Law of Newspapers.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.
2. If any subscriber order the discontinuance of their newspaper, the publisher is not responsible for the same until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the office to which they are directed, the law holds them responsible until they are notified the bills, and ordered their discontinuance.
4. If subscribers remove to other places without notifying the publisher, and the newspapers are sent to the former address, they are held responsible for the same.
5. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from this office, or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
6. The publisher who neglects to give legal notice of the neglect of a person to take from the office a newspaper addressed to him, is liable to the publisher for the subscription price.

Bids must be accompanied by a bond, in a penal sum, one-third of the amount of the bid, with good and sufficient security, conditioned that the bidder will enter into a contract agreeably to the terms of his bid, if the same be awarded to him, within sixty days from the date of the opening of the bids, or otherwise pay the penalty. No bids shall be withdrawn by the bidder within the said period of sixty days. Blank proposals and printed specifications, stating the kind and estimated quantities required at each post, and giving full instructions as to the manner of bidding conditions to be observed by bidders, and terms of contract and payment, will be furnished on application to this office or the Quartermasters at the several posts named. 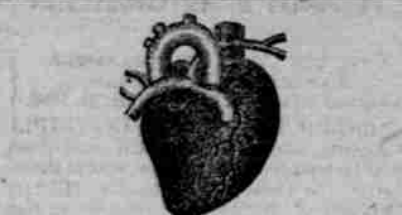

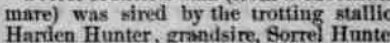
