupy this room but herself. In it lay the pen last used there by the Emperor, which the ink had long since corroded; on a table lay the map he had last studied there, the line of march tracked out which had long since taught Europe to feel the power of his tactics; on the wall hung a glass case in which some of his hair was arranged in ornamental or symbolic form. It was so long since that hair had grown on his head that the sight of it must have carried back Josephine's memory to the time when she, the widowed Vi-comtesse de Beauharnais, determined on marrying its owner, the young soldier of fortune, with nothing but "his love and his sword, and his cloak to offer her." Such a sanctuary indeed was this chamber at Malmaison to the ex-Empress that she would not allow any hand but her own to dust or move the objects in it, which had been consecrated, as she deemed, by the touch of a husband who had sacrificed her to his ambition, and in so doing had lost the guiding star, the guardian angel of his life.

Mr. SEWARD's home in Auburn is filled with singular testimonials of regard and esteem from every quarter of the world, which were presented to him after his retirement to private life. There are specimens of ore from western mines; specimens from the Young Art Academy of Mexico; snuff-boxes and walking sticks from the four corners of the globe. But the most curious present is a gorgeous silk banner from China, such as the men of rank have borne before them in processions, with the portrait of Mr. Seward in the center, his son's embroidered on the top, and around the border a grotesque crowd of hypothetical ancestors.
