THE SOUTHERN POLICY.

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—The Tribune's Washington special has a report of an important interview with the president, in which the latter in a measure confesses the inadequacy of his southern policy. It is from the National Republican. He says, substantially, that the time for discussion is passed, and that determined, vigorous action is imperative. The cabinet reached this determination several days ago, and have lately been considering the duty of the attorney general in the premises. The southern policy was inaugurated with an earnest desire to conciliate and round off sharp angles and soften the asperities of political strife. Nobody will say the attempt was not made to earnestly carry out this policy. Of the personal and partisan sacrifice I made in this effort, of the consequent interruptions of certain relations which had previously existed between myself and some of my supporters. I have nothing to say just now; but it appears that the leaders who made those pledges did not exert themselves to keep them; or were unable to do so. In fact, I am reluctantly forced to admit that the experiment was a failure. The first important election held since it was attempted has proven that a fair election with free suffrage for every vote in the south is an impossibility under the existing condition of things. It is not because the Republican party appears the suffer in these results, that I complain. It is because free suffrage and freedom of political rights have been interfered with that I am called upon to take cognizance of these disturbances. If the Republicans had committed these outrages upon the Democrats my duty would be the same. It will not do for me or any official to treat these questions otherwise than in an unpartisan way. The partisan press will naturally take a partisan view of the case and I will be held to account for aiding Republicans and flaunting the bloody shirt; but for all that I shall do my duty as the chief magistrate of the whole nation, and if in the faithful execution of the laws, justice demands the punishment of this or that man, whatever his political connection may be, I shall not be deterred by partisan criticisms. All that I know is that great crimes have been committed and it is my duty to aid in the punishment of criminals. I don't think the southern leaders who promised to protect the blacks are responsible for these crimes. Hampton, for example, tried repeatedly to repress the violence which characterized the South Carolina campaign, and failed. Prominent Republicans of that state have advised me that Hampton cannot control the Red Shirts, and that he has made speeches deprecating the violent campaign. Nichols earnestly opposed like proceeding in Louisiana. Officers in the department of justice have been instructed to carry out proceedings already begun against deprecators, not only against those who have already been arrested, but against others who will soon be arrested. It is proposed to make a clean sweep of this business and exhaust every legal resource in the execution of justice. The integrity of American citizenship has been grossly violated in widespread localities. It must and shall be vindicated.

The president closed by saying that if it is discovered that any district attorney in the south is not earnestly endeavoring to do his whole duty in the matter, he will speedily be replaced, to secure vigorous prosecution in these cases.

The Presidential Outlook.

The Congressional elections held in the midyear between two Presidential elections are generally regarded as a pretty good indication of what the result in the succeeding Presidential contest will be. Judged by this rule, the prospects of a Republican success in 1880 are immensely increased by the vote cast last week. There is still some doubt about Florida, which has four votes in the Electoral College, and the next election in California, a State which has six votes in the Electoral College, will not be held until next September; but, deducting these ten votes, there remain 359 votes in the Electoral College, and these, ranged according to the way in which the thirty-six States that have to cast them voted at the late fall elections, would stand as follows:

Conceding Florida to the Democrats and counting California as Republican, the figures would stand Republican 213, Democratic 156. The transfer of New York to the Democratic side would of course turn the scale: the transfer of Pennsylvania would do so by a single vote, but Ohio might be lost and the Republican party would still have a good majority. A solid South may be a menace to the country, but it is a long way from being able to elect a President if the North is true to the principles to which it has once more shown an unshaken faith.

WOMAN'S RIGHTS IN OREGON.

Mrs. Duniway has secured her rights at last, as will be seen by a perusal of the following synopsis of a law passed at the recent session of our legislature:

An act relating to property of married women provides that property owned by a woman at the time of marriage, or acquired thereafter by gift, devise or inheritance, shall not be subject to debts or contracts of the husband, and the wife may manage, sell, convey and devise the same as the husband can his property. The property of either husband or wife shall not be liable for debts or contracts of the other. Action may be maintained by husband or wife against the other for recovery of property of which the other has obtained possession, the same as if they were unmarried. For civil injuries committed by his wife, damages can be recovered by him alone, except in cases where he is jointly responsible. Conveyances from one to the other shall be valid. One may constitute the other his attorney in fact. The wife may recover the wages for her personal labor in her own name. Neither is liable for debts of the other incurred before marriage. Expenses of family and education of children shall be chargeable upon property of both husband and wife, or of either of them. We have here an act which seems to be pretty well up to the advanced claims of those who have been laboring for a law which would give woman control of her own property and earnings and put her on an equality in this respect with man.

NEWS ITEMS.

Entries of timber land under the "40-acre" law are very numerous at the Walla Walla land office.

Brents, the Republican candidate for Congress in Washington Territory, received over 1,000 majority.

Henry Ward Beecher has been offered \$25,000 as payment for fifty lectures to be delivered in England.

Miss Mollie Lahey recovered \$2,000 damages in a breach of promise, suit against Jos. Knott in Portland recently.

Ben Butler will not be the next Democratic candidate for President, the Republicans of Massachusetts having settled that question.

Josh Davies beat W. J. Roach a four-ball carom game of billiards, at Portland, on Saturday last, for \$500, Davies leading 75 points in 800.

The fight in New York City between Tammany and anti-Tammany has resulted in a victory for the latter. Cooper is mayor, Shell being beaten by over 19,000 votes.

Six Indians have been found guilty of murder in the first degree at Pendleton. Al. Bunker identified Poe, the one who shot him, and White Owl, one of the murderers of Coggan.

Layman Woodruff, of Coos county, has invented a method of preserving salmon that can be prepared in Alaska and shipped to New York, when they will taste as fresh as when first canned.

Dr. S. A. Young, a prominent physician of McMinnville, absconded last Tuesday, leaving a host of creditors behind to mourn the loss of sundry sums of coin ranging from one dollar to one thousand.

Gen John S. Zeiber, at one time U. S. Surveyor General for the State of Oregon, died at his home in Marion County last Tuesday. Mr. Zeiber was the father of Al. Zeiber of the Clarendon Hotel, Portland.

It is now understood, says the "Statesman," that the "Investigating Committee" in session, will look into the mysteries of the school for the deaf and mutes for the two years past, and see who "go away with" the last appropriation.

The Portland Bee of last week says the demand for Oregon farms is vastly increasing and capitalists from the East and California are beginning to invest quite freely. Yesterday a newcomer bought three farms near Junction City, paying therefor \$50,000 cash down.

Washington special: Postmaster General Key took advantage of his trip to the Pacific coast to feel the popular pulse, and he says that he was greatly astonished to find the Republicans so generally in favor of nominating Gen. Grant. He believes the advocates of a strong government will rally under Grant, and that if nominated he will certainly be elected.

New York, November 12.—The "Sun" this morning throws Tilden overboard, saying that he cannot again be the candidate of any party. It further says "while we should be ashamed to doubt Tilden's personal integrity, we are yet constrained to say it is proved and admitted through publication of the cipher telegrams that during the presidential campaign he suffered a clique of politically immoral people to surround him, to act for him and compromise him."

Col. Hogg advertises in the Corvallis "Gazette" as follows: Proposals will be received by the undersigned at his office in Corvallis, Oregon, for getting out and delivering 24,000 railroad ties on or before the 1st day of June, 1879. Said ties to be eight feet long, flatted on two sides, to face eight inches, five inches thick, and to be delivered at points to be agreed upon, on the line of the first ten miles of the Willamette Valley and Coast Railroad. Proposals should state where contractor prefer to deliver ties, and the price of ties delivered at such preferred point.

We are authorized to say by one who knows, says the Roseburg "Plaindealer," that the Indian bureau have already expended \$26,000 for the benefit of Joseph's band of Indians since they have located them upon Indian Territory. This is \$11,000 more than the government have expended for the white man and women of all Idaho Territory during the last 12 months. "Who would not be an Indian" and get his blankets and rations.
