THE LAW OF NEWSPAPERS

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.
2. If any subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the office to which they are directed, the law holds them responsible until they have notified the publisher, and ordered them discontinued.
4. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publisher, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
5. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from this office, or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
6. The postmaster who neglects to give legal notice of the neglect of a person to take from the office the newspaper addressed to him, is liable to the publisher for the subscription price.

FRAGILEST MAIL SERVICE.

Mail route 44,152, from Ashland to Lakeview was let to contract at the last mail letting for three times a week service, which service was afterwards ordered up by the P. O. Department to six times a week. The contract was let to one Huntley, of Vermont, who appears to be one of the "ring contractors" of the P. O. department. He sub-let the contract at a large profit to one M. Colwell, who has been "reco-

this sham and fraudulent mail service is not known, but it is believed that he is, for the sub-contractor boasts that he (the sub-con.) is a relative of the 2d Asst. P. M. General, and that everything is "lovely." The evidence of mail service performed is the registers of arrivals and departures kept by the postmasters at the termini of the route. There are two dodges resorted to by fraudulent mail contractors to obtain pay for mail service not performed, viz: 1, By bribing the P. M. at the terminal offices to keep and return false registers; 2, By taking the mails to and from the terminal offices according to schedule, but not carrying the mails through or doing so only semi-occasionally. It is not known which of these dodges is relied upon in this instance, but one thing is certain if the registers kept by the postmasters at the terminal offices of this route show that there has been any regular service on it, such registers are false and fraudulent, and the guilty parties should be brought to punishment.

It is to be hoped that this fraud upon the government will be duly exposed, and that the present sham service will be discontinued and an honest service established. It would be far better for the people to have only a semi-weekly, performed with "celerity, certainty and security," as required by

official publication, and, miscellaneous printed matter, and fourth, merchandise. Mail matter of the second class embraces all newspapers and periodicals published issued as often as four times annually. All publications of this class, with certain exceptions, when sent from the office of publication, including sample copies, or when sent from a news agency to actual subscribers thereto or to other news agents, shall be entitled to transmission at two cents a pound, prepaid.

Heretofore newspaper publishers have been required to pay transient rates on specimen copies; such copies will not be transmitted at the lower rate of second-class matter. It is provided further that publishers of newspapers, without subjecting themselves to extra postage, may fold within regular issue a supplement, and omitted only from the regular issue for want of space, time or great conveniences. Publishers may also inclose in their publications, bills and receipts and orders for subscriptions.

Another clause of the bill provides for the double postal card and for a letter-sheet envelope, which is to be stamped as envelopes are now stamped, and a double-letter envelope. The double postal is in size similar to the one-cent card. It bears at both upper corners a one-cent stamp, and lines are
