Prof. Peter Collyer, Chemist of the Department of Agriculture, stated in a recent address in New York city, that the results of experiments during the past two months, convinced him that within five years the United States will be able to produce all the sugar it needs, and in ten years we will be exporting more sugar than we are importing. He had examined different varieties of sorghum and all conditions of development, and found them of equal value with the best sugar-cane of Louisiana. The Minnesota early an:ber contained 5 per cent of uncrystallizable sugar and 2 per cent of crystalizable sugar. As the season advanced the per cent diminished until it became less than 1, and the 2 per cent of crystallizable sugar increased to a maxi mum of 184 per cent. Experiments resulted in raising one ton of sugar per acre, leaving the syrup out of account. Experiments with cornstalks were equally gratifying, the amount of sugar being greater in value than the corn, or at the rate of 800 pounds to the acre. Millions of acres between New York and the Rocky Mountains could be used for the production of sugar as good as that produced in Lo nisiana.


