## RAILROAD PROPOSITION.

The following extract from a letter from Captain W. H. Fauntleroy referred to last week will explain itself and be read with interest by our people, and certainly is entitled to careful consideration. If our people do not act on it we will conclude that they do not want a railroad:

CRESSENT CITY, May 18, 1879.

ED SENTINEL: I will visit Jacksonville shortly, probably on the part of the citizens of Crescent City, to endeavor to enlist your efforts with the authorities of Oregon, to be jointly used with the efforts of the authorities of California, in the matter of the "harbor of refuge;" also on the part of capital desiring to construct a railroad from Crescent City to Jacksonville.

I propose to give stock in the road in return for all money expended in the road bed, ties, right of way and survey. I will tie and ballast the road, incorporate it, and pay in one hundred dollars per mile at my own expense; commence the construction of the road-bed and finish the road in good running order, fully stocked, in two years.

I believe that no such offer as this has been made for the construction of any road either in Oregon or California.

If anything should delay me, it might be prudent for your people to act on these suggestions, and I will be glad to hear from you if you have any communication to make.

A REAL BABY.—A little incident occurred at Veit's Hall on the evening the Wilton's appeared in the play of "The Drunkard," which illustrated the keen perception of intelligent childhood. Mrs. Wilton was personifying Madeline, a character in which she excels any one we have ever witnessed, and Mr. Wilton was playing the drunken husband. ## TEACHER'S INSTITUTE.

In accordance with a published call of the State Supt. Pub. Inst., the teachers and friends of education of Jackson county met in the capacity of a Teacher's Institute, at Jacksonville, on the evening of Thursday, May 22nd.

Prof. Powell dispensed with much of the formality usual on such an occasion and, assuming the chair himself, the organization was completed by the election of J. W. Merritt as secretary. An address of welcome was then made by Mr. Merritt of Jacksonville, to which Miss Frances Myer of Ashland responded. After a vocal solo, "Nev-ermore," by Miss Eliza Langell, Rev. L. L. Rogers, of Yreka, Cal., was introduced, who addressed the Institute on the subject, "Use and Misuse." He dwelt upon use and misuse of home, use and misuse of government, use and misuse of schools, use and misuse of fun, use and misuse of wealth, use and misuse of religion, and use and misuse of liberty. When he had finished Prof. Powell, in a few words, explained the object of the Institute and declared it adjourned for the evening.

The Jacksonville Brass Band was in attendance and furnished several pieces of excellent music. On Friday morning the Institute opened with singing, followed with prayer by Rev. J. H. Vandever of Ashland. Prof. Powell then introduced the subject of orthoepy and orthography. He favored written spelling, and urged the introduction of spelling by sound as well as by letter. A general discussion followed his remarks, the prevailing opinion being in favor of a varied use of the oral and written methods. The subject of reading was next treated by Mr. W. I. Nichols of Yreka, Cal., whose views met with unqualified approbation. The exercises of the morning were varied by music, furnished by Messrs. Scott and Brown, and Miss Addie Langell. The music was so highly entertaining, so well appreciated, that a unanimous request was made to the President to call for it frequently. Music by Prof. Scott and his assistants introduced the work of the afternoon, the first of which was a recitation in English grammar, conducted by Mr. J. W. Merritt. An animated discussion followed this recitation by which many good thoughts were elicited. Rev. Mr. Rogers then presented percentage in a clear and comprehensive manner. His work was preceded by a beautiful song, "The Sunny Dell," by Miss Eliza Langell, and followed by instrumental music and adjournment.

In the evening, when the Brass Band had played several pieces of music, the Institute was called to order, to listen in turn to music by Prof. Scott and assistants; a recitation, "Alonso and Imogene," by Miss Annie Bilger; a recitation, "Little Jim," by Miss Lola O'Connor; music by the Brass Band; and an address by Rev. Mr. Bell of Roseburg. Mr. Bell considered his subject, "Higher Culture," under three heads; practical education, the cause of failure in teaching, and school law. Miss Cora Linn then sang a very pretty song, entitled "Somebody's Coming;" Miss Lola O'Connor recited "The Snack in School" very prettily, and Mr. Rogers sang the "Beautiful Hills" in a most pleasing manner. When the Institute convened on Saturday morning Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Rogers sang a devotional song, and Prof. Powell offered prayer. The President then appointed J. H. Vandever, H. C. Flemming and B. Robb, as a committee on resolutions. Owing to insufficiency of time and the lively interest that had been awakened, in order that all who wished to speak might have an opportunity, it became necessary to limit teachers who did illustrative work, either at the board or with a class, to fifteen minutes, and all others to five minutes. It was then decided to take up the subjects of grammar and interest for further consideration, and Prof. Powell was requested to treat of grammar. He presented his method of analysis, and a system of diagramming which was new to the majority of those who were present and quite satisfactory to all. A lively discussion followed. Mr. W. I. Nichols then resumed the consideration of interest, after which he gave a novel and quite interesting class exercise in mental arithmetic. As the only method of teaching interest that had yet been presented was that of cancellation, Mr. J. W. Merritt gave a class exercise, with explanations in full, to demonstrate the analytic method. Mr. W. H. Parker then took up the development of the idea of fractions with small children. He was followed in this by L. L. Rogers, and afterwards by J. W. Merritt with a class to which a lesson was given to develop idea of and deduce rule for multiplication of a fraction by a fraction. Prof. Scott then favored the Institute with music, and Prof. Powell declared the meeting adjourned. When the teachers convened for the afternoon session and had listened to music, the committee on resolutions manifested a desire to

report, and, on motion, were allowed so to do. Some omissions having been made, the report was ordered back to the committee and work was resumed. The subject of multiples and divisors was assigned to J. W. Merritt, who gave a class exercise. This was followed by a profitable discussion, in which Prof. Powell demonstrated a second method of finding greatest common divisor. When Mr. Geo. Strong had sung "Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep," the Institute received the report of the committee on resolutions and proceeded to consider the resolutions offered, separately. After a lively discussion the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, that we are decidedly in favor of discarding the Pacific Coast series of readers and spellers, and the adoption of some good series in their stead.

Resolved, that it is the duty of our State Legislature to appropriate sufficient money from the general fund to defray the expenses of holding the Teacher's Institutes, which the State Superintendent is required by law to convene annually in the different judicial districts.

Resolved, that we pledge ourselves to use all honorable means in our power to procure the enactment of laws, by our Legislature, for the promotion and fostering of free schools throughout the State.

Resolved, that it is the bounden duty of all teachers of public schools to attend the sessions of the Teacher's Institute; and, in our judgment, those who fail through indifference or neglect are wanting that interest and zeal which should characterize those who assume the office of educators.

Resolved, that we earnestly impress upon the people the importance of neat and commodious school houses, constructed and furnished with a view to the health, comfort and convenience of teachers and pupils.

Resolved, that we tender to Prof. L. J. Powell, State Supt. of Pub. Inst., our hearty congratulations upon the success which has attended his efforts in convening and holding Teacher's Institutes throughout the State; and especially do we thank him for his labors in Jackson county.

Resolved, that we tender to Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Rogers and W. I. Nichols of Yreka, Cal., and to Mr. J. R. N. Bell of Roseburg, who are present with us, a fraternal welcome, and that we thank them for the able instruction which they have given us.

Resolved, that the thanks of the Institute are due to Mr. J. W. Merritt for the use of his school rooms, and for the courtesy and interest he has manifested in making our sessions pleasant and profitable.

Resolved, that we tender our thanks to the citizens of Jacksonville for so kindly and generously entertaining the teachers and friends of the Institute; to Mr. Schmidt and the other members of the Brass Band; to Mr. Scott, Mr. Brown and Miss Addie Langell, and other friends for the excellent music furnished us; and to the press of Jackson county for numerous favors.

Resolved, that the minutes of this Institute, with these resolutions, be published in the "Times" and SENTINEL of Jacksonville, and in the Ashland "Tidings."

The session closed with a song, "Waiting for the Tide," by Miss Eliza Langell and Mrs. Mollie Merritt.

The exercises of the evening consisted of a select reading, "The Evils of Ignorance," by Florence Mae; a recitation, "The parting of Maramon and Douglas," by Miss Ella Prim; a lecture "Mistakes in Education," by Mr. L. L. Rogers; a Scotch ballad, "Within a Mile of Edinboro Town," by Mrs. Mollie Merritt; an address by Mr. W. I. Nichols; a collection to defray the expenses of the Institute, amounting to \$26.25; a paper by Mrs. W. J. Plymale; and a recitation by Mrs. Wilton, "Curfew Shall not Ring To-Night." The lecturer claimed, that education should teach children to think, to bring the faculties under the command of the will power, and to express their thoughts in a clear and forcible manner; that mistakes are made as to whom the work of education belongs, as to who should be educated, as to the time of going to school, as to the object of education, and as to religion in our common schools. Parents must assist and not rely entirely upon the teachers; the healthy boys and girls should be educated, the time should be thorough, successful work is from sixteen to twenty-six; education should be a means to an end, and not an end; and the Bible should be read in all our schools.

Prof. Powell then thanked those in attendance for their sympathy and support, and declared the Institute at an end.

The Brass Band was present during each evening session, and the String Band during each day session, throughout.

## Notice to Donation Claimants.

THE ATTENTION OF CLAIMANTS to Donations of land, their assignees and legal representatives, is particularly called to that part of section 3 of the act of Congress, approved July 17, 1854, entitled "an act to amend an act approved September 27, 1850, to create the office of Surveyor General of the public lands in Oregon, etc., and also the act amendatory thereof approved February nineteen (fourteen) hundred and fifty three, which reads as follows:

"All persons claiming donations under this act or the act of which it is amendatory shall give notice to the Surveyor General or other duly authorized officer of the particular lands claimed as such donation, within thirty days after being requested so to do by such officer, and failing to do so the claimant or claimants shall forfeit all right and claim thereto."

Now therefore, the undersigned being such "other duly authorized officer" do hereby give notice to each and every person his or her assignees and representatives, claimants of donations of land within the district of lands subject to sale at the United States District Land Office at Roseburg Oregon under said acts of Congress, that each and every one of them within thirty days from the 19th of July, A. D. 1879, (being the day of the expiration of six weeks publication hereof) give notice to the Register and Receiver of said Land Office at Roseburg, Oregon, of "the particular lands claimed as such donations," and failing such notice \* \* \* \* the claimant or claimants shall forfeit all right and claim thereto.

And each and every person claiming the benefits of said act of September 27, 1850 and the legislation supplemental thereto, will within six months after the expiration of the aforesaid six weeks publication cause to be filed in the U. S. District Land Office at Roseburg Oregon, the proof as required by law, to complete their claim to a donation of land under said acts, and failing so to do such claims will be held for cancellation.
