NEW YORK, October 12, 1878.

To W. T. PELTON.—Never more be nephew of mine. S. J. TILDEX.

For a considerable time prior to the repeal of the bankrupt act the art of going into bankruptcy was practiced with a high degree of perfection in several eastern cities. A class of skillful but disreputable lawyers, who understood all the requirements of the law, offered their service to enable merchants to fail honorably with a handsome profit and all for a very moderate fee. If a person desired to go into bankruptcy and save, say \$20,000, with \$1,000 he could purchase \$30,000 worth of southern land bonds, mining stocks, or some other almost worthless securities which have been at par within a recent period. The holders of these forms of investment furnished by the bankruptcy lawyers who are willing to date back transaction of this nature to any time desired. An entire new set of books could be made if necessary, and the requisite entries interjected. Then the worthless bonds were turned in among his assets, the merchants hiding a cash equivalent till the storm was passed.

WASHINGTON, October 31st.—A dispatch having been received here from Beaufort, S. C., stating the Democrats are interfering with, and breaking up every meeting called by the Republicans in Representative Small's district, he has therefore about concluded to retire from the contest, as the apparent 5,000 to 8,000 Republican majority in his district will count for nothing in the face of 2,000 "red shirts" with arms in their hands.

The barkentine Fremont, which has loaded frequently at the Tacoma mill dock, has been north on a codfishing expedition this summer. As the result of her operation she brought down 240,000 fish, which her crew is now engaged in drying on the shores of San Francisco Bay. No vessel before her, we understand, ever came from the Ochotsk, with as many fish as did the Fremont this year.

A gentleman of Vancouver has a contract with parties in Europe to ship a quantity of fir cones. He has now in store about 400 bushels, which will be sent forward soon. Upon arrival at their destination the seeds will be extracted and planted in situations congenial to the habits and growth of the fir tree. While America is getting rid of her forests Europe is actively engaged in increasing hers.

Each inhabitant of the United States pays \$2.07 for the support of the public schools, and \$1.39 for military purposes. These two items of expenditure in other countries of the world are as follows: Prussia, 51 cents and \$2.20; Austria, 34 cents and \$2.39; France, 29 cents and \$4.50; Italy, 13 cents and \$1.57; England and Wales, 66 cents and \$3.86; Switzerland, 88 cents and \$1.00.

Thanksgiving Proclamation.

The president has issued the following proclamation, setting apart Thursday, Nov. 28th, as a day of thanksgiving: The recurrence of that season at which it is the habit of our people to make devout and public confession of their constant dependence upon divine favor for all the good gifts of life and happiness, and of public peace and prosperity, exhibits in the record of the year abundant reasons for our gratitude and thanksgiving. Exuberant harvests, productive mines, ample crops of staples of trade and manufactures have enriched the country. The resources thus furnished to our reviving industry and expanding commerce are hastening the day when the discords and distresses though the length and breadth of the land will, under the continued favor of Providence, have given way to confidence and energy and assured prosperity. Peace with all nations has remained unbroken; domestic tranquility has prevailed, and the institutions of liberty and justice which the wisdom and virtue of our fathers established remain—a glory and defense to their children. The general prevalence of the blessing of health throughout our wide land has made more conspicuous the sufferings and sorrows which the dark shadow of pestilence has cast upon a portion of our people. This heavy affliction even the divine ruler has tempered to the suffering communities in the universal sympathy and succor which have flowed to their relief, and the whole nation may rejoice in the unity of spirit in our people by which they cheerfully share another's burdens. Now, therefore, I, Rutherford B. Hayes, President of the United States, do appoint Thursday, the 28th day of November next, as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer; and I earnestly recommend that, withdrawing themselves from secular cares and labors, the people of the United States do meet together on that day in their respective places of worship, there to give thanks and praise to Almighty God for His mercies, and to devoutly beseech their continuance.

Executive Appointments.

His excellency Governor Thayer has just made the following appointments: Christian Leinenweber of Astoria, fish commissioner of the Columbia river and its tributaries, under the provisions of an act passed by the last legislative assembly, whose salary shall consist of fees for issuing licenses, etc., to fishermen controlling boats, nets, seines, weirs or traps, to take effect on or about Jan. 15th. His appointment was urged by most of the leading business firms of Portland. Augustus Kinney, health officer at Astoria vice Dr. Dodd, relieved; appointment to take effect December 1st. Dr. C. H. Rafferty, of East Portland, visiting physician at the insane asylum, to take effect December 1st. J. B. Galbraith of Brownsville and W. J. Campbell, of East Portland, notaries public. A. Bush, Esq., Superintendent, and W. P. Miller, warden of the Oregon penitentiary, having filed their bonds in the office of secretary of State, took charge of that institution yesterday. There will be no immediate changes in the subordinate officers at the present time. Bliss D. Rickey and Budd Bell of Salem are prominent candidates for the office of turnkey under the new regime. B. F. Harding, Esq., already assumed the duties of circuit judge of the 3d judicial district.

The Burlington "Hawkeye" says a great many good things, but that paper never said anything truer than this: "It isn't Kearney that makes communists of men; it isn't violent harangues, and incendiary speeches; it isn't the vicious teachings of hot-headed demagogues that shakes men communists.—It is when the president and directors of a solid insurance company, when the president and directors of a Boston or Chicago savings bank, get the hard-earned dollars of laboring men and working women into their own hands and then divide it up among themselves and retain their stations in the best society; these are the things that make the common people think that a general division of all property would benefit the poor quite as much as a special division of the savings of the poor among the few."

Elections were held yesterday in 29 States. Congressmen were elected in each, and in some State officers and members of the Legislature were voted for. The following is a list of the States in which elections were held: Kansas, Illinois, Minnesota, Michigan, Wisconsin, Missouri, Tennessee, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, South Carolina, Florida, Maryland, Delaware, Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Massachusetts. On the same day New York elects a Judge of the Court of Appeals.

NEWS ITEMS.

Roseburg is to have street lamps. Sheriff Dale's farm sold on Saturday on execution.

Ed. Wood, of Yamhill county, has been appointed penitentiary farmer and boss teamster.

The trial of Capt. Baughman, for killing Patrick Whalen, takes place at Pendleton this week.

The official vote of Ohio shows Hull's majority to be 9,389 and the rest of the state ticket about the same.

Judge Boreman, of Utah, who sentenced the Mountain Meadows murderer, John D. Lee, is visiting the Sound.

It is proposed to erect a cannery at Scottsburg by next year. Mr. J. McCahey has proposed to advance \$1,000 for the enterprise.

Wedek the murderer of J. P. Sullivan, was sentenced on Monday to confinement in the Penitentiary during his natural life.

Messrs. J. W. and V. Cook have bought the undivided one-third of block 41 in Portland, of Mr. A. Bush, for the sum of \$35,000.

The American department of the Paris Exposition is acknowledged on all hands to have proved a complete success, which must be a source of just pride to all concerned.

The Ashland Woolen Mills have shut down for a couple of weeks on account of the breaking of some of the machinery. They will be in running order again in a few days.

It is stated that W. B. Laswell, Esq., a well known attorney of Grant county who graduated from the Portland Academy some 12 years ago, has lately fallen heir to \$150,000 by the death of a rich uncle. Lucky man.

John Hokenjos intends building a number of new residences on the vacant lot back of the M. E. Church, which he will offer for rent. One is now in course of construction, to be used by Nick Ficke.

They have a new way of courting on Williams creek. When one of the fair maidens of that locality takes a special liking for one of the young men she immediately proceeds to business regardless of whether it is leap year or not.

Jacksonville can boast of having six live Doctors at the present time. The county at large is also well supplied, as Ashland has three, Phoenix two, Butte creek two, Applegate two and Rock Point one. "In the midst of life we are in death."

The population of Oregon is about 150,000 people. The exports last year reached within a fraction of \$15,000,000—nearly \$100 for each inhabitant. This conclusively establishes that Oregon is enjoying a tolerable degree of prosperity.

A homestead is exempt from debt provided the owner be the authorized head of a family, and has filed an article setting forth such fact with the recorder of deeds prior to such execution being issued, and provided the total value of such homestead does not exceed the sum of \$5,000.

L. N. Browning, the Superintendent of the Rising Star mines, on Wolf creek, was in town last week, and reports work progressing on their new ditch. This company has an excellent bed of gravel, plenty of dump, and rich prospects are continually being made.

Father Wilbur stated to the people of Yakima on his arrival there that they need have no fears of the new reservation which Gen. Howard proposed for Chief Moses, for they would not grant it, and he regretted very much that such proposition had been made to him.

The will of the late Gen. D. D. Colton has been filed for probate in the Probate Court of San Francisco. The entire estate is bequeathed to his widow and she is appointed sole executrix without bonds. The value of the estate is stated to be unknown. The will was made Oct. 8th, 1878.

The stock, etc., on the mail route from Roseburg to Empire City in Oregon, owned and run by C. C. Huntley, was attached by a Sheriff last week for \$1,200, a quarter's pay due the man who run the route for Huntley, for the last quarter. It stopped the mail for a few days.

They make what is called the "new process" flour at Boise City. The manufacturer claims that by this process all the nutritive and tissue making properties of the wheat are preserved, and bread made from it is sweet and wholesome and retains its freshness much longer than that made from flour by the old process.

Last Sunday The Dalles was visited by a disastrous fire. Five business houses and one dwelling were reduced to ashes. The extensive destruction of property was owing to the Water Works having its supply of water cut off most all day. H. J. Waldron died from the effects of his great exertions to save property. This city has several times been devastated by fire.
