EDITORIAL NOTES.

Our neighbor chides us for noticing him too much. The point is well taken and we plead guilty to a waste of time.

When the "Times" speaks of "respectable" citizens it should bear in mind that those only are worthy of respect who respect themselves.

The "Standard" says Whiteaker has an appropriation for Yaquina Bay, right in his grasp. Kelly would probably "endorse" an application for \$10,000 of it.

The "Standard" is not satisfied with the Governor's appointment of the State Printer and says so, most unmistakably. If, then, the Governor has a knack of pleasing nobody except pardoned convicts and some of them are unhappy until again sent to the Penitentiary.

Our Democratic friends are steeped in sorrow because Mr. Mallory was not nominated instead of Mr. George. Had Mallory been the choice of the Republican convention, who then, could have measured the intensity of their grief? It is doubtful if it would have been less.

The "Times" re-iterates the flimsy lie about Judge Watson and Chinese naturalization and says that it can be proved by "the then Clerk." Why don't the "Times" prove it? The gentleman who was "then Clerk" is right here but unfortunately for the "Times," can't be made a tool of.

And now comes the Portland "Mercury" (Democratic) and accuses the "Bush Thayer" wing of its party of gross corruption by the use of money in Yamhill county, at the last election. The fact was notorious just after the election but the reform sheets seem to have forgotten all about it.

One of the most disgusting spectacles is to see a follower of Jesus running for office and in his greed for plunder wallowing in the dirtiest practices of the smallest politicians. It can be seen here every day and night. Men who profess to cling to the "cross" should not abandon it for an evening post.

The candidates for Clerk and Sheriff in Josephine county on the Democratic ticket are the present incumbents, Hughes and Taylor. Chas. Hughes has been Clerk for twelve consecutive years and his re-nomination must be considered very complimentary and a mark of confidence. On the other hand Messrs. Nickerson and Kellogg are both well qualified for the same offices and the result will be measured mainly by the personal popularity of the candidates more than their relative political positions.

On Friday evening Treasurer Fisher had twenty-six delegates pledged to him and was certain of re-nomination. On Saturday Mr. Fisher was informed by W. J. Plymale that he would have to be beaten in convention. "Why?" asked Fisher. "Because," replied Mr. Plymale, "we promised Charley Nickell that if he would draw off for the Clerkship we would give the Treasury to him." The people are anxious to know who this W. J. is that is going into the "Empire" business on a small scale and disposing of offices in an off hand way. Mr. Fisher was beat.

SAUCE FOR THE GOOSE.

The "Times" is of the opinion that Judge Watson is quite as guilty of extravagance as Judge Day; because he too allowed \$3 per day for keeping paupers. We do not defend Judge Watson but in his absence will merely point out that the circumstances of the two cases are widely different. The majority of the County Court, during Judge Watson's term were of an opposite party and had they observed any extravagance they should have stopped it; for just about that time the Democracy pretended to be sailing high on the wave of reform. Ordinarily, the majority of an administrative body are responsible for the acts of the whole, but it is well known that the commissioners of 1877-8 were new men and it is notorious that the court was a unit on everything. Its action on the matter of letting the contract by which this county suffers loss was peculiar. No subsequent "Board" had ever pretended to have the right to make a contract for a term beyond their own; knowing that morally and legally it did not belong to them. The Court composed of Day, Furry and Miller did assume the right against all precedent and without any necessity. They seemed quite willing to follow a bad precedent governing the prior; but entirely disregarded a proper rule governing the practice of the court. We assert fearlessly, that if the contract had been controlled by Anderson and Magruder, the Commissioners whose undoubted right it was to control it, the extravagant sum of \$21 per week would not have been allowed; and we also assert, with full knowledge of what we say, that although the pauper contract will expire in June, those gentlemen will not in decency presume to let another to run through the term of their successors. The "Times" must place the responsibility where it belongs—not on us; but on those who made a contract to which the Secretary of State is fully refused to be a party. The SENTINEL by its exposure of a bad system has made it odious—in so doing it only discharged a duty to the public and if any think we will "wink" at official extravagance they are mistaken. Let the blame fall on those who followed a bad precedent, in the absence of right or necessity, and not on those who exposed it.

SEARCH THE RECORDS.

As the temperance people are making their influence felt in this campaign, and as they receive but small encouragement from the Democracy, we deem it our duty to aid them in their efforts as far as possible, and to this end call their attention to the following:

WHEREAS, this house is in possession of information that there exists within the capitol building of the State of Oregon, a rum or whisky shop, where intoxicating liquors are kept and sold without any authority of the law; and WHEREAS, the fact that liquor is kept and sold within the capitol building reflects shame and disgrace upon the representatives of the people; therefore be it

Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring:

That the sergeant-at-arms be ordered to remove, or cause the same to be removed forthwith.

This resolution passed the House and Senate, the vote in the latter standing as follows: Yeas—Messrs. Apperson, Applegate, Bently, Bilyew, Bradshaw, Brown, Burch, Burnett, Davidson, Fulton, George, (Our candidate for Congress), Green, Grim, Haley, Hirsch, Jasper, Lord, Myers, Pennington, Ross, Smith, Waldo and Watt—24. Nays—Messrs. Davis, Haines, Palmer, Thompson and Whiteaker, the Democratic candidate for Congress. For the benefit of the "Democrat" we add that the proofs of this can be found on page 200 of the "Laws of Oregon," passed at the tenth regular session of the Oregon legislature, and page 120 of the Senate journal for 1878.—Albany "Herald."

And now at this day, Supreme Judge Kelly publishes the affidavit of Patrick that he (Kelly) was ignorant of the contents of the infamous dispatch that demanded \$10,000 for bribery purposes. The affidavit was made in 1877, but as it has been proved since that the dispatch is in Kelly's own handwriting, Patrick's effort to prove Kelly a fool, by swearing that he was ignorant of what he "endorsed," creates a suspicion that Kelly has added "subornation of perjury" to his other crime. A Supreme Judge going into the affidavit business with a tool like Patrick is a sorry spectacle, and he is a nice specimen to sit on the bench.

GOVERNMENT ROAD WORK.

Lieut. Thos W. Symons, the engineer in charge of the road work in the Grave Creek hills is said to be making substantial and much needed improvements. We perceive that a demand is now made by a Roseburg paper that part of the appropriation shall be expended between that place and Scottsburg and it is really a great pity that the appropriation is not sufficiently large to enable the officer expending it to grade the streets and sidewalks of Roseburg and Oakland. The appropriation, sad to say, is inadequate, and Lieut. Symons is showing sound judgment in expending it on the worst and most isolated portion of the road where there is no local road work to keep it in passable condition. The road between here and Roseburg is the most important thoroughfare in Oregon. The daily mail for the whole of Western Oregon passes over it. All the supplies for Fort Klamath are hauled by this route and were it not for expenditures, made by the Stage company, through portions of Josephine and Douglas counties, it would be unavailable for either of these purposes. The people of Roseburg and vicinity have not indicated that they wanted roads laid, else they would have made them instead of waiting till government furnished the money. They only want the coin expended in their neighborhood, but it is evident that Lieut. Symons intends putting every dollar of the funds, in his hands, where it is most needed, will do the most good and best carry out the real purpose for which it was appropriated. We make no suggestions to that effect. He is undoubtedly a gentleman who will use his own judgment and not be misled by any clamor and is evidently able to attend to his own business as the people of Roseburg and Oakland are to build their own roads.

THAT UGLY CIPHER.

It is an accepted proposition that "murder will out." By the same rule, if the ways of a public man are crooked, sooner or later exposure must take place. It is now clearly established by the "Mercury" and "Oregonian" that James K. Kelly not only understood every word of the dispatch asking for \$10,000, with which to purchase a Republican elector, but that the dispatch was written by Kelly himself. Kelly denied under oath any knowledge whatever of the contents of the instrument he "fully endorsed" and if he told the truth that horn of the dilemma is sufficient to condemn him, but at the circumstances should be weighed, before Judge Kelly is allowed even the charitable conclusion that he was a fool instead of a knave. Kelly had started for his post at Washington. His party had determined on the doubtful experiment of unseating an elector; he at once came back from San Francisco in company with a political agent from the East and the two opened telegraphic communication by cipher with the national managers of their party. Kelly himself was playing for a prize. Had Mr. Tilden been seated, Kelly could have demanded a lucrative appointment and as his senatorial term was soon to expire no doubt he would have insisted on it with his hand full of trump cards. Is it reasonable to suppose, then, that Senator Kelly did not fully understand every word of the "cipher" dispatch that made the infamous proposal?

If he did not, what must be thought of the judgment and capacity of a man who will blindly "endorse" a mysterious document without knowing its contents? A man, who by his own admission, is so devoid of the ordinary principles of common business sense; or so zealous a partisan as to be made the easy tool of tricksters, is surely not fit to occupy the highest judicial position in the State. His nomination is not creditable to his party and its ratification, as the endorsement of corruptionists or dupes does not seem to lie in the direction of reform.

FOR STATE PRINTER.

After a hard struggle T. B. Mery of Wasco was nominated for State Printer by the Democratic State Central Committee on the 18th. The "Standard" apologizes for Mr. Mery not being a printer, which fact places him on an even footing with Gen'l. Odell and makes honors even so far as the "craft" is concerned. Candidly, there is just as much propriety in nominating any person for State Printer, who is not a printer, as there would be in appointing a blacksmith as chief of a lying-in hospital; or putting a millinery establishment in charge of a wood chopper. W. F. Cornell, Mery's strongest competitor for nomination enjoys the reputation of being the best printer in Oregon and would have been more fit than the nominee who has neither personal popularity nor necessary qualifications.

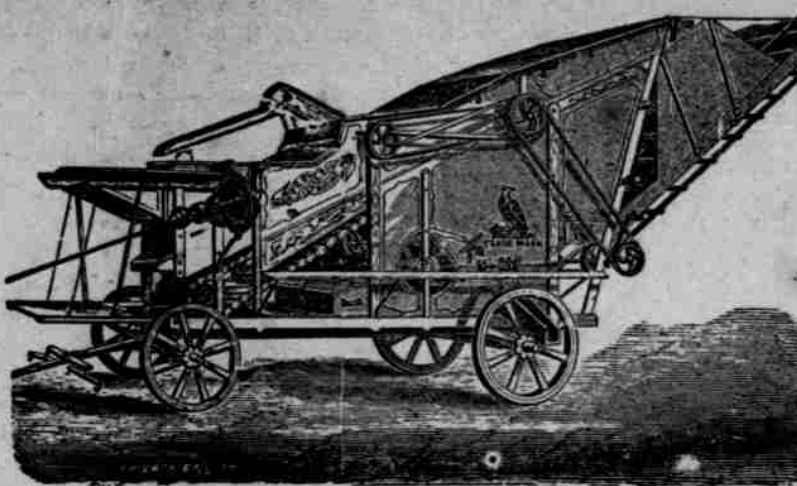

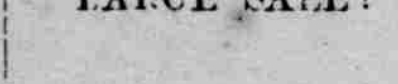
