The purse is for a single dash of three miles, free for all horses on this coast, the horses to be appraised on entrance and sold to the highest bidder after the race. All the horse brings over the appraisement goes to the society.

At the next meeting of the City Council that august body will be asked to remove the street lamps, they having been voted a nuisance by several persons who carry their own head lights and sometimes carry light heads. Several of the latter have been damaged recently by colliding with the lamp posts.

MINING NOTES.

It is said that Joe Clough is negotiating for the purchase of the Ferren claim, on Briggs' creek.

Al McKenzie, of the Centennial, do ing good work. This is one of the best claims in the Willow Springs camp.

The Coyote Gravel company are working night and day with a full force and the ground indicating big pay.

Every claim on Jackass is being worked with plenty of water and the yield of gold in that district is always good.

The Squaw Lake Co. are still cleaning and repairing ditch, but will soon be at work, and will have a full head all summer.

The Grand Applegate Company is still busy at work on their ditch and expect to be ready for washing in a month.

Tom Kahler, Ft. Lane, cleaned up last week, his claim paying ten dollars per day to the hand. The late heavy storm will give him a new start.

Reliable reports from Silver creek say the ground is covered with three feet of snow and that it is ten feet deep on the trail from Thornton's.

PERCHERON STOCK.—Elsewhere will find the advertisement of W. C. Myer's horse, "Pride of Perche." Mr. Myer has met with much opposition in his efforts to introduce this stock into Oregon, and he has even had reason to suspect foul play with some of his horses, and among other charges is one that they are short-lived. The Pacific Rural Press says:

"First, the horses are found in a sufficient variety of size to suit all the ordinary purposes of the farm, the road, the express wagon, the city cart and truck. Second, the animals have reasonably fine form, compact, well knit, and immense power for their size. Third, they have good wind, superior bone and muscle. Fourth, they have large, strong joints, and the best of legs and feet. Fifth, their disposition is one of indomitable pluck, never balking or refusing to pull when attached to any reasonable load. Sixth, they have free, easy action. Seventh, they are of high spirit, yet gentle and docile. Eighth, they are quick feeders, and easily kept. Ninth, they have a general freedom from disease, and especially from the more common diseases of ring-bone, spavin, curb, and founder. Tenth, the animals mature early and are so powerful that they can be put to light work without injury at two years old. Eleventh, they are 'long lived and enduring.' Lastly, prepotency, imparting to his offspring a greater share of his good qualities than is usual to stallions of other breeds, is characteristic of the Percheron Norman, and this often renders his descendants out of common mares equal in general work to the Percheron Norman himself."

We are informed by W. C. Myer that two thousand dollars have been subscribed towards the purchase of the Ashland Academy for the M. E. Church. It will require fifteen hundred more, and Rev. Mr. Chapman is making every effort to secure it. We would be only too glad to chronicle the raising of even that sum for the erection of a high school or academy here, and perhaps the time may come when our community will at last perceive its advantages. Our Ashland neighbors have the building and if they are alive to their interests they will not let it remain idle.

CRIMINAL ADVICE.—Dr. Stanley, of Table Rock, informs us that a couple of weeks since an itinerant preacher named Winwright visited that locality and found a number of persons suffering from colds and bronchitis. He prescribed carbolio acid, to be taken internally, and as there was considerable of that drug in the neighborhood, purchased as a disinfectant during small pox time, it was used freely without reference to quantity. The result was that a number of persons were badly poisoned, and one young man named Fitzgerald badly paralyzed. The most ignorant quack would scarcely dare to administer a drug that is never given in quantities greater than six drops, and then only in extreme necessity, and if people think they require medical advice they should consult a physician. There are too many people ready to prescribe medicine without knowing its effect and it ought never to be taken except from a regular practitioner. We have no doubt that the person who thus endangered the lives of a whole neighborhood thought he was doing a kindly action, but he should leave the care of the body to others and confine himself to anything he understands, or take the chances of being tarred and feathered.

A CHARACTER WITNESS.—Some years ago, when Judge Prim of the Supreme bench presided on this Circuit, a witness named Miller, a very worthy, innocent old gentleman was put on the stand to testify as to the character of another witness. The usual question was put to the old man: "Do you know Mr. —?" "Oh he's a good man, Judge," said the witness. "Answer the question directly," said the attorney, somewhat nettled, as the answer did not suit him. "Oh I know him, he'll do—he can go back where he come from," said the old man. The Judge was appealed to and his honor sternly told the witness he must give direct answers and confine himself strictly to the rule. "Well then" said the witness "I would say direct that there man," pointing to Mr. — as he spoke, "is the best man I ever knowed; he won't lie, he won't steal, he won't go back on nobody, and I'd sooner trust him than these yere lawyers." The Court smiled, one of the attorneys turned aside for a quiet laugh and the other yelled "stand aside," but the testimony was ruled out by the Court and ruled in by the jury, and the character of the other witness stood unimpeached.

TEST OF LUCK.—Our Chinese population have a pretty custom which is intended not only as a compliment to friends but considered as a fair test of good or bad fortune for the new year. About a month they distribute bulbs of the hyacinth among their friends, wishing that they may blossom and yield fragrance by the first day of the new year of the Chinese Calendar, which will be a sure augury of good fortune, and a promise that all the hopes of the new year will be fulfilled, and all its resolutions be firmly kept and bear good fruit. The variety which the Chinese prize most, and which are generally distributed among their American friends, a pretty, pale blue blossom, and is full of fragrance, so much so that one plant is sufficient to fill a large room with its odor. A large number of bulbs have been sent to President Hayes by his Chinese admirers in this place.

SKELETON FOUND.—One day last week a skeleton was discovered on Rogue river by H. G. Shook and Dave Hendree. It appears that those persons were hunting stock on a point about three miles above the mouth of Little Butte, and observing a place where the loose rocks had been disturbed at some time, they made an examination and found the skeleton of a human being that had evidently been hidden for many years. Lying on the breast-bone was a smooth river boulder that must have been carried a considerable distance as there are no washed boulders in the immediate vicinity. It is possible that this is a relic of Indian devilry, but whether it was placed there by whites or Indians to hide a murder will probably never be ascertained.
