

or repair their fences as to build a road for their accommodation. There is no excuse for not subscribing; any farmer can easily find a list in Jacksonville, Ashland or Phoenix, and let them say by a prompt pledge of assistance according to their means, whether they want the road or not. The press of this county has done its whole duty but will soon get tired of talking to men that will not help themselves, and if this road project fails our people can harp on the old string, "hard times and no money," and find little sympathy.

A NEW ROUTE.

We have learned authoritatively that Mr. Robt. Hume of Ellensburg, offers to build a wagon road from that point to "Thornton's," on the road from here to Kerbyville, for a subsidy of \$10,000 he estimating the cost of the road at \$20,000. Mr. Hume also offers to guarantee the landing of freights at \$3.50 per ton. The route is somewhat shorter than the Crescent City route; already twenty miles of trail has been constructed over it on a wagon road grade and the pass is said to be lower than that to Crescent City.

This is the way they do business in Texas. The Galveston "News," Dec. 4th, publishes the following telegram from Wasco: In the country near here where a dance was progressing,

a writ of prohibition from the U. S. District Court. It is claimed that the decisions of our Supreme Court are void and that its acts will seriously cloud land titles, and involve the people of Oregon in endless litigation. We cannot perceive the force of his arguments. There is nothing in the foregoing clause prohibiting the Legislature of this State from creating a separate class of the judiciary at any time except by implication. The last Legislative Assembly assumed that the State contained the necessary population, and even if the fact should be disclosed that it did not, the Legislature acted in its sovereign capacity with regard to an affair entirely domestic and without the purview of either Congress or the U. S. District Court. In so doing our Republican form of government, the only essential required by Congress when Oregon was admitted, has not been changed, and the conclusion of the writer that any U. S. District Court has the right to dissolve the Supreme Court of the State is simply absurd. The act of the Legislature creating a separate supreme judiciary was in response to the most urgent popular demand and the question of its legality has only been raised by a few professionals who failed to receive position on the bench. We believe in adhering strictly to the organic law where its language is explicit and not liable to misinterpretation, but believe it should be
