GOOD WORDS FOR OREGON.

Hardly any State in the Union has advanced and is advancing so rapidly as Oregon which has many advantages over the other Western States in the quality of the soil, the number of its navigable rivers, and the character of its population.

The fact the Indian war of last Summer is partially ascribed. A number of railroads, mainly narrow gauge roads to transport grain to tide water, have been lately built, and a railroad is projected between Astoria and Winnemucca, on the line of the Central Pacific.

Every thing augurs well for Oregon. The upper region of the Columbia river seems destined to be one of the great granaries of the West. The crops now raised show a remarkable average per acre of superior quality, and have never been known to fail.

But they are probably insignificant in point of productiveness compared with what they soon will be. There is a vast area of land unsurpassed fertility between the Blue Mountains in the south and the Spokane river in the north, and not one in fifty acres has yet been cultivated.

The larger portion who have settled in Oregon are from New England, directly or indirectly, and have carried to their new home all the intelligence, energy, perseverance, thrift and industry for which they have been noted.

The Oregonians are very unlike the Californians in their freedom from reckless speculation. They expect to make money only by legitimate enter-

prise, by turn of fortune, as their southern neighbors do. The growth and prosperity of Oregon are solid, its present is most encouraging, and its future is full of promise.

AN INCIDENT IN A SLEEPING CAR BETWEEN READING AND WHEATLAND. It was in a sleeping car between here and Reading that it happened. Among the passengers were a middle aged couple, on their return from 'Frisco, evidently on their first journey, and a sour-faced old maid, rather desiccated in her general effect, who was traveling alone.

The couple had an upper berth and the "maiden well stricken in years" the upper berth in the adjoining section. In the same car were a couple of frolicsome youths, ready for any sort of mischief. Bed time came and all hands retired. But the husband could not sleep. Whether it was because of the motion of the cars, the noise or the novelty of the situation, he could not tell, but try as he would he could not sleep.

At length it occurred to him that he was thirsty. The more he thought of it the more thirsty he got. So he called the porter, who brought the ladder and helped him down. Now, while he was gone for the water, one of the boys stepped out of bed and shifted the ladder so that it rested against the berth in which the ancient maiden was sleeping, and then returned to his bed to note the result.

In a moment or two the husband returned and crept quietly up the steps, anxious to make as little noise as possible, so as not to waken his wife. The occupant of the berth, thus rudely intruded upon, awoke with a start and screamed. The husband, supposing it to be his easily frightened wife, tried to reassure her, and said: "It is only me." "Only you, you old scoundrel," said the venerable maiden, "I'll teach you a lesson," and with that she seized him by the hair of the head and screamed for help. Then his wife, awakened by the noise, discovered where her husband was and raised her voice in lamentation, heaping reproaches upon her faithless spouse. Then the passengers all got up and demanded an explanation of the commotion and foremost among them was the wretch who caused it. Then the husband covered with confusion and utterly unable to account for what he had done, climbed down from his perch and slunk away to bed, where he was soundly lectured for his faithlessness. The cause of all the trouble leaked out, but has not yet reached the ears of those chiefly affected by it, and the glances of defiance exchanged between the wife and the old maid when they meet on the street are a study.

THE GROWTH OF ASHLAND. Six years ago, three years, one year ago knowing ones said "Ashland will never grow any larger. It is already as large a town as the business center here will support. There is nothing to build up a town here." Strangers coming to the place are puzzled to know what maintains so thriving and growing a town in this narrow little valley hemmed in by high mountains upon either side, this narrowing rapid, pinched up into a rocky canon a few miles above. If it were a mining region its source of life would be apparent at once, but there are no mining camps directly tributary to the town. Still Ashland grows, steadily and rapidly, and every year brings the addition of substantial business houses and beautiful homes. Ashland people are asking themselves: how long will this continue; what is the limit; is it a solid growth? Besides the two brick buildings in the business part of town, which will contain four or five capacious stores, there will be built this season at least four large dwelling houses—one the school boarding house—and likely as many cottages, smaller and less expensive, and yet we have faith to believe that Ashland will not have reached the limit of improvement at the end of this building season. Let us make a cursory analysis of the business of the town, and perhaps its growth will not appear so mysterious, after all.

A woolen factory, turn'ng out annually \$30,000 worth of goods manufactured from wool grown within a few miles of the looms and spindles is no mean factor in the maintenance of a town; a flouring mill, turning out 1,000,000 pounds of flour, much of which brings cash into the place from abroad, is not to be overlooked in seeking for the props of the town, and the trades of a

town which people raise and sell thousands of dollars worth of cattle every year is worth considering when mercantile resources are in question. The cattle men of Lake county do not attempt to raise all they must eat, and our fertile valley furnishes what they need. This makes business for Ashland. The Lake country does much for our town in other ways, also, than one would suppose from a casual view of the subject. Many of the owners of the horned herds that roam in the valleys east of the mountains spend a part or all of the year in Ashland with their families, a number of them owning comfortable residences here and considering themselves citizens of the town. No more attractive a place for a home can be found than Ashland, and these men who are making money in Lake county do well to give their families the advantages and comforts of a residence here, instead of inflicting upon them the social and domestic privations of a life upon an isolated cattle ranch. We know of three of the prominent cattle owners of Lake county who intend to come with their families to Ashland this fall, and who will in all probability become permanent residents. Ashland has an enviable and well deserved reputation as a desirable place for parents to send or bring their children to be educated, and we could name several families whose residence here is owing to this feature alone. The prospects are that the inducement offered to this class of people will be greatly increased, and consequently that portion of our population considerable augmented every year from this time.

In this partial enumeration of the chief resources of the town, it will be that only such enterprises as bring in money from the outside territory are mentioned. Besides these, however, are other kinds of business partially dependent upon them, but also worthy of being counted with the creative and sustaining forces of the town. So it appears that the prosperity of the place is not without foundation, and is likely to continue and to increase with the increasing population and the development of Southern Oregon.

A couple of Black River Falls barbers are anxious to meet each other in battle array for a hair cutting match, but cannot agree on the rules that shall govern the contest. If the match comes off, we suggest that a corps of surgeons be on hand with a stock of court plaster and tin ears for the victims. Neither of the barbers would want to lose valuable time by stopping and hunting through a pile of hair on the floor for a man's ear. The authorities should see to it that the sale of hair renewer is forbidden on the grounds.
