**REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.**  
**RESOLVED,** By the Republicans of  
Oregon in convention assembled in the  
city of Portland, this 21st day of  
April, A. D. 1880, that we propose to  
maintain and administer the affairs of  
government of this state by strict  
economy and faithful adherence to the  
constitution and laws thereof and of  
the United States.  
2. That we are in favor of regula-  
ting and equalizing the salaries of  
county and state officers so that they  
shall receive such compensation as are  
usually paid to private persons under  
like circumstances of service and re-  
sponsibility.  
3. That we favor a thorough revision  
and equalization of our system of tax-  
ation, to the end that every species of  
property within its limits, whether  
owned or possessed by citizens of this or  
of foreign states, shall bear its equal  
proportion of the burthens of the  
government which protects it.  
4. That we propose to maintain and  
enforce the amendments of the consti-  
tution of the United States, with all  
the powers of the national government,  
to the end that every citizen, poor or  
rich, black or white, may be secured in  
the full enjoyment of his civil and political  
rights.  
5. That the overthrow of the rights  
of the elective franchise of liberty and  
life, by which means free government  
in a portion of the states has been de-  
feated, and the manifested fraud and  
threatened violence in others, together  
with attempted nullification of the laws  
of the general government and decis-  
ions of the supreme court thereon, by  
congressional action in the interests of  
the Democratic party, are attempted  
revolution and must be met as such.  
6. That this is a Nation formed by  
the people thereof and not a conglom-  
eration of races and tribes,  
and necessitates

affirm the idea of the unity of the  
nation, the supremacy of the national  
government in all matters placed by  
the constitution under its control the  
preservation intact of all the rights of  
municipal self-government, otherwise  
guaranteed thereby to the people or to  
the states respectively. At the same  
time we reassert the doctrine of state  
sovereignty as the balof mother of  
nullification, secession and anarchy.  
7. That the recent action of the  
Democratic party in state convention  
assembled, in denouncing the supreme  
court of the United States of America  
and imputing the most unworthy and  
unpatriotic motives to that high and  
honorable court, is unworthy of law-  
abiding, intelligent and patriotic Amer-  
ican citizens, and directly tends to the  
loosening of the foundation of our  
government, the subversion of all law  
and the overthrow and sanctity of a  
system of judicature, venerable with  
age and perfected by wisdom.  
8. That the attempt by the leaders  
of the Democratic party to defraud the  
people of the state out of an electoral  
vote, was an outrage unparalleled in  
the political history of the state, which  
together with the Maine infamy and  
the attempt to unseat members in the  
halls of congress for base partisan ad-  
vantage, deserves the condemnation of  
all fair-minded men.  
9. That we condemn the outrageous  
conduct of our Democratic state ad-  
ministration from 1870 to 1878, their  
extravagance, their corruption and  
their perulations.  
10. We deprecate the course of  
members of the Democratic party who  
have undertaken to revive sectional  
animosity for the purpose of securing  
political ascendancy in the southern  
states and who have revived mem-  
ories of sectional strife by the defiant  
declaration of a purpose to repeal laws  
made necessary by the war and enacted  
to secure the results of the war; and  
we condemn their attempts to secure  
by legislation what was not accom-  
plished by arms, viz: the establishment  
under the name of state sovereignty of  
those pernicious doctrines which des-  
troy national supremacy and which in  
part have led to secession and civil  
war.

11. That to the Republican party is  
due the credit of successful resumption  
and restored prosperity and business  
revival, and we insist that the paper  
and coin circulation of the country  
shall at all times be maintained at par  
with the gold standard of the commer-  
cial world.

12. That while we are in favor of a  
revenue for the support of the general  
government by duties upon imports,  
sound policy requires such adjustment  
of import duties as to encourage the  
development of the industrial interests  
of the whole country, and we commend  
that policy of national exchange which  
secures to the working man liberal  
wages, to agriculture remunerative  
prices, to mechanics and manufacturers  
an adequate reward for their skill,  
labor and enterprise, and to the nation  
commercial prosperity and independ-  
ence.  
13. That we are in favor of judi-  
cious appropriations by the general  
government for the improvement of  
our rivers and seaports, as well as for  
the construction of such lines of rail-  
way communication as will develop  
the resources of the country and con-  
nect our state with other parts of the  
Union, under such restrictions as will  
amply protect the rights of the people  
from unjust discrimination and extor-  
tionate charges; and that in the grants  
of lands to railroads we favor the sale  
of the same by the government to the  
people at the lowest price for public  
lands, giving the proceeds only to the  
corporations.  
14. That we demand of our repre-  
sentation in congress their best en-  
deavors to secure just and judicious  
appropriations and favorable legisla-  
tion by the general government for the  
free navigation of the Columbia and  
the rivers of the state, the improve-  
ment of the mouth of the Columbia  
and the harbors at Yaquina and Coos  
bays, the location of a harbor of refuge  
at the point along our coast most  
available to the interests of commerce,  
the extension of the public surveys to  
meet the wants of our increasing popu-  
lation and aid and assistance to rail-  
roads, and the opening up for settle-  
ment such of our Indian reservations  
and necessitates

15. That we demand a modification  
of the treaty with China so as to re-  
strict Chinese immigration to America.  
16. That we hold that a well in-  
structed people alone can be perfectly  
free, and that it is therefore essential  
that the public schools should be main-  
tained so that every child shall be in-  
structed in the duties of citizenship  
and the ordinary business vocations of  
life.  
The following resolution was also  
adopted:  
Resolved, That the first choice of  
the Republican party of Oregon for  
candidate for president of the United  
States is Hon. James G. Blaine of  
Maine, and that our delegates to the  
National Republican Convention at  
Chicago are expected to use all honor-  
able efforts to procure his nomination.  
The platform was adopted without  
a dissenting vote, and the Blaine res-  
olution by a vote of 162 to 1.

The discipline of the Quincy schools  
of Boston astonishes the old-fashioned  
teachers. While it was being explain-  
ed by one of the committee the other  
day, an old teacher objected, "But—  
this is very noisy." "Precisely, madam,  
this is a workshop, not a funeral. You  
can't have a beehive without a buzz."  
And, continued the critic, "that little  
boy in the plaid jacket whispered to  
the little girl in white." "Quite like-  
ly, madam; we can readily find an  
excuse for bright-eyed, curly-headed,  
racy cheeked little boys who whisper  
to little girls in white. We once had  
a tendency in that direction ourselves,  
and we do not see any occasion for  
pounding him or shaking him, or  
standing him in the corner, or putting  
him in a dark closet, or even to notice  
it at all." Teachers make a great ad-  
vance in school government when they  
learn how not to see.
