Quinn & Darkis have a good claim, which is running, but without machinery. I saw prospect from two pans of dirt which gave a yield of fifty cents of gold. These men are not able to buy machinery or to successfully work their mines and on that account they want to sell out. They have a good flume and ditch, and I understand they offer to sell for \$3,000. Their grant runs day and night on a bank 60 feet high. Their ground seems to be free from rock and the dirt disintegrates very readily, making it easy to wash. Just now they have only 60 feet pressure, but they intend to lay 2,000 feet of large pipe next Fall which will give them 200 feet pressure which with light dirt and a large volume of water will give them the boss mine of Southern Oregon, a position which this mine is fast assuming.

The Scott's Gulch company started their gravel elevator last Friday; soon after the full working pressure came upon it the wood extension burst which stopped the machinery, but only for a few hours. I have just had a talk with Mr. Connell, one of the owners of the Scott's Gulch mine, and he says the elevator works admirably. They are now raising the gravel 22 feet and have a pressure of nearly 300 feet. No doubts are entertained by the company about the feasibility of the elevator.
