EN-ROUTE.—Capt. T. F. Riley of the 21st Infantry, passed through town last evening, en-route to Vancouver to report to the Assistant Adjutant General of the Department. The captain, still a young man, has been through the trying scenes of the Rebellion and has won his present rank by seventeen years of meritorious service. He is accompanied by his family and his company "F" is to be stationed at Vancouver, he will probably remain there.

TOWN ELECTION.—The annual municipal election passed off very harmoniously yesterday, although there was a very spirited contest among the friends of the candidates for marshal which resulted in the election of D. W. Crosby by eight majority, the vote polled being 167. The Trustees elected are: T. G. Reames, Nat. Randall, Chris Ulrich, John Orth and Chas. Rickell. Henry Pope was re-elected treasurer; there being no opposition D. Nunan was chosen Recorder.

RICH QUARTZ.—Our friend Will Hunter sends us some very rich specimens from a ledge just struck by Barkdale & Co. while ground sluicing in the Blackwell district one half mile from Deskins. The ledge is well defined, is ten inches wide, where first uncovered, and is increasing in width. The quartz sent us is of the same character as the famous Gold Hill quartz, rich in free gold, and some of the pieces bearing fully one half metal. One of the owners pounded out \$75 with a hand mortar on Monday and it is thought they have a bonanza which we hope will prove true.

BUCKWHEAT.—Last year R. J. Cameron of Applegate sowed 20 lbs of silv'er hulled buckwheat which he procured from Salem. The late frost in July cut down the largest portion of the growing crop but from a strip of forty rods that was uninjured he threshed nine bushels. He has now plenty of seed to supply his neighbors and will sell it at their own price as he wishes it all sown so as to induce proprietors of the new mill to put it to test for buckwheat flour. That article has been largely imported here at ten cents per pound and its importation should be stopped by a home supply, and as feed for bees it is very valuable.

SCHOOL MEETING.—On Monday last the annual school meeting was well attended. The balloting for Director for the next three years to fill the place of David Linn, who asked to be relieved, resulted in the choice of J. R. Neil. The present clerk J. H. Huffer was elected by acclamation and the meeting adjourned, every one being satisfied with the result of the meeting and the financial report, which appears elsewhere. Asking the fellow over the hill how it is, he is met with response, "My sheep are just doing bully, but that fellow back there has lost about all his." Garrett thinks the losses down Applegate, especially of sheep, are heavy.

The "Independent" takes us to task and says the SENTINEL has entered the combination that is defending the Supreme Court. That paper mistakes our position. The SENTINEL knows nothing of any combination, recognizes no master, receives no subsidies, stands alone, acknowledging only duty to the public; and will maintain the right, to defend or oppose, any public servant according to his deserts; or to discuss fairly any principle of public policy, to the best of its ability.

She has her doll, treated and cared with simple, childish affection, dressed and put to bed at night, awakened and dressed in the morning and fondly caressed during the day and it is apparently her only object in life. This is one of the strange problems of life, who is wise enough to solve it, is authorized to say that we may not turn to childhood again across the threshold of the eternal. And who dare tell us, that the pleasures of childhood are not sweeter, purer, better than all the achievements of after life?

CATFISH FOR LITTLE KLAMATH.—Mr. Jerome Churchill returned from below on Wednesday and brought up with him a lot of catfish which he intends to put into Little Klamath Lake. He bought them in Sacramento, and will keep them here until Spring when he will take them out to the lake. Before turning them into the lake proper he intends to put them into a small pond or slough at the edge of the lake if he can find one suitable, and dam it up so as to prevent their getting into the main body of water until their numbers have been increased by breeding. If this is done, it will not be long before Little Klamath Lake and its tributaries will be full of them as they multiply very rapidly. Mr. E. Edson, who returned with Mr. Churchill, also brought up a lot for Geo. Campbell of Soda Springs, to be put in a fish pond Mr. Campbell has lately built—Yreka "Union."
