Butler's Programme.

New York, Aug. 18.—The Times' Boston special says: The next move in the Butler campaign will be a public reception to Butler by the Kearney reception committee. At a meeting to-night the following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That we hail with feeling of unmingled pleasure and delight the announcement of Butler that he abandons the Republican party and with open arms we welcome him to the ranks of the people.

It is understood that Butler will accept the invitation and will soon speak in Faneuil hall. A bargain between him and some of the leaders of the Democratic party is contemplated. It is understood he agrees to use his strength to carry the congressional districts for the Democrats, and they in turn agree to fix things so that no nomination be made at their state convention for governor, leaving him a clear field to run against the Republican candidate. He will receive the greenback nomination which will be given at their convention this month, and now says he will accept it.

The contract, as before stated has been awarded to Williams. His address is Huntley Grove, Ill. This fact adds color to the supposition that it is a straw bid in favor of Huntley, the present contractor.

Report from various points in Massachusetts and New Hampshire, particularly along the coast, indicate the thunder storm on the 9th the severest of the season, causing great damage. The death list at most will not exceed 30. The tornado was confined in a length of two miles and about a quarter of a mile in width. No deaths by lightning. The damage to property is estimated at \$100,000.

Indian War News.

The Indian war in Eastern Oregon has died out, the hostiles having disbanded and scattered all over the country. Small parties of Indians are still occasionally seen in several places, but it is evident the bands are broken up and hiding from the troops. Some have surrendered at the Malheur reservation and others are reported anxious to do so. General Howard returned to his headquarters at Vancouver last Saturday night.

The free lands of the far West are being taken up and settled this year to a most gratifying degree, in the face of the overcrowded metropolitan life. Several millions more acres of homesteads have been entered for settlement at the various land offices in 1876 and 1877, and still the Western movement continues in force.

NEWS ITEMS.

Up to August 3d, the total number of yellow fever cases in New Orleans was 233; deaths 60.

Ben Butler spoke two hours in behalf of the Greenbackers of Biddeford, Maine, on the 10th.

Eugene Hale has been re-nominated for Congress by the Republicans of the fifth Maine District.

It is estimated that the salmon catch on the Columbia river, this season, will aggregate 280,000 cases.

The bill to tax Chinese in British Columbia has been passed. It levies a tax of \$40 on each head per year.

Mr. Louis Goldsmith, of Portland, is said to be one of the heirs of Michael Reese, the deceased California millionaire.

It is said Kearney, the California workingman, earns his bread by the sweat of his private secretary's brow, the latter writing his speeches for him.

The delegates from the Workingmen's party to the California Constitutional Convention ask that the President and Secretary of State take immediate steps to obtain the abrogation of the Burlingame treaty.

The San Francisco Chronicle published a statement a few days since that Father Wilbur, Agent at the Sincos Reservation, W. T., is a defaulter to the Government in the sum of about \$25,000. This is not believed in Oregon, and will probably prove untrue.

Seven tramps boarded a train at Marion station on Tuesday and endeavored to dead-head it over the line, showing knives and pistols as their credentials. They drove the brakemen into the rear car. The engineer stopped the train, and the scoundrels fearing the consequences, decamped.

New York, Aug. 14.—The Tribune's Washington special says: The statement is made to night, without qualification, that Mrs. Jenks, the notorious witness before the Potter committee, has been appointed as a detective in the treasury department and assigned to duty at the New Orleans custom house.

Since the attempted assassination upon Emperor William by Dr. Nobeling there have been 563 arrests for insulting the emperor. Of the number 521 have been convicted, including 31 women. The aggregate of sentences of imprisonment is 811 years. Five of the accused committed suicide before trial.

A young man named David Brasfield was shot and killed at Umatilla on Saturday evening last by a rough character named John Knott. There was a quarrel among several men who were drinking. Knott knocked Brasfield down. The latter obtained a revolver but was too drunk to use it with effect. A friend of Knott's handed him a pistol, when he fired on Brasfield with fatal effect. Knott was caught after a chase of twelve miles into the country.

All the coal mines at Coos Bay have closed except the Flanagan mine, and great depression in that locality is the consequence. The trouble is said to be that the bar at the mouth of the river has changed and filled so that none but light draft vessels can cross, and shipment in this class is not profitable. The entrance to that bay should and must be improved, and our representatives in Congress owe it to the people of that country to obtain necessary appropriations for that purpose.
