Republican County Convention.

A Republican County Convention is here by called to meet in Jacksonville on April 10th, 1880, at 1 o'clock P. M., for the purpose of electing delegates to attend the Republican State Convention to meet in Portland April 21st, 1880, at 11 o'clock A. M., and to attend to such other business as may come before the Convention.

It is recommended that primary conventions be held in the several precincts on Saturday, April 3d, at 2 o'clock P. M. The several precincts of the county will be entitled to one delegate, and one for every 16 votes and fraction of eight or over, based upon the vote cast for Member of Congress at the June election 1878, which gives the following representation:

The case of Tiburcio Parot, to test the constitutionality of the new anti-Chinese law in California, has been commenced in the U. S. Dist. Court at San Francisco. It is safe to predict that the law be declared "Unconstitutional" as the leaning of the Court is quite apparent.

We beg leave to correct the geography of the Record Union. An article copied from this paper is credited to the "Jacksonville (Oregon) Sentinel." It is probably a typographical error as there is no Jacksonville in this State; or our dignified exchange prefers "John" to "Jack."

Counterfeit silver dollars, in enormous numbers, have recently been put in circulation, and every part of the country. East of the mountains, is being flooded with them. They are made of block tin and a close imitation of the genuine, but are of a lighter weight. Look out for them!

The "Journal" thinks Roseburg should be represented and kindly offers P. G. Strickland as a sacrifice in a foot race with Henry Benson. Should "Strick" decline, perhaps "Pappy Stroud" the popular conductor of the O. & C. R. R. would conduct Mentor over the track! He has some reputation for swiftness.

Since Judge Day disavows dividing profits with the "poor" contractor his extreme liberality with the State's money leads to a well grounded suspicion that he was only rewarding his friend for political services. Padden was engaged in fencing a piece of land that was in dispute and the boy's mother directed him to drive Padden from the premises, placing a shot gun in his hands for the purpose. If well trained by that careful mother up to manhood, the lad will probably make his mark in the world.

The "Bulletin" puts the whole question in a nutshell when it says "the bottom social fact, that the two civilizations, such as those of America and China, cannot go along together." It could be expressed better, however, by saying that "barbarism" and civilization can never become bed fellows quite satisfactory to each other. Civilization wants the whole bed and barbarism will steal the sheets on every opportunity.

MINING ITEMS.

Two Indians prospecting on Scott river lately found a nugget weighing four and one-half ounces.

Water is again a little scarce at Willow Springs camp and miners say rain is badly needed.

The Squaw Lake company have ample water and are piping dirt through their flume very fast.

Piping at McCall & Anderson's diggings near the Eagle mills is going on vigorously. These claims have always yielded handsomely.

The Sterling company are still working with a very light head of water, their ditch being only one third full, owing to the exceedingly cold night.

Messrs. Schump, Egan & Elliott have purchased the interest of Mr. Steele in the Willow Springs quartz ledge, and will continue taking out quartz.

Cleaning up commenced at the "Centennial" in the Willow Springs district yesterday on account of the failure of water. The same is the case with nearly all other camps in that camp.

Keaton, Klippel & Co. on Poorman's creek are still working with a full head of water in good paying ground. They report that they have already moved twice as much ground as was moved the whole of last season.

Work has been suspended for the present at the Star Gulch mine, Chapel, Eklon & Co., on account of freezing weather at the source of water supply. A partial clean up was made by this company last week amounting to sixty-six ounces of dust or \$1,122.

The Palmer creek mine, Lackland, Kahler & Co., was interrupted last week by a heavy cave of dirt that smashed the pipe, but fortunately did little other damage. Work has again been resumed. This company made a partial clean up last week of over \$500.

W. G. Kenny, just returned from Josephine county, tells us that the Messrs. Wimer have "struck it rich" in their hydraulic claim near Waldo. The claim is now well opened and a stratum of gravel, several feet in thickness, that prospects a bit to the pan or over eight collars to the cubic yard, has been developed. This is probably the best claim in Josephine county.

Water is growing scarce in several mining camps owing to the hard freezing nights. Miners say the snow is melting too gradually to be of much service, and that when the water flow is checked by frost, it seems to be lost either by absorption or evaporation. In many places on the Siskiyou mountains the snow is from ten to thirty feet, which will insure a late summer's run.

The New Hotel, Specialty of Madame Holt's new hotel the "Marianne" remarks: "Marianne Holt has decided to give a grand ball on the 1st of July, and she earnestly solicits the patronage and influence of her numerous friends everywhere. The tickets, which have already been issued and forwarded to agents, who she has appointed, sell at \$5 each. Those agents, of her own appointment, and whose names appear on her books as such, are gentlemen of culture and pleasing manner, in fact, to use the Canadian expression, "they are ladies' men." Gen. Grant is agent at Washington and his tickets have already been forwarded. Gov. Chidwick is agent for Marion county and his tickets have also been forwarded; while Col. Kelsay is the general agent for the State of Oregon and three months ago was in possession of his tickets. With such gentlemen as the above named at the head, we hazard the prediction that the Fourth of July ball at Jacksonville will be a grand affair. The people generally should give this movement their attention and help Madame Holt along in her enterprise.

Our neighbor who is so intensely democratic that he drinks only democratic coffee, sweetened with democratic sugar and stirred with a democratic spoon; or whiskey from a democratic still, believes in the "time honored principles" of free trade and protection, hard money, soft money, and anything to beat Grant; thinks that a republican boom was attempted at the City election. The dreadful thought must have sat on the democratic stoma ach like a horrid nightmare, for twenty-three active workers, in this strong democratic town, headed by "Boss" Jones had all they could do to beat Capt. Caton eight votes. When our neighbor dies if he cannot find a democratic heaven to go to, he will be most unhappy.

The hills in the Butter creek region, Southern Oregon, are green with growing grass and farmers are busy plowing for Spring crops.—Ex. There is no such creek in Southern Oregon. If there were a stream, abounding with the concrete substance produced by agitation of the lactical fluid we would be happy; as perhaps some one would be energetic enough to gather it up and bring it to market. As our farmers seem averse to agitating the milk into the proper consistency we will continue the agitation of the wagon road question so the rich, yellow product of Smith river can be brought here for a reasonable price.

On the 7th inst. Jack McCombs, says the "Statesman," nearly severed the head from the body of a fellow prisoner named J. C. Weston, with a razor, inflicting probably fatal wounds. It is not explained why prisoners are permitted to have possession of such dangerous weapons. Should Weston die, McCombs might be pardoned by "His Clemency" cause meritorious services in extinguishing a fellow prisoner, and given a chance to make his mark in the world.

REPORTER.

JUDICIAL POWERS USURPED.—A little episode occurred in Justice Beeson's court at Phoenix, last week, that will make our Circuit Court watchful of its privileges. Two young men were arrested on the charge of shooting a neighbor's hog; the District Attorney was sent for, A. C. Jones appearing for the defense. When these gentlemen arrived they found that the Justice had summoned a jury of twelve "good and lawful men," and proposed to try the prisoners, and it was with great difficulty that he was made to understand that the proceeding was illegal and that it was only his province to "examine" the charge against the accused. The jurors "bucked" at the prospect of no fees, but the Justice "treated" several times and they were reconciled. This is not the first time that a Justice was ignorant of his duty, and in future Justice Beeson will probably peruse the statutes, and learn his jurisdiction before summoning people from their work to try offences only triable by the Circuit Court.

The stock were shipped on the 10th inst. together with the three-year old bay stallion Wilborn, by Alamo, son of Almont, previously purchased by Mr. Beach of Gen. Withers.

The purchase of these richly bred fillies and stallions is evidence that Mr. Beach believes in a thoroughbred foundation. And the success of Ella Earl, Emma C. Remy Witherspoon, Aletha, and others, out of mares strictly or nearly thoroughbred, has turned his eyes to Fairlawn. The running blood is sandwiched by trotting blood. The form is thus improved without spoiling the action. It is now pretty generally admitted that a proper distribution of thoroughbred gives speed at the trotting gait. Mr. Beach is enterprising and intelligent, and we hope that his breeding venture in Oregon will meet with the largest success.—Turf, Field and Farm.
